THE PATH OF HOLINESS

"Who can ascend the mountain of the Lord? Or who may stand in His holy place?" —Psalm 24:3

When we are baptized, we become saints, that is, we become holy. We receive a new nature (see Gal 6:15) and become sharers in the divine nature (2 Pt 1:4). In Baptism, we begin the process of becoming holy, that is, of being like God (1 Jn 3:2). To grow in holiness, we should renew our Baptisms daily and continue to accept Jesus as our Lord and Savior (see 2 Pt 2:20). Our lives will be a "great period of trial" (Rv 7:14). By turning to the Lord in these trials, we will grow in holiness and in the desire to be holy.

On the path of holiness, we will imitate Jesus more closely. We will be pure as He is pure (1 Jn 3:3). By His grace, we will become holy in every aspect of our conduct "after the likeness of the Holy One Who called" us (1 Pt 1:15). As we grow holier, we will live the Beatitudes and even become worthy of being persecuted for the sake of the gospel (Mt 5:11). Finally, we will either die a holy death and see the all-holy God immediately and forever, or we will see Him after becoming purified and more holy in Purgatory.

The purpose of our lives is to become holy. We are naturally afraid of the adventure of becoming holy. However, the Lord will give us His grace to want to be holy more than we want anything else in life.

Prayer: *Father, may I desire to be holy more than to breathe.*

Promise: *"See what love the Father has bestowed on us in letting us be called children of God! Yet that is what we are. The reason the world does not recognize us is that it never recognized the Son." —1 Jn 3:1*

Praise: *"Holy, holy, holy, is the Lord God almighty, He Who was, and Who is, and Who is to come!" (Rv 4:8)*

“REJOICE AND BE GLAD” | In the next few weeks we will be posting excerpts from the **APOSTOLIC EXHORTATION *GAUDETE ET EXSULTATE* OF THE HOLY FATHER POPE FRANCIS ON THE CALL TO HOLINESS IN TODAY’S WORLD. CHAPTER FOUR | SIGNS OF HOLINESS IN TODAY’S WORLD**

BOLDNESS AND PASSION

129. Holiness is also *parrhesia*: **it is boldness**, an impulse to evangelize and to leave a mark in this world. To allow us to do this, Jesus himself comes and tells us once more, serenely yet firmly: “Do not be afraid” (*Mk 6:50*). “I am with you always, to the end of the world” (*Mt 28:20*). These words enable us to go forth and serve with the same courage that the Holy Spirit stirred up in the Apostles, impelling them to proclaim Jesus Christ. Boldness, enthusiasm, the freedom to speak out, apostolic fervour, all these are included in the word *parrhesía*. The Bible also uses this word to describe the freedom of a life open to God and to others (cf. *Acts 4:29, 9:28, 28:31; 2 Cor 3:12; Eph 3:12; Heb 3:6, 10:19*).

130. Blessed Paul VI, in referring to obstacles to evangelization, spoke of a lack of fervour (*parrhesía*) that is “all the more serious because it comes from within”. [103] How often we are tempted to keep close to the shore! Yet the Lord calls us to put out into the deep and let down our nets (cf. *Lk 5:4*). He bids us spend our lives in his service. Clinging to him, we are inspired to put all our charisms at the service of others. May we always feel compelled by his love (*2 Cor 5:14*) and say with Saint Paul: “Woe to me if I do not preach the Gospel” (*1 Cor 9:16*).

131. Look at Jesus. His deep compassion reached out to others. It did not make him hesitant, timid or self-conscious, as often happens with us. Quite the opposite. His compassion made him go out actively to preach and to send others on a mission of healing and liberation. Let us acknowledge our weakness, but allow Jesus to lay hold of it and send us too on mission. We are weak, yet we hold a treasure that can enlarge us and make those who receive it better and happier. Boldness and apostolic courage are an essential part of mission.

132. *Parrhesía* is a seal of the Spirit; it testifies to the authenticity of our preaching. It is a joyful assurance that leads us to glory in the Gospel we proclaim. It is an unshakeable trust in the faithful Witness who gives us the certainty that nothing can “separate us from the love of God” (*Rom 8:39*).

133. We need the Spirit’s prompting, lest we be paralyzed by fear and excessive caution, lest we grow used to keeping within safe bounds. Let us remember that closed spaces grow musty and unhealthy. When the Apostles were tempted to let themselves be crippled by danger and threats, they joined in prayer to implore *parrhesía*: “And now, Lord, look upon their threats, and grant to your servants to speak your word with all boldness” (*Acts 4:29*). As a result, “when they had prayed, the place in which they were gathered together was shaken; and they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and spoke the word of God with boldness” (*Acts 4:31*).

WHAT’S THE SMOKE FOR?

Dear Johan,

I attended a Lutheran synod assembly hosted by a Catholic church. They sing so well. Why is it that Catholics don’t sing as much?

Gentle Reader,

Many years ago, I told a friend how I appreciated the way he sang wholeheartedly during the liturgy. He smiled and shyly thanked me. I then told him I hoped the next step would be for him to sing correctly. The look on his face made me want to cry.

Hosting a Lutheran synod assembly was a marvelous thing to do. Not only was it great ecumenical outreach, it also seems to have called Catholics who were in attendance to ponder their singing, or the lack thereof. If it was anything like a similar Lutheran liturgical experience I once had, it must have been a service unlike any other. I imagine the windows were vibrating with sound. The level of participation of the congregation probably met the expectations set out by the Second Vatican Council. How remarkable that Lutherans show us how to fulfill the vision of this great Catholic council.

