**THE TASK OF RECONCILIATION**

What is our task in this world as children of God and brothers and sisters of Jesus? Our task is reconciliation. Wherever we go we see divisions among people – in families, communities, cities, countries, and continents. All these divisions are tragic reflections of our separation from God. The truth that all people belong together as members of one family under God is seldom visible. Our sacred task is to reveal that truth in the reality of everyday life.

Why is that our task? Because God sent Christ to reconcile us with God and to give us the task of reconciling people with one another. As people reconcile with God through Christ we have been given the ministry of reconciliation" (see: 2 Corinthians 5:18). So whatever we do the main question is, Does it lead to reconciliation among people?

**THE GOVERNMENT OF GOD**

"His dominion is an everlasting dominion that shall not be taken away, His kingship shall not be destroyed." —Daniel 7:14

In heaven, the form of government in which we shall live eternally will not be a democracy, socialism, a Communist regime, or that of a tyrannical dictator. Jesus is King, that is, a Monarch, and He is a benevolent and sovereign Lord. We who believe in King Jesus will spend eternity with a blessed Ruler (1 Tm 6:15) Who loves us beyond measure.

Even those who have lived in a worldly monarchy or benevolent dictatorship will hardly be able to relate to the heavenly kingdom, for no one has even begun to imagine what our Ruler has in store for us (1 Cor 2:9). Earthly kings might be so lavish as to throw a seven-day party (Est 1:5); King Jesus gives an eternal wedding feast (Rv 19:9). Earthly rulers put to death those who try to kill them (Est A:13-14); Lord Jesus dies for us as we kill Him (Catechism, 598). Only a few people are allowed access to earthly rulers; everyone has access to King Jesus (Eph 2:18; Mt 11:28; Jn 6:37). Earthly rulers lord their authority over their subjects (Mt 20:25); Lord Jesus comes to serve His subjects and lay down His life out of love for us (Mt 20:28; Lk 22:27; Jn 10:15; 13:5).

Many in our secular world choose to serve gods of sex, money, power, greed, ambition, status, or wanton pleasure-seeking. Others are imprisoned under the rule of the harsh dictatorship of addiction, compulsion, abuse. "Decide today whom you will serve" (Jos 24:15). Give your life to Jesus, your King and Lord.

**Prayer:** *Christ the King, "Your kingdom come, Your will be done on earth as it is in heaven" (Mt 6:10).*

**Promise:** *"Anyone committed to the truth hears My voice." —Jn 18:37*

**Praise:** *Praise You, risen Jesus, my Lord, my God, my All. I love You forever. Alleluia!*

**CLAIMING OUR RECONCILIATION**

How do we work for reconciliation? First and foremost by claiming for ourselves that God through Christ has reconciled us to God. It is not enough to believe this with our heads. We have to let the truth of this reconciliation permeate every part of our beings. As long as we are not fully and thoroughly convinced that we have been reconciled with God, that we are forgiven, that we have received new hearts, new spirits, new eyes to see, and new ears to hear, we continue to create divisions among people because we expect from them a healing power they do not possess.

Only when we fully trust that we belong to God and can find in our relationship with God all that we need for our minds, hearts, and souls, can we be truly free in this world and be ministers of reconciliation. This is not easy; we readily fall back into self-doubt and self-rejection. We need to be constantly reminded through God's Word, the sacraments, and the love of our neighbours that we are indeed reconciled.

**"REJOICE AND BE GLAD"** | In the next few weeks we will be posting excerpts from the **APOSTOLIC EXHORTATION GAUDETE ET EXSULTATE OF THE HOLY FATHER POPE FRANCIS ON THE CALL TO HOLINESS IN TODAY'S WORLD.**  
**CHAPTER FOUR | SIGNS OF HOLINESS IN TODAY'S WORLD**

### **IN CONSTANT PRAYER**

147. Finally, though it may seem obvious, we should remember that holiness consists in a habitual openness to the transcendent, expressed in prayer and adoration. The saints are distinguished by a spirit of prayer and a need for communion with God. They find an exclusive concern with this world to be narrow and stifling, and, amid their own concerns and commitments, they long for God, losing themselves in praise and contemplation of the Lord. I do not believe in holiness without prayer, even though that prayer need not be lengthy or involve intense emotions.

148. Saint John of the Cross tells us: "Endeavour to remain always in the presence of God, either real, imaginative, or unitive, insofar as is permitted by your works".[109] In the end, our desire for God will surely find expression in our daily lives: "Try to be continuous in prayer, and in the midst of bodily exercises do not leave it. Whether you eat, drink, talk with others, or do anything, always go to God and attach your heart to him". [110]

149. For this to happen, however, some moments spent alone with God are also necessary. For Saint Teresa of Avila, prayer "is nothing but friendly intercourse, and frequent solitary converse, with him who we know loves us".[111] I would insist that this is true not only for a privileged few, but for all of us, for "we all have need of this silence, filled with the presence of him who is adored".[112] Trust-filled prayer is a response of a heart open to encountering God face to face, where all is peaceful and the quiet voice of the Lord can be heard in the midst of silence.

