TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

There's no more unusual setting to celebrate today's Feast of the Holy Family than Barcelona, Spain and the towering unfinished sandcastle known officially as the Temple Expiatori de la Sagrada Familia. In 1882, the plan was hatched to build a vast place of worship in reparation for the revolutionary and liberal leanings of the city. The modern artist Antoni Gaudi dedicated his life to the project, living in the building, attending Mass daily, and giving up his personal wealth. When people pressed him to pick up the pace, he responded, "My client is not in a hurry." (Gaudi's cause for beatification is moving along, and he could be the first professional artist and architect to be beatified.) The Spanish Civil War, a disaster for the Catholic Church in which thousands of priests, brothers, and nuns were murdered, halted work in 1935. In the 1950s work began anew, speeded up by computers in the 1980s. Still, the final stage of construction is not due to end until 2026. If the original methods had stayed in place, it would take several hundred more years to complete the plan. So far there are eight towers, with four to go. The highest steeple is three feet shorter than the nearest hill, since the architect didn't want his work to surpass God's artistry. The three faces of the basilica each have three doors, with the faces named Passion, Nativity, and Grace. The interior is crammed with geometric figures that almost seem to spin, crazy-quilt windows, spiral staircases, and jumbles of statues and figures. Although inspired by ancient Gothic cathedrals, the style is called Expressionist, and very little is left unexpressed by the masonry. If you can't afford a visit, Sagrada Familia maintains a web site, and virtual visits are free.

THE FREEDOM TO REFUSE LOVE | *Henri Nouwen Society*

Often hell is portrayed as a place of punishment and heaven as a place of reward. But this concept easily leads us to think about God as either a policeman, who tries to catch us when we make a mistake and send us to prison when our mistakes become too big, or a Santa Claus, who counts up all our good deeds and puts a reward in our stocking at the end of the year.

God, however, is neither a policeman nor a Santa Claus. God does not send us to heaven or hell depending on how often we obey or disobey. God is love and only love. In God there is no hatred, desire for revenge, or pleasure in seeing us punished. God wants to forgive, heal, restore, show us endless mercy, and see us come home. But just as the father of the prodigal son let his son make his own decision, God gives us the freedom to move away from God's love even at the risk of destroying ourselves. Hell is not God's choice. It is ours.

THE MOUNTAINTOP EXPERIENCE | *Henri Nouwen Society*

At some moments we experience complete unity within us and around us. This may happen when we stand on a mountaintop and are captivated by the view. It may happen when we witness the birth of a child or the death of a friend. It may happen when we have an intimate conversation or a family meal. It may happen in church during a service or in a quiet room during prayer. But whenever and however it happens we say to ourselves: "This is it ... everything fits ... all I ever hoped for is here."

This is the experience that Peter, James, and John had on the top of Mount Tabor when they saw the aspect of Jesus' face change and his clothing become sparkling white. They wanted that moment to last forever (see Luke 9:28-36). This is the experience of the fullness of time. These moments are given to us so that we can remember them when God seems far away and everything appears empty and useless. These experiences are true moments of grace.

AN EXPERIENCE OFFERED TO ALL | *Henri Nouwen Society*

Some people say: "I never had an experience of the fullness of time. ... I am just an ordinary person, not a mystic." Although some people have unique experiences of God's presence and, therefore have unique missions to announce God's presence to the world, all of us - whether learned or uneducated, rich or poor, visible or hidden - can receive the grace of seeing God in the fullness of time. This mystical experience, is not reserved for a few exceptional people. God wants to offer that gift in one way or another to all God's children.

But we must desire it. We must be attentive and interiorly alert. For some people the experience of the fullness of time comes in a spectacular way, as it did to St. Paul when he fell to the ground on his way to Damascus (Acts 9:3-4). But for some of us it comes like a murmuring sound or a gentle breeze touching our backs (1 Kings 19:13). God loves us all and wants us all to know this in a most personal way.

