



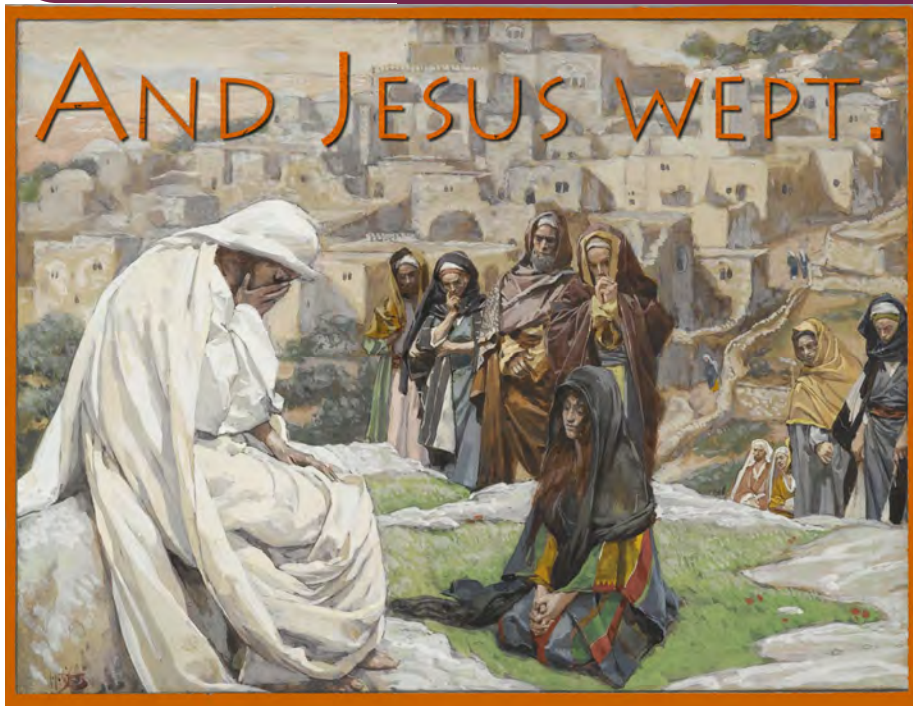

Celebrated on the Third, Fourth, and Fifth Sundays of Lent.

Reflecting on the Gospels for the Third, Fourth and Fifth Sundays of Lent

What are the "Scrutinies"?

These very special rites are celebrated on the middle three Sundays of Lent, at liturgies where the Elect are present. The Elect are those in our midst who are preparing for Baptism. Part of their journey to the font is that they have been received among us, the Rite of Acceptance, and they have been enrolled in the Book of the Elect in the Rite of Election.

Even if these rites are not celebrated at the liturgy we attend, or not celebrated in our parish or congregation at all, it can be wonderful to reflect upon the journey these Elect are making during Lent, as an inspiration and source of renewal for us in our journey.

These are ancient rites and they may, at first, seem strange to us. But they are profoundly rooted in our human experience. We need to examine (scrutinize) how we are, the areas of our lives where we are tempted, or seriously sin in what we do and what we fail to do. We really need healing and the strength that can come from the support of our sisters and brothers.

5 SUNDAY A: THE RAISING OF LAZARUS, FR JOSEPH SEBASTIAN CMI.

We are now on the fifth Sunday of Lent. Next week is Palm Sunday. This week Jesus is going to the tomb of someone who needs to be brought back to life. Next week he himself will be in the tomb. Jesus knows that he is going to be killed by the people whom he has helped. He dared to continue helping. Their actions did not block Jesus from doing good.

First, Lazarus in this passage is not the Lazarus in the story of a rich man. That was a fictional Lazarus that had nothing to do with Martha's brother whom Jesus raised.

Let us look at the last five weeks of the Gospel.

- 1) Temptation in the desert.
- 2) Transfiguration on the mountain.
- 3) The encounter with a Samaritan woman near Jacobs Well.
- 4) Healing the man that was born blind.
- 5) The raising of Lazarus.

All these passages relate to Easter Vigil.

For the last two weeks we have seen Jesus as living water, and as the light of the world. During the Easter Vigil we bless the water for baptism, as well as the paschal candle representing Christ, and finally today the raising of Lazarus, which connects new birth in baptism.

