GIVE UP

"Jesus answered: 'I give you My word, there is no one who has given up home, brothers or sisters, mother or father, children or property, for Me and for the gospel who will not receive in this present age a hundred times as many homes, brothers and sisters, mothers, children and property — and persecution besides — and in the age to come, everlasting life.' " —*Mark 10:29-30*

We will either give up our lives for love of Jesus, or we will give up hope. We will either abandon ourselves to Him or we will despair as life becomes impossible. One way or the other, we will give up.

To give up our lives to Jesus, we must be set free from our addiction to self. This can be done only by receiving God's love. Naturally, we desperately cling to our lives with the clenched fists of selfishness. Only by God's love can we unclench our fists, open our hands, and let our lives fall into the hands of God (see Heb 10:31). In today's Gospel reading, before Jesus told the young rich man to give up everything and follow Him, He looked at the man with love (Mk 10:21).

At this moment, Jesus is looking at each one of us with His divine, crucified love. If we look into the eyes of Love, we will be impelled by love to live no longer for ourselves but for Him (2 Cor 5:14-15). Be loved by Love into love.

Stunned by love, drop everything and give up your life to Him Who is Love (1 Jn 4:16).

Prayer: *Father, make Your love the root and foundation of my life (Eph 3:17).*

Promise: *"God's word is living and effective, sharper than any two-edged sword. It penetrates and divides soul and spirit, joints and marrow; it judges the reflections and thoughts of the heart." —Heb 4:12*

Praise: *Alleluia! Jesus is the Resurrection and the Life (Jn 11:25). All glory be to Him!*

“REJOICE AND BE GLAD” | In the next few weeks we will be posting excerpts from the **APOSTOLIC EXHORTATION GAUDETE ET EXSULTATE OF THE HOLY FATHER POPE FRANCIS ON THE CALL TO HOLINESS IN TODAY’S WORLD.**

CHAPTER FOUR | SIGNS OF HOLINESS IN TODAY’S WORLD

JOY AND A SENSE OF HUMOUR

122. Far from being timid, morose, acerbic or melancholy, or putting on a dreary face, the saints are joyful and full of good humor. Though completely realistic, they radiate a positive and hopeful spirit. The Christian life is “joy in the Holy Spirit” (Rom 14:17), for “the necessary result of the love of charity is joy; since every lover rejoices at being united to the beloved... the effect of charity is joy”. [99] Having received the beautiful gift of God’s word, we embrace it “in much affliction, with joy inspired by the Holy Spirit” (1 Thess 1:6). If we allow the Lord to draw us out of our shell and change our lives, then we can do as Saint Paul tells us: “Rejoice in the Lord always; I say it again, rejoice!” (Phil 4:4).

123. The prophets proclaimed the times of Jesus, in which we now live, as a revelation of joy. “Shout and sing for joy!” (Is 12:6). “Get you up to a high mountain, O herald of good tidings to Zion; lift up your voice with strength, O herald of good tidings to Jerusalem!” (Is 40:9). “Break forth, O mountains, into singing! For the Lord has comforted his people, and he will have compassion on his afflicted” (Is 49:13). “Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Zion! Shout aloud, O daughter of Jerusalem! Behold, your king comes to you; triumphant and victorious is he” (Zech 9:9). Nor should we forget Nehemiah’s exhortation: “Do not be grieved, for the joy of the Lord is your strength!” (8:10).

124. Mary, recognizing the newness that Jesus brought, sang: “My spirit rejoices” (Lk 1:47), and Jesus himself “rejoiced in the Holy Spirit” (Lk 10:21). As he passed by, “all the people rejoiced” (Lk 13:17). After his resurrection, wherever the disciples went, there was “much joy” (Acts 8:8). Jesus assures us: “You will be sorrowful, but your sorrow will turn into joy... I will see you again and your hearts will rejoice, and no one will take your joy from you” (Jn 16:20.22). “These things I have spoken to you, that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be full” (Jn 15:11).

125. Hard times may come, when the cross casts its shadow, yet nothing can destroy the supernatural joy that “adapts and changes, but always endures, even as a flicker of light born of our personal certainty that, when everything is said and done, we are infinitely loved”. [100] That joy brings deep security, serene hope and a spiritual fulfilment that the world cannot understand or appreciate.

JESUS LIVING WITHIN US

When we gather around the Eucharistic table and eat from the same bread and drink from the same cup, saying, “This is the Body and Blood of Christ,” we become the living Christ, here and now.