REFLECTIONS

THE REAL THING

"He came to the temple now, inspired by the Spirit, and when the parents brought in the Child Jesus to perform for Him the customary ritual of the law, he took Him in his arms and blessed God." —Luke 2:27-28

Some orthodox Jews have the custom of using the birth of a baby boy as an occasion to discourse on the coming of the Messiah. An older relative traditionally starts the conversation with the question: "Could this baby be the Messiah?" Then various relatives wax eloquently about the coming and the glories of the Messiah.

Some people may have thought that Simeon and Anna were only engaging in this traditional conversation when they were talking about the Child Jesus "to all who looked forward to the deliverance of Jerusalem" (Lk 2:38). Simeon and Anna may have then even more vehemently insisted that Jesus was "a revealing Light to the Gentiles, the Glory" of Israel (Lk 2:32). However, people may have thought this was part of the game. Then Simeon and Anna would have tried to tell them this wasn't a ritual, but the real thing. This Baby was the Messiah!

We face a similar situation in our day. When we proclaim Jesus as Messiah and Lord, people think this is merely the religious game and the standard church-talk. Yet we, like Simeon and Anna, must be filled with the Holy Spirit and proclaim that this is the real thing. Jesus is the Messiah. Christmas is real. God has become a man. We are saved. Jesus is Lord and God.

Prayer: Father, may our family life be so holy that it shouts that Jesus is the Messiah.

Promise: "He remembers forever His covenant which He made binding for a thousand generations." —Ps 105:8

Praise: Praise God our "Father from Whom every family in heaven and on earth takes its' name" (Eph 3:14-15).

REMUNERATION OF PRIESTS IN ACTIVE MINISTRY

Dear Parishioners,

After consultation and discussion, Bishop Soto has approved a revised Remuneration Policy for the Priests of the Diocese of Sacramento and promulgated it to be effective January 1, 2018. During the next few weeks, I will share with you some of the mains points.

The Remuneration of Priests in active ministry is broken into four categories:

1. Compensation
2. Benefits
3. Reimbursements
4. Entitlements

“ENTITLEMENTS”

The following entitlements are to be seen as a supplement to the existing compensation schedule for priests in active ministry.

17. Other Expenses

- **Personal supplies** - under no circumstances are parish funds to be used for personal supply items such as: soap, shampoo, shaving cream, toothpaste, etc. except to provide soap and shampoo for occasional guests.
- **Personal clothing** - under no circumstances are parish funds to be used for personal clothing.
- **Travel expenses** - under no circumstances are parish funds to be used for personal travel expenses even if the intention is to reimburse the parish for the costs at a later date.
- **Car maintenance** – under no circumstances are parish funds to be used to cover the costs associated with the maintenance of a priest's personal car, such as: road side service plans, oil changes, new tires, windshield repairs, etc.

18. Special Collections

- Permission from the Bishop is required prior to a priest having a special collection for his religious order or home parish. In no way should this special collection be of benefit to the priest.

CALENDAR OF EVENTS

JANUARY

THE EPIPHANY IN GERMANY

The custom in Germany is that of the children's festival between January 1-6 (Three Kings Day). After a service at the churches the children go from house to house to gather offerings for poor children in poor countries. They are dressed as the three kings and carry sticks with stars on the top. At the homes they sing songs and recite messages of Christmas. At each house they paint the letters "20+C+M+B+18" which are for the Latin **Christus Mansionem Benedicat** (Christ bless this house). At the same time the letters are the first letters of the names of the wise men: **Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar.** — *Christmas Stories from German Culture.*

BLESSING OF THE HOME AND HOUSEHOLD ON EPIPHANY

The leader makes the sign of the cross, and all reply, "Amen."

Leader: Let us praise God, who fills our hearts and homes with peace. Blessed be God forever.

All: Blessed be God forever.

Marking the of the Door

A traditional way of doing this is to use chalk to write above the home's entrance. It can also be written somewhere inside the home.

20+C +M+ B+18

The letters C, M, B have two meanings: They are the initials of the traditional names of the three magi: **Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar.** They also abbreviate the Latin words **Christus mansionem benedicat**, "May Christ bless the house."

The leader: The Word became flesh and made his dwelling place among us. It is Christ who enlightens our hearts and homes with his love. May all who enter this home find Christ's light and love.