We only see once in the gospel Jesus crying, and it is in today's gospel, because of the death of his beloved friend. At first, I really did not understand why he was crying. Jesus was given the news that his beloved friend was ill. Suppose someone close to you is taken to the ER, because of an accident or emergency. What should we do? We try to get to them even if there is nothing we can do. Doctors will take care of our loved ones. But here, Jesus delayed his arrival, and in our eyes that was sure to end up in disaster. God had a different plan, a better and extraordinary plan. This plan was the revealing of the glory of God as Jesus's life purpose.

In the gospels we see three different resurrections by Jesus. The first was a 12-year-old girl; the daughter of Jairus. The second, the son of the poor widow in Naim, and finally Lazarus. These are three different situations. The first one has just died. The second one was on the way to the burial ground, and the third decayed or disintegrated. In all these scenarios Jesus revealed his power, which means he had access to all of life's situations. According to Jewish belief, they have up to 3 days while the spirit hovers over the body and can rejoin the living. After 3 days the spirit leaves the body forever.

St. Augustine compared it with 3 sinful situations in our lives. The first sin is in our heart. The second sin is the influence from outside. The third is the chronic sinful life. The good news is that Jesus can do miracles for us!

What is death, and what are the different kinds of death? When we refer to death we think of just physical death alone. However, there are other deaths like spiritual death, emotional death, and social death etc.

We are dead to the person from whom our heart has strayed. A dead person does not speak, smile, or help others. This is applicable in our relationship with God and others. If we do not communicate and pray to God, we are spiritually dead. If our heart has strayed away from our parents, children, and friends we are dead to them. We need to restore the relationship by coming back to communicating with God and others.

We see Martha, Lazarus's sister, stopping Jesus and saying, "It's already been four days after death, there could be a bad smell." The people that are close to us would recognize our death by our bad actions.

Let us see the three stages of the resurrection of Jesus:

The stone is removed from the entrance. Jesus did not roll the stone away; he could have done it with a word, but he asked others to roll it away. Jesus uses ministers. He has people who are willing to do good work to help others. Let us be among those who are helping to roll the stone from the life of others.

Calling out our name. Jesus is calling out our names constantly to come out of our dead situations. Of course, we have stones that block us and are kept...our anger, vengeance, impatience, hatred, unforgiveness etc. These block and prevent us from coming out of difficult situations.

Unbound, unite. Jesus is not going to remove the bandage. He will again seek the help of others to unite. If someone answers the call of Jesus and tries to come out of the situation Jesus will send people to facilitate their movements. We belong to that category of people who are trying to liberate others. We do not judge and criticize others when they want to come out of difficult situations. We are his ministers.

Finally, and the most important thing is, when we pray, we may not get an immediate reply from God. In human ways, four days after death there is no hope of getting life back. It is the dead end, but God has a different and extraordinary plan for you when your prayers are immediately answered. It could be for your soul and not for your body.

In both situations, the daughter of Jairus and Lazarus, Jesus received the news when they were ill. However, he delayed but did not deny them his presence. If Jesus went immediately, it would be just a healing like many other healings he performed. When Jesus was late it was a mega super miracle raising them from the dead! So, when your prayers are not receiving an answer in the way and time you expect, that just shows God has some other, better, plans for us, which are beyond our understanding, and all for the glory of God.

May God bless you all. Amen.

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A GUIDE TO CONFESSION

(take this with you ... it's really okay)



BEFORE YOU GO

Examine your conscience, that is, reflect on what sins you've committed. To guide you, just Google "examination of conscience" and you'll find resources to help you. It's even all right to make a list to bring with you if that helps.



INTRODUCTION

When you come before the priest, begin by making the Sign of the Cross (praying the words out loud), and continue by saying, "Bless me, Father, I have sinned. It has been (how long) since my last confession. These are my sins..."



CONFESSION

List the sins you've committed that came to mind during your examination of conscience. Don't be too general ("I haven't been a good person"), but a lot of detail isn't necessary (you don't need to tell the whole story of how a sin came about). If you're not sure if something is a sin, ask the priest. This isn't counseling, so unless you ask, the priest likely won't give you advice. He'll just move on to ...



PENANCE

The priest will suggest something for you to do or pray as a response to God's mercy. You'll have to remember what this is and do it after the confession is over, so pay attention.