150. In that silence, we can discern, in the light of the Spirit, the paths of holiness to which the Lord is calling us. Otherwise, any decisions we make may only be window-dressing that, rather than exalting the Gospel in our lives, will mask or submerge it. For each disciple, it is essential to spend time with the Master, to listen to his words, and to learn from him always. Unless we listen, all our words will be nothing but useless chatter.

151. We need to remember that "contemplation of the face of Jesus, died and risen, restores our humanity, even when it has been broken by the troubles of this life or marred by sin. We must not domesticate the power of the face of Christ".[113] So let me ask you: Are there moments when you place yourself quietly in the Lord's presence, when you calmly spend time with him, when you bask in his gaze? Do you let his fire inflame your heart? Unless you let him warm you more and more with his love and tenderness, you will not catch fire. How will you then be able to set the hearts of others on fire by your words and witness? If, gazing on the face of Christ, you feel unable to let yourself be healed and transformed, then enter into the Lord's heart, into his wounds, for that is the abode of divine mercy.[114]

152. I ask that we never regard prayerful silence as a form of escape and rejection of the world around us. The Russian pilgrim, who prayed constantly, says that such prayer did not separate him from what was happening all around him. "Everybody was kind to me; it was as though everyone loved me... Not only did I feel [happiness and consolation] in my own soul, but the whole outside world also seemed to me full of charm and delight".[115]

## WHAT'S THE SMOKE FOR?

Dear Johan,

*Why is it that so many people leave church before the end of Mass? I am saddened to see people leave as soon as they receive Communion.*

Gentle Reader,

Last week, as I was trying to sing the closing hymn, people around me were putting on their coats and obviously were waiting for me to let them out of the pew. Not only did they not stay till the end, but they made it impossible for me to pay attention till the end. What difference do a few minutes make? Unless they had a soufflé waiting in the oven, I saw no reason for their hurry.

I have always been annoyed by this. When I was a teenager my aunt found me making a sign saying "leaving already?" My plan was to wait outside church with the sign so early departees would be shamed by my sign. Thankfully, my wise aunt talked me out of it. Since those days I have softened quite a bit. So, I am not for harsh words or placing liturgical watchdogs at all doors, but I must admit that I am disheartened by the so-called "post-communion exodus." How come people don't want to spend some quiet time after receiving Communion? This is not a liturgical drive-through.

The liturgical patience of those who stay after receiving Communion is often tested by the endless announcements after Communion. Who can blame them? Even I am tested by those. But I persevere, why can't others?

What saddens me most, though, is that our liturgical assembly seems fractured when people start leaving. It is a bit like people leaving early at a dinner party. That does not speak well of the party. I would feel horrible as the host. I feel horrible as a fellow guest.

I suspect the only thing we can do is make the liturgy as beautiful as we can so people will want to stay. And after that, it is really out of our hands.

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## LETTING GO OF OLD HURTS

One of the hardest things in life is to let go of old hurts. We often say, or at least think: "What you did to me and my family, my ancestors, or my friends I cannot forget or forgive. ... One day you will have to pay for it." Sometimes our memories are decades, even centuries, old and keep asking for revenge.

Holding people's faults against them often creates an impenetrable wall. But listen to Paul: "For anyone who is in Christ, there is a new creation: the old order is gone and a new being is there to see. It is all God's work" (2 Corinthians 5:17-18). Indeed, we cannot let go of old hurts, but God can. Paul says: "God was in Christ reconciling the world to himself, not holding anyone's fault against them" (2 Corinthians 5:19). It is God's work, but we are God's ministers, because the God who reconciled the world to God entrusted to us "the message of reconciliation" (2 Corinthians 5:19). This message calls us to let go of old hurts in the Name of God. It is the message our world most needs to hear.

Los gobernantes terrenales dominan a sus súbditos con su autoridad (Mt 20:25); el Señor Jesús viene a servir a Sus súbditos y da Su vida por amor a nosotros (Mt 20:28; Lc 22:27; Jn 10:15; 13:5).

Muchos en nuestro mundo secular eligen servir a los dioses del sexo, el dinero, el poder, la codicia, la ambición, el estado o la búsqueda gratuita de placer. Otros están encarcelados bajo la dominación de la difícil dictadura de la adicción, la compulsión y el abuso. "Elian hoy a quién servirán" (Jos 24:15). Entrega tu vida a Jesús, tu Rey y Señor.