Our faith in Jesus is not our belief that Jesus, the Son of God, lived long ago, performed great miracles, presented wise teachings, died for us on the cross, and rose from the grave. It first of all means that we fully accept the truth that Jesus lives within us and fulfills his divine ministry in and through us. This spiritual knowledge of the Christ living in us is what allows us to affirm fully the mystery of the incarnation, death, and resurrection as historic events. It is the Christ in us who reveals to us the Christ in history.

WHAT’S THE SMOKE FOR?

Dear Johan,

I was taught to genuflect before entering my pew in church. I am afraid not everyone does that anymore. Is that OK? Should I continue to genuflect?

Gentle Reader,

Sometimes we think that the liturgy begins with the opening song and procession. As a matter of fact, the liturgy begins much sooner than that. It begins when we get ready to make our way to church. From that moment on, we start transitioning from our daily world to the world of the liturgy. This process may involve getting ourselves and maybe our children ready. Then we make our way to church. We find a parking place, hopefully without much difficulty. We walk toward the church across a busy street or through a nicely landscaped garden. When we get to the doors of the church, the transition heightens. Pushing open the often heavy church doors, the wafts of incense and burning wax or the smell of evergreens or Easter lilies meets us.

At that moment we engage in two important transitional acts. First we make our way to the baptismal font, where we bless ourselves with holy water and remind ourselves of our baptismal rights and obligations. Then we proceed into the church proper and, before sitting or kneeling down in prayer, we genuflect as a sign of reverence toward the Blessed Sacrament, which is reserved in the tabernacle. In case the Blessed Sacrament is reserved in a separate chapel a profound bow toward the altar is appropriate as the altar is a symbol of Christ. Both are threshold gestures. They complete the transition from our daily life to our liturgical life, not that the one ever ignores the other.

These transitional gestures are extremely important. They express what we believe and they reinforce those beliefs. The loss of these gestures is not only a sign of the loss of reverence due the Blessed Sacrament; it will also compound that loss of reverence.

So to answer your question, please continue genuflecting and maybe add a visit to the baptismal font. Hopefully your great example will encourage others to follow suit.

Hoy aprendemos en la primera lectura que el espíritu de la sabiduría llega a los que lo invocan. La sabiduría, como la Palabra de Dios, lleva un mensaje de consuelo y a la vez constituye un gran desafío. La carta a los hebreos nos cuenta que la Palabra de Dios, que está empapada con la sabiduría de Dios, es “más penetrante que una espada de dos filos”. No podemos acobardarnos ante la sabiduría de Dios ni ante la palabra que tiene el poder de penetrar nuestro corazón y mente. Jesús, la Palabra viva de Dios, la encarnación de la sabiduría, le dice cosas fuertes y muy penetrantes al joven rico que acude a Jesús en busca de respuestas a sus dudas más profundas. Precisamente, cuando el joven pensaba que había hecho lo suficiente para cumplir los mandamientos de Dios, se le exigió más. Lo mismo sucede en nuestro caso.

**"¡LA MISERICORDIA TRIUNFA!" (VER STG 2:13)
"Que llegue hasta mí Tu misericordia, Señor" (Salmos 119:41).**

En la primera lectura eucarística y Evangelio de hoy, los cristianos gálatas y los fariseos reciben corrección de San Pablo y de Jesucristo, respectivamente. Estos grupos parecen haber fallado al comprender que Dios prefiere obrar por el amor misericordioso y bondadoso y no por medio de prácticas religiosas motivadoras para justificarnos ante el Señor.

Jesús desafía a los fariseos – como también a nosotros – así: "Vayan y aprendan qué significa: Yo quiero misericordia y no sacrificios" (Mt 9:13; véase también Os 6:6). Por lo tanto, oremos siempre las palabras del salmo responsorial de hoy, "Que llegue hasta mí Tu misericordia" con toda Tu tierna bondad y cariño "Señor" (Sal 119:41).

Ora humildemente con la Iglesia hoy: "Que llegue hasta nosotros Tu misericordia, al fiarnos completamente en Ti" (ver Sal 33:22).

Oración: *Que llegue hasta mi Tu misericordia, y no Tu justicia. Te abro mi vida y te pido salvación por Tu misericordia. Jesús pongo mi confianza Ti.*

Promesa: *La fe "obra por medio del amor" (Gál 5:6).*

Alabanza: *Antes de enviudar, santa Eduviges construyó un hospital. Después, entró al convento y se hizo monja.*