ACT OF CONTRITION

The priest will then ask you to pray out loud your "Act of Contrition," to demonstrate your sorrow for your sins: "My God, I am sorry for my sins with all my heart. In choosing to do wrong and failing to do good, I have sinned against you whom I should love above all things. I firmly intend, with your help, to do penance, to sin no more, and to avoid whatever leads me to sin. Our Savior Jesus Christ suffered and died for us. In his name, my God, have mercy."



ABSOLUTION

Don't get up to leave after that prayer, because the best part is yet to come: The priest will extend his hands in your direction and he will pray the Prayer of Absolution: "God, the Father of Mercies, through the death and resurrection of his Son, has reconciled the world to himself and sent the Holy Spirit among us for the forgiveness of sins. Through the ministry of the Church, may God grant you pardon and peace. And I absolve you from your sins in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen." You respond: "Amen."

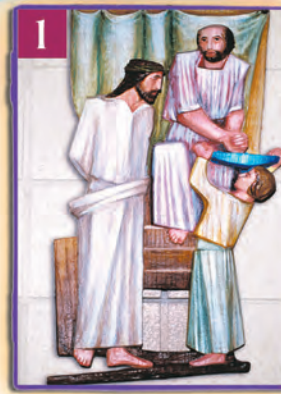


CONCLUSION

The priest will then likely say something like, "God has freed you from your sin. Go in Peace." To which you can respond: "Thanks be to God." Don't forget to do your penance. If it is saying certain prayers, it's best to do it right away in the church before you forget.

Reflections on the Stations of the Cross

First Station ~ Jesus is condemned to die

Jesus, it is hard to imagine how you stayed quiet when so many people wanted to hurt you. Be with me when I feel afraid. Remind me to trust in God's love for me.

Second Station ~ Jesus takes up his cross

Jesus, the cross was such a heavy load for you to bear. Yet you took it on your shoulders and carried it bravely. Give me courage when I have to face something difficult in my life.

Third Station ~ Jesus falls the first time

Jesus, the weight of the cross caused you to fall down. Lift me up when I make mistakes that cause hurt to others or to myself. Help me to trust in your forgiving heart.

Fourth Station ~ Jesus meets his mother

Jesus, you saw the sadness in Mary's face when you met her on the road. How painful it was to see you suffering. Fill my heart with kindness when I meet someone who is sad.

Fifth Station ~ Simon helps Jesus carry his cross

Jesus, Simon's help in carrying the cross must have been such a relief. Remind me how important it is to be helpful when others need my assistance.

Sixth Station ~ Veronica wipes the face of Jesus

Jesus, did you expect a strange woman to come forward to wipe your bleeding face? It was a simple thing to do and yet it provided so much comfort. Show me small ways I can soothe the pain of others.

Seventh Station ~ Jesus falls a second time

Jesus, once again you fell to the ground. Even with Simon's help, it was a struggle to get up and continue your journey. Strengthen me when I am tempted to give up and remind me to rely on your love when I need to keep going.

Eighth Station ~ Jesus meets the women of Jerusalem

Jesus, even in your anguish you stopped to offer encouragement to the grieving women. Help me to be a comfort to others.

Reflections on the Stations of the Cross

Ninth Station ~ Jesus falls the third time

Jesus, this fall must have been the hardest. You were tired and in great pain yet you struggled to your feet and resumed your journey. Inspire me to keep going when the way grows long and weary.

Tenth Station ~ Jesus is stripped of his garments

Jesus, how humiliating it was to be stripped of your clothes in front of a large crowd. Remind me to show respect to others and to do nothing that robs them of their dignity.

Eleventh Station ~ Jesus is nailed to the cross

Jesus, I can't imagine the agony of having nails driven through my hands and feet. Yet, in the midst of your pain you forgave those who did this terrible deed. Grant me the courage to forgive when I am wounded by others.

Twelfth Station ~ Jesus dies on the cross

Jesus, with a great sigh you gave up your spirit. Show me how to surrender in small ways so that each day I make an offering of my life to you.

Thirteenth Station ~ Jesus is taken down from the cross

Jesus, it was heartbreaking for Mary to hold your lifeless body in her arms. Comfort me when I grieve over the loss of someone I love.

Fourteenth Station ~ Jesus is laid in the tomb

Jesus, how dark and lonely it must have been to walk away from the tomb and yet your friends would know great hope in the days ahead. Remind me of the light that emerges from darkness because of your great love. May my faith in you grow stronger each day.

