LOVE'S GROUND-BREAKING

"Please let me, your servant, have two mule-loads of earth, for I will no longer offer holocaust or sacrifice to any other god except to the Lord." —2 Kings 5:17

When Naaman, the healed Syrian general and leper, took two mule-loads of Jewish dirt back home with him, he was literally breaking new ground in his relationship with the Lord. We too must guard against "getting in a rut" in our love for the Lord. We must always be seeking to grow more deeply in love with Him, or we put ourselves in danger of falling away from loving Him with all our hearts and becoming lukewarm (see Rv 3:16). Hosea prophesied: "Break up for yourselves a new field, for it is time to seek the Lord, till He come and rain down justice upon you" (Hos 10:12). "Our God is a consuming Fire" (Heb 12:29), and we who are in love with Him want to be consumed by Him more and more. The Lord commands us: "Grow rather in grace, and in the knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ" (2 Pt 3:18). The Lord has taught us to pray to "experience this love which surpasses all knowledge" so that we "may attain to the fullness of God" (Eph 3:19).

The nature of love is always to seek a deeper love. May we pray: "O God, You are my God Whom I seek; for You my flesh pines and my soul thirsts" (Ps 63:2), and "Your kindness is a greater good than life" (Ps 63:4). By His grace, enter a new dimension of the mystery of God, Who is Love (1 Jn 4:8).

Prayer: *Father, I surrender myself to You and worship You, Who are Love (1 Jn 4:8).*

Promise: *"One of them, realizing that he had been cured, came back praising God in a loud voice. He threw himself on his face at the feet of Jesus and spoke His praises." —Lk 17:15-16*

WHAT'S THE SMOKE FOR?

Dear Johan,

Why does the priest drop a particle of the host in the wine at Communion time?

Gentle Reader,

This is a great example of how a ritual act can be introduced into the liturgy on the basis of a specific theology, how the act is retained in the liturgy even after having lost its original meaning, and how a new theology is attached to this ritual.

The specific ritual act you mention goes back to the early church. The bishop, as the successor of the apostles, was the one who presided over the community and over the celebration of the Eucharist, its primary symbol of unity. As Christianity spread throughout the Roman Empire, particularly outside of the cities, it became necessary for the bishops to send some of their priests into the country. These priests represented the bishop to the community and they presided over the celebration of the Eucharist on Sunday. As a symbol of ecclesiastical communion and unity, the bishop sent a part of the eucharistic bread that was consecrated at his Mass to the parishes in the hinterlands. The local priests would add this particle to the cup. This particle was called the fermentum or yeast.

Today, this particle no longer comes to us from the Eucharist celebrated by the bishop, although the theological memory and symbolic meaning still are residually present. It is now called the "commingling" and it primarily symbolizes the unity of the Body and Blood of Christ. It also symbolizes our sharing in the Body of Christ.

WHAT IS THE RELATIONSHIP OF EUCHARISTIC ADORATION TO THE MASS?

The celebration of the Eucharist in the sacrifice of the Mass is “truly the origin and purpose of the worship that is shown to the Eucharist outside Mass.” Eucharistic adoration extends Holy Communion in a lasting way and prepares us to participate more fully in the celebration of the Eucharistic mystery. It leads us to “acknowledge Christ’s marvelous presence in the sacrament” and “invites us to the spiritual union with him that culminates in sacramental communion.”

BIBLE STUDY ON KING DAVID | Tuesday, October 15, 22 & 29 at 9am

October 15: The Law of the Gift & Your Servant is listening

October 22: Warrior of God & Gather in Jerusalem

October 29: House of God & Absalom, my Son!

David is the paradigmatic king in the Old Testament. His kingship recalls that of Adam in the Garden of Eden, and yet it points toward the King par excellence, Jesus Christ. In David the King, Bishop Barron helps us to understand this pivotal figure in light of the first king and the King of kings.

Adam was the first king and steward of the rightly ordered Garden of Eden. He was called to govern the garden according to God’s mind and purpose, but by allowing negative influences to wreak havoc on Eden, he did not fulfill his kingly responsibility. Long after Adam, David emerged as the definitive king who would restore order in the Garden and bring the world under the lordship of God. But like Adam, David fell, and his reign ushered in a succession of compromised kings and rejected prophets.

The New Testament, however, foretold a son of David who would realize the fullness of Israelite kingship...but whose actual reign defied expectation.

King David causes us to look back toward Adam’s kingship and forward toward Christ the King, seeing Christ as the fulfillment of the Davidic line and the realization of the Kingdom of God on earth. <https://www.wofdigital.org/david-the-king>

¿TRANSFERENCIA O TRANSFORMACION?

"Luego volvió con toda su comitiva adonde estaba el hombre de Dios" (2 Reyes 5:15).

Después de haber sido curado de la lepra, Naamán regreso para dar gracias a Eliseo ofreciéndole un presente, pero Eliseo rehusó aceptarlo enviando a Naamán a su casa en Siria (2 Re 5:16,19). Pero ahí no terminó la historia, Guejazí, el sirviente de Eliseo, alcanzó a Naamán, y falsamente le dijo que su amo había cambiado de idea y que aceptaría el presente de Naamán y luego se quedó él con los regalos (2 Re 5:20). Por la mentira y avaricia de Guejazí, la lepra de Naamán no desapareció. Fue simplemente transferida a Guejazí (2 Re 5:27).

Mucha gente experimenta la misma cosa. Pecados, enfermedades y esclavitud son transferidas, aun cuando pareciera que han sido eliminados. Por ejemplo, aun cuando estemos muertos, ya hemos pasado genéticamente algunas enfermedades a nuestros descendientes. Peor que esto, aun cuando estemos muertos y arrepentidos de nuestros pecados, vemos nuestros pecados repetirse en nuestros hijos, amigos y otros a los cuales hemos influenciado. Por ejemplo, cuando un alcohólico deja de tomar, sus hijos pueden empezar a tomar. Cuando un problema esta aparentemente resuelto en una situación, el mismo problema surge de repente en otro lugar. Cuando nos damos cuenta de esto, estamos naturalmente deprimidos.

¿Hay alguna esperanza? Jesús es nuestra Esperanza. Jesús en el Calvario se transfirió todos nuestros pecados sobre sí mismo. "Pero él soportaba nuestros sufrimientos y cargaba con nuestras dolencias" (Is 53:4). "Él fue traspasado por nuestras rebeldías y triturado por nuestras iniquidades. El castigo que nos da la paz recayó sobre él y por sus heridas fuimos sanados" (Is 53:5)" y el Señor hizo recaer sobre él las iniquidades de todos nosotros" (Is 53:6). Regresa a Jesús para que así el pecado y sus consecuencias no regresen a ti.

Oración: Padre, por Fe y arrepentimiento pueda yo mantener las fallas de mi vieja naturaleza enterradas para que nunca regresen.

Promesa: "Uno de ellos, al comprobar que estaba curado, volvió atrás alabando a Dios en voz alta y se arrojó a los pies de Jesús con el rostro en tierra, dándole gracias. Era un samaritano" (Lc 17:15-16).

Alabanza: ¡Aleluya! ¡Jesús ha resucitado! ¡Él vive por siempre en Gloria!