One of those present or the leader reads a text of sacred Scripture, for example, Luke 19:1-9:

Listen to the words of the holy Gospel according to Luke:

Jesus came to Jericho and intended to pass through the town. Now a man there named Zacchaeus, who was a chief tax collector and also a wealthy man, was seeking to see who Jesus was; but he could not see him because of the crowd, for he was short in stature. So he ran ahead and climbed a sycamore tree in order to see Jesus, who was about to pass that way. When he reached the place, Jesus looked up and said to him, "Zacchaeus, come down quickly, for today I must stay at your house." And he came down quickly and received him with joy. When they all saw this, they began to grumble, saying, "He has gone to stay at the house of a sinner." But Zacchaeus stood there and said to the Lord, "Behold, half of my possessions, Lord, I shall give to the poor, and if I have extorted anything from anyone I shall repay it four times over." And Jesus said to him, "Today salvation has come to this house because this man too is a descendant of Abraham."

The intercessions are then said:

Leader: The Son of God made his home among us. With thanks and praise let us call upon him.

All: Stay with us, Lord.

Leader: Lord Jesus Christ, with Mary and Joseph you formed the Holy Family: remain in our home, that we may know you as our guest and honor you as our Head. We pray:

All: Stay with us, Lord.

Leader: Lord Jesus Christ, you had no place to lay your head, but in the spirit of poverty accepted the hospitality of your friends: grant that through our help the homeless may obtain proper housing. We pray:

All: Stay with us, Lord.

Leader: Lord Jesus Christ, the three kings presented their gifts to you in praise and adoration: grant that those living in this house may use their talents and abilities to your greater glory. We pray:

All: Stay with us, Lord.

All say Lord's Prayer: Our Father...

The leader says the prayer of blessing with hands joined:

Lord God of heaven and earth, you revealed your only-begotten Son to every nation
by the guidance of a star. Bless this house and all who inhabit it. Fill them (us) with the light of Christ, that their (our)
concern for others may reflect your love. We ask this through Christ our Lord. R/. Amen.

Leader: May Christ Jesus dwell with us, keep us from all harm, and make us one in mind and heart, now and forever.
R/. Amen.

UN ASUNTO REAL

"Conducido por el mismo Espíritu, fue al Templo, y cuando los padres de Jesús llevaron al niño para cumplir con él las prescripciones de la Ley, Simeón lo tomó en sus brazos y alabó a Dios" (Lucas 2:27-28).

Algunos judíos ortodoxos tienen la costumbre de usar el nacimiento de un niño como una ocasión para hablar sobre la venida del Mesías. Un pariente mayor tradicionalmente comienza la conversación con la pregunta: “¿Podría este bebé ser el Mesías?” Entonces varios parientes se refieren elocuentemente sobre la venida y las glorias del Mesías. Algunas personas pudieron haber pensado que Simeón y Ana solo estaban participando en esta conversación tradicional cuando hablaban del Niño Jesús “a todos los que esperaban la redención de Jerusalén” (Lc 2:38). Simeón y Ana quizás insistieron aún más vehementemente en que Jesús era “luz para iluminar a las naciones paganas y gloria de tu pueblo Israel” (Lc 2:32). Sin embargo, la gente puede haber pensado que esto era parte del juego. Entonces Simeón y Ana habrían tratado de decirles que esto no era un ritual, sino un asunto real. ¡Este Bebé era el Mesías!

Nos enfrentamos a una situación similar en nuestros días. Cuando proclamamos a Jesús como Mesías y Señor, la gente piensa que esto es meramente un juego religioso y la predica normal de la Iglesia. Sin embargo, como Simeón y Ana, debemos estar llenos del Espíritu Santo y proclamar que esto es un asunto real. Jesús es el Mesías. La Navidad es real. Dios se ha hecho hombre. Somos salvos. Jesús es Señor y Dios.

Oración: Padre, que nuestra vida familiar sea tan santa que grite que Jesús es el Mesías.

Promesa: “Él se acuerda eternamente de su alianza, de la palabra que dio por mil generaciones” (Sal 105:8).

Alabanza: Alabemos a nuestro Dios “Padre, de quien procede toda paternidad en el cielo y la tierra” (Ef 3:14-15).