Background on the Stations of the Cross

The origin of the Stations of the Cross stretches back to the Crusades when, as a result of the conquering of the Holy Land, Christians began making pilgrimages to the sacred sites where Jesus lived, suffered, died, and rose from the dead. Today, the Stations are depicted in many ways, including paintings, sculpture, and stained glass.

The meditations for this prayer practice vary as the tragic walk from condemnation to the cross unfolds. As pilgrims on a journey of faith, we use the Stations of the Cross to reflect on the ways we suffer humiliation, rejection, suffering, and death. This makes the Stations more than a historic re-creation of Jesus' walk to Golgotha. The prayers draw us into considering how Jesus accompanies those who suffer in today's world. The injustice of being arrested and falsely accused, the pain of enduring mockery, torture, and being forced to carry the means of one's own death, the grace of small acts of compassion in the midst of an agonizing climb, and the surrender of heart and soul to God's infinite mercy all draw us into a story that is as contemporary as it is ancient.

The Stations of the Cross are one of many spiritual practices that we can reflect on as we make our way through Lent. Following in the footsteps of Jesus, we can seek ways to find and extend mercy to those who shoulder heavy loads. We can fast from destructive, cynical, or critical thoughts and behaviors, and embrace ones laced with gratitude, humility, and compassion. And we can pray for understanding and generous hearts so that we emerge from Lent, living as disciples of Jesus Christ.

5 DOMINGO A: LA RESURRECCIÓN DE LÁZARO, P. JOSÉ SEBASTIÁN CMI.

Ya estamos en el quinto domingo de Cuaresma. La próxima semana es el Domingo de Ramos. Esta semana Jesús irá a la tumba de alguien que necesita ser resucitado. La próxima semana él mismo estará en la tumba. Jesús sabe que las personas a las que ha ayudado lo van a matar. Se atrevió a seguir ayudando. Sus acciones no impidieron que Jesús hiciera el bien.

Primero, Lázaro en este pasaje no es el Lázaro en la historia de un hombre rico. Ese era un Lázaro ficticio que no tenía nada que ver con el hermano de Marta a quien Jesús crió.

Miremos las últimas cinco semanas del Evangelio.

- 1.) Tentación en el desierto.
- 2.) Transfiguración en la montaña.
- 3.) El encuentro con una mujer samaritana cerca de Jacobs Well.
- 4.) Sanar al hombre que nació ciego.
- 5.) La resurrección de Lázaro.

Todos estos pasajes se relacionan con la Vigilia Pascual.

Durante las últimas dos semanas hemos visto a Jesús como agua viva y como la luz del mundo. Durante la Vigilia Pascual bendicimos el agua para el bautismo, así como el cirio pascual que representa a Cristo, y finalmente hoy la resurrección de Lázaro, que conecta el nuevo nacimiento en el bautismo.

Sólo vemos una vez en el evangelio a Jesús llorando, y es en el evangelio de hoy, por la muerte de su amado amigo. Al principio realmente no entendía por qué lloraba. Jesús recibió la noticia de que su amado amigo estaba enfermo. Supongamos que alguien cercano a usted es llevado a urgencias debido a un accidente o emergencia. ¿Qué debemos hacer? Intentamos llegar a ellos incluso si no hay nada que podamos hacer. Los médicos cuidarán de nuestros seres queridos. Pero aquí Jesús retrasó su llegada y, a nuestros ojos, eso seguramente terminaría en un desastre. Dios tenía un plan diferente, un plan mejor y extraordinario. Este plan fue la revelación de la gloria de Dios como el propósito de vida de Jesús.

En los evangelios vemos tres resurrecciones diferentes de Jesús. La primera fue una niña de 12 años; la hija de Jairo. El segundo, el hijo de la viuda pobre de Naim, y finalmente Lázaro. Son tres situaciones diferentes. El primero acaba de morir. El segundo estaba camino al cementerio y el tercero se pudrió o se desintegró. En todos estos escenarios Jesús reveló su poder, lo que significa que tuvo acceso a todas las situaciones de la vida. Según la creencia judía, tienen hasta 3 días mientras el espíritu se cierne sobre el cuerpo y puede reunirse con los vivos. Después de 3 días el espíritu abandona el cuerpo para siempre.