Your question as to ***our lack of musical participation on Sundays is one that plagues my mind and weighs heavy on my heart.***

Surely, many of us have all sorts of reasons to justify our lack of singing: the music is too difficult, too fast, too high, too low, too slow, too . . . “If only you would choose music we know . . .” I have heard them all.

I am afraid that much of this is nothing but an attempt at reasoning ourselves out of our responsibility to participate in the singing. We really need to enhance our culture of liturgical participation. We need to embrace the fact that we are called to sing. We need to realize that without our voice the liturgy is less. We need to believe that the choir is not the primary music maker, but that we are.

I regret the words to my friend, many years ago. I wish I could tell him that I now realize that the most important thing is to sing with your heart, your voice will follow. So let us sing the liturgy together so that we too can make the windows of our hearts vibrate with joyful sound.

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THE HOPE AND PROMISE OF REDEMPTION

The prophet Jeremiah prophesies the end of the Babylonian exile. He describes how the weak and sorrowful people now return with joy. These are the scattered people of God: the blind and the lame, the mothers and pregnant women. They shall be led along an easy road so that no one will stumble. The Lord's kindness and mercy are on all these weak and broken people.

Here and in Psalm 126 we find the most lovely poetic images of God's love and care for us. "Those that sow in tears / shall reap rejoicing. Although they go forth weeping, / carrying the seed to be sown, / they shall come back rejoicing, / carrying their sheaves" (Psalm 126:5-6). Although God had to punish Israel for their many sins, God never forgot them, scattered as they were, and brings them all back to the land of their ancestors, there to flourish and be joyful again. We can see in this the hope and the promise of our own redemption, gathered from the far corners of the earth into the great banquet of God.

Cuando somos bautizados, nos hacemos santos, es decir, nos convertimos en personas santas. Recibimos una nueva naturaleza (ver Gál 6:15) y nos hacemos partícipes de la naturaleza divina (2 Pe 1:4). En el Bautismo, comenzamos el proceso de llegar a ser santos, es decir, de ser como Dios (1 Jn 3:2). Para crecer en santidad, debemos renovar nuestro Bautismo diariamente y continuar aceptando a Jesús como nuestro Señor y Salvador (ver 2 Pe 2:20). Nuestras vidas serán un "gran período de prueba" (ver Ap 7:14). Al volvernos al Señor en estas pruebas, creceremos en santidad y en el deseo de ser santos.

A medida que crecemos en santidad, viviremos las Bienaventuranzas e incluso llegaremos a ser dignos de ser perseguidos por el bien del Evangelio (Mt 5:11). Finalmente, o tendremos una muerte santa y veremos al Dios todo santo de inmediato y para siempre, o lo veremos después de purificarnos y santificarnos en el Purgatorio.

El propósito de nuestras vidas es llegar a ser santo.

Naturalmente, tememos la aventura de llegar a ser santos.

Sin embargo, el Señor nos dará Su gracia para querer ser santos más de lo que deseamos cualquier otra cosa en la vida.

Oración: Padre, que desee ser santo más que respirar.

Promesa: "¡Miren cómo nos amó el Padre! Quiso que nos llamáramos hijos de Dios, y nosotros lo somos realmente. Si el mundo no nos reconoce, es porque no lo ha reconocido a Él" (1 Jn 3:1).

Alabanza: "Santo, santo, santo es el Señor Dios, el Todopoderoso, el que era, el que es y el que vendrá" (Ap 4:8).

NOVENA UN DESPERTAR

"Maestro, que yo pueda ver. Jesús le dijo: 'Vete, tu fe te ha salvado'. En seguida comenzó a ver y lo siguió por el camino" (Marcos 10:51-52).

Para vivir la Palabra de Dios (ver Santiago 1:22), debemos comprender la Palabra de Dios. Te invito a rezar una novena para estar libre de ceguera espiritual. Durante nueve días, ora así: "Que yo pueda ver" (Mc 10:51).

La mayoría de los cristianos creen que otras personas, incluyendo sus cónyuges, familiares, vecinos y compañeros de trabajo, necesitan verse mucho mejor espiritualmente. El pecado, la injusticia, el aborto, el racismo y la opresión en nuestra cultura de la muerte demuestran que vivimos una epidemia de ceguera espiritual. Sin embargo, nos resulta difícil creer que estamos espiritualmente ciegos o incluso que tenemos tabloncitos en nuestros ojos, mientras que otros pueden tener solo manchas (Mt 7:5). Estamos tentados a reaccionar como los fariseos cuando le dijeron a Jesús: "¿Acaso también nosotros somos ciegos?" (Jn 9:40).

Podrías ser tan santo que no estás espiritualmente ciego. Sin embargo, ¿estás seguro que tienes una visión espiritual 20/20? Si estás ciego de ser ciego, estás atrapado. Si no estás seguro de tener una visión espiritual 20/20, reza la novena para liberarte de la ceguera espiritual. Trata de ir a Misa diariamente o lo más seguido posible. Ve a confesarte. Ora diariamente: "Quiero ver". Invita a otros a que se unan contigo. Escríbenos y cuéntenos las buenas nuevas.

Oración: Padre, en esta novena enséñame acerca de mí mismo.

Promesa: "Los reúno desde los extremos de la tierra; hay entre ellos ciegos y lisiados" (Jer 31:8).

Alabanza: Alabado sea el Señor resucitado, porque "por sus heridas fuimos sanados" (Is 53:5; 1 Pe 2:24).