San Agustín lo comparó con 3 situaciones pecaminosas de nuestra vida. El primer pecado está en nuestro corazón. El segundo pecado es la influencia del exterior. La tercera es la vida pecaminosa crónica. ¡La buena noticia es que Jesús puede hacer milagros por nosotros!

¿Qué es la muerte y cuáles son los diferentes tipos de muerte? Cuando nos referimos a la muerte pensamos sólo en la muerte física. Sin embargo, hay otras muertes como la muerte espiritual, la muerte emocional y la muerte social, etc.

Estamos muertos para la persona de quien nuestro corazón se ha desviado. Un muerto no habla, no sonríe ni ayuda a los demás. Esto es aplicable en nuestra relación con Dios y los demás. Si no nos comunicamos y oramos a Dios, estamos espiritualmente muertos. Si nuestro corazón se ha desviado de nuestros padres, hijos y amigos, estamos muertos para ellos. Necesitamos restaurar la relación volviendo a comunicarnos con Dios y con los demás.

Vemos a Marta, la hermana de Lázaro, deteniendo a Jesús y diciendo: "Ya han pasado cuatro días desde la muerte, puede haber mal olor". Las personas que están cerca de nosotros reconocerían nuestra muerte por nuestras malas acciones.

Veamos las tres etapas de la resurrección de Jesús:

- 1.) Se retira la piedra de la entrada. Jesús no quitó la piedra; Podría haberlo hecho con una palabra, pero pidió a otros que la eliminaran. Jesús usa ministros. Tiene personas que están dispuestas a hacer un buen trabajo para ayudar a los demás. Estemos entre aquellos que están ayudando a quitar la piedra de la vida de los demás.
- 2.) Gritar nuestro nombre. Jesús está gritando nuestros nombres constantemente para salir de nuestras situaciones muertas. Por supuesto, tenemos piedras que nos bloquean y se guardan... nuestra ira, venganza, impaciencia, odio, falta de perdón, etc. Estas nos bloquean y nos impiden salir de situaciones difíciles.
- 3.) Sin ataduras, unir. Jesús no va a quitar la venda. Volverá a buscar la ayuda de otros para unirse. Si alguien responde al llamado de Jesús e intenta salir de la situación, Jesús enviará personas para facilitar sus movimientos. Pertenece a esa categoría de personas que intentan liberar a los demás. No juzgamos ni criticamos a los demás cuando quieren salir de situaciones difíciles. Somos sus ministros.

Finalmente, y lo más importante, es que cuando oramos, es posible que no obtengamos una respuesta inmediata de Dios. En el sentido humano, cuatro días después de la muerte no hay esperanza de recuperar la vida. Es un callejón sin salida, pero Dios tiene un plan diferente y extraordinario para usted cuando sus oraciones sean respondidas de inmediato. Podría ser para tu alma y no para tu cuerpo.

En ambas situaciones, la hija de Jairo y Lázaro, Jesús

Séptima estación ~ Jesús cae por segunda vez

Jesús, una vez más, caíste al suelo. Incluso con la ayuda de Simón, fue una lucha para levantarte y continuar tu jornada. Dame fuerzas cuando me sienta tentado a renunciar y recuérdame confiar en tu amor cuando necesite seguir adelante.

Octava estación ~ Jesús se encuentra con las mujeres de Jerusalén

Jesús, incluso en tu angustia te detuviste para ofrecer aliento a las mujeres afligidas. Ayúdame a ser un consuelo para los demás.

Novena estación ~ Jesús cae por tercera vez

Jesús, esta caída debió haber sido la más difícil. Estabas cansado y con mucho dolor y aun así luchaste para seguir en pie y reanudar tu jornada. Inspírame para seguir adelante cuando el camino sea largo y fatigante.

Décima estación ~ Jesús es despojado de sus vestiduras

Jesús, ¡qué humillante fue ser despojado de tus vestiduras delante de una gran multitud! Recuérdame mostrar respeto a los demás y no hacer nada que les robe su dignidad.

Undécima estación ~ Jesús es clavado en la cruz

Jesús, no puedo imaginar la agonía de tener mis manos y pies traspasados por clavos. Sin embargo, en medio de tu dolor perdonaste a los que hicieron esta terrible acción. Concédeme el valor de perdonar cuando soy herido por otros.

Duodécima estación ~ Jesús muere en la cruz

Jesús, con un gran suspiro entregaste tu espíritu. Muéstrame cómo entregarme en pequeñas maneras para que cada día haga una ofrenda de mi vida a ti.

Decimotercera estación ~ Jesús es bajado de la cruz

Jesús, me rompió el corazón ver a María sosteniendo tu cuerpo sin vida en sus brazos. Consuélame cuando me lamente por la pérdida de alguien a quien amo.

Decimocuarta estación ~ Jesús es colocado en el sepulcro

Jesús, ¡qué oscuro y solitario debió haber sido alejarse de la tumba! Sin embargo, tus amigos conocerían la gran esperanza en los días venideros. Recuérdame la luz que emerge de la oscuridad debido a tu gran amor. Que mi fe en ti crezca más fuerte cada día.

Antecedentes del vía crucis

El origen del vía crucis se remonta a las Cruzadas cuando, como resultado de la conquista de la Tierra Santa, los cristianos comenzaron a hacer peregrinaciones a los lugares santos donde Jesús vivió, sufrió, murió y resucitó de entre los muertos. Hoy en día, el vía crucis es representado de muchas formas, incluyendo pinturas, esculturas y vitrales.

Las meditaciones de esta devoción varían de acuerdo al trágico camino que transcurre desde la condena hasta la cruz. Como peregrinos en una jornada de fe, utilizamos el vía crucis para reflexionar sobre las formas en que sufrimos humillación, rechazo, sufrimiento y muerte. Esto hace al vía crucis algo más que una recreación histórica del camino de Jesús al calvario. Las oraciones nos llevan a considerar cómo Jesús acompaña a los que sufren en el mundo actual. La injusticia de ser detenido y acusado falsamente, el dolor de la burla persistente, la tortura y el ser forzado a cargar nuestra propia muerte. La gracia de los pequeños actos de compasión en medio de una escalada agonizante y la entrega total del alma y el corazón a la misericordia infinita de Dios nos llevan a una historia que es tan contemporánea como antigua.

El vía crucis es una de las muchas devociones espirituales con las que podemos reflexionar mientras nos abrimos al camino durante la Cuaresma. Siguiendo los pasos de Jesús, podemos buscar maneras de encontrar y extender la misericordia a los que asumen cargas pesadas. Podemos renunciar a los pensamientos y comportamientos destructivos, cínicos o críticos y acoger con gratitud, humildad y compasión. Y podamos orar por la comprensión y los corazones generosos para que salgamos de la Cuaresma, viviendo como discípulos de Jesucristo.

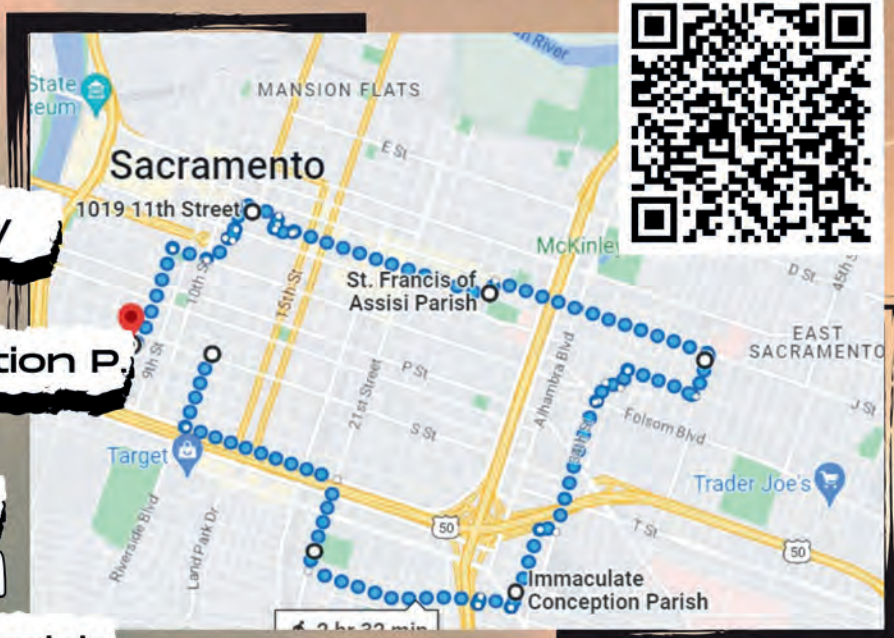
