THE HIDDEN RESURRECTION | *Henri Nouwen Society*

The resurrection of Jesus was a hidden event. Jesus didn't rise from the grave to baffle his opponents, to make a victory statement, or to prove to those who crucified him that he was right after all. Jesus rose as a sign to those who had loved him and followed him that God's divine love is stronger than death. To the women and men who had committed themselves to him, he revealed that his mission had been fulfilled. To those who shared in his ministry, he gave the sacred task to call all people into the new life with him.

The world didn't take notice. Only those whom he called by name, with whom he broke bread, and to whom he spoke words of peace were aware of what happened. Still, it was this hidden event that freed humanity from the shackles of death.

WOUNDS BECOMING SIGNS OF GLORY

The resurrection of Jesus is the basis of our faith in the resurrection of our bodies. Often we hear the suggestion that our bodies are the prisons of our souls and that the spiritual life is the way out of these prisons. But by our faith in the resurrection of the body we proclaim that the spiritual life and the life in the body cannot be separated. Our bodies, as Paul says, are temples of the Holy Spirit (see 1 Corinthians 6:19) and, therefore, sacred. The resurrection of the body means that what we have lived in the body will not go to waste but will be lifted in our eternal life with God. As Christ bears the marks of his suffering in his risen body, our bodies in the resurrection will bear the marks of our suffering. Our wounds will become signs of glory in the resurrection.

HAVING REVERENCE AND RESPECT FOR THE BODY

In so many ways we use and abuse our bodies. Jesus' coming to us in the body and his being lifted with his body in the glory of God call us to treat our bodies and the bodies of others with great reverence and respect. God, through Jesus, has made our bodies sacred places where God has chosen to dwell. Our faith in the resurrection of the body, therefore, calls us to care for our own and one another's bodies with love. When we bind one another's wounds and work for the healing of one another's bodies, we witness to the sacredness of the human body, a body destined for eternal life.

WAITING TO BE LIFTED UP WITH CHRIST

Waiting for Christ's second coming and waiting for the resurrection are one and the same. The second coming is the coming of the risen Christ, raising our mortal bodies with him in the glory of God. Jesus' resurrection and ours are central to our faith. Our resurrection is as intimately related to the resurrection of Jesus as our belovedness is related to the belovedness of Jesus. Paul is very adamant on this point. He says: "If there is no resurrection of the dead, then Christ cannot have been raised either, and if Christ has not been raised, then our preaching is without substance, and so is your faith" (1 Corinthians 15:13-14). Indeed, our waiting is for the risen Christ to lift us up with him in the eternal life with God. It is from the perspective of Jesus' resurrection and our own that his life and ours derive their full significance. "If our hope in Christ has been for this life only," Paul says, "we are of all people the most pitiable" (1 Corinthians 15:18). We don't need to be pitied, because as followers of Jesus we can look far beyond the limits of our short life on earth and trust that nothing we are living now in our body will go to waste.

REMUNERATION OF PRIESTS IN ACTIVE MINISTRY

Dear Parishioners,

After consultation and discussion, Bishop Soto has approved a revised Remuneration Policy for the Priests of the Diocese of Sacramento and promulgated it to be effective January 1, 2018. During the next few weeks, I will share with you some of the main points.

The Remuneration of Priests in active ministry is broken into four categories:

1. Compensation
2. Benefits
3. Reimbursements
4. Entitlements

“ENTITLEMENTS”

The following entitlements are to be seen as a supplement to the existing compensation schedule for priests in active ministry.

5. Television/Computer/Internet

- Each house is to have a television, receiver, and media player(s) that are accessible to the priests of the house in common. If a priest chooses to have a television, receiver, and media player(s) in his quarters, this is the personal financial responsibility of the priest.
- Each rectory will provide for basic cable TV and Internet access into the quarters of each priest at parish expense. This does not include special, sport or ethnic related channels, pay-per-view, movie rentals or other services such as NetFlix. These are considered personal expenses of the individual priest.
- Pastor and Parochial Vicar will each be provided by the parish with a (one) computer for ministerial work. Note: If the parish pays for the computer it remains the property of the parish.
- All other electronic equipment/appliances are the responsibility of the individual priest himself. Note: Any equipment/appliances that are purchased by the parish remain parish property.

6. Expenses for Athletic Activities, Recreational and Social Clubs and Associations

- Athletic equipment is the responsibility of the individual priest himself.
- Health club memberships and the like are the responsibility of the individual priest himself.
- All other club membership, fees, and dues for recreation, sports and social groups are the responsibility of the individual priest himself.

7. Furnishing and Maintenance of Quarters for a Priest

- Individual priest quarters need to be cleaned regularly by a housekeeper.
- The individual quarters of the priest should be painted on a regular basis (As a general rule this should be done at the time of the arrival of a newly assigned priest or every six years).
- Furniture should be adequate and comfortable in each suite. Note: All furniture purchased by the parish remains the property of the parish.
- Carpeting drapes and mattress should be replaced and/or cleaned on a regular basis.
- The parish is to maintain an inventory of the furniture that belongs to the Parish. It is recommended that the individual priest himself maintain an inventory of the furniture which belongs to him. Note: All furniture purchased by the parish remains the property of the parish.

8. Laundry

- Ordinary laundry service (not including dry cleaning) is provided by the Parish.

9. Medications/Prescriptions

- Medications for priests are covered by the health insurance afforded the priests by the diocese. The deductible set by the insurance is the responsibility of the individual priest himself. All over-the-counter medications are the responsibility of the individual priest.

TENDER, COMFORTING LOVE

"Comfort, give comfort to My people, says your God. Speak tenderly to Jerusalem." —Isaiah 40:1-2

This Christmas, the Lord wants us to have a special "encounter" with Him (see Church in America, 3). He wants our relationship with Him to be greater than any other love in our life. He will make our relationship with Him so deep, personal, and intimate that He will be a Source of comfort for us even in our worst sufferings (see Is 40:1-2; Ps 94:19). The Lord wants a tender relationship with us (see Is 40:2). He even lives in us and us in Him (Jn 14:20; 17:23, NAB). The depth and the intimacy of our relationship with the Lord is such that we can receive even His Body and Blood into our bodies.

We receive this deep, personal, intimate relationship with Jesus through the Holy Spirit. For example, Jesus' disciples spent day after day with Jesus for years, but they never had a deep relationship. This was manifested when they abandoned Christ as He was crucified. However, when the Holy Spirit descended upon them at Pentecost, they became so close to Jesus that they gave their lives to Him, proclaimed His love to the nations, and even died for Him.

Therefore, let us pray: Come, Holy Spirit! Come, Christmas Spirit of comforting, tender, and deep love!

Prayer: Father, let it be done to me according to Your will (see Lk 1:38).

Promise: "Make every effort to be found without stain or defilement, and at peace in His sight." —2 Pt 3:14

Praise: Jesus came forth from the tomb; "Truth shall spring out of the earth" (Ps 85:12). Praise You, risen Jesus, for conquering death and saving us.

Sin embargo, Dios, incluso ahora, nos está librando de las cargas que se nos amontonan por no prestarle atención a él ni a nuestros anhelos más profundos. El Señor llega, no como un rey con ejércitos poderosos, sino como un pastor que guía a los rebaños con amor y ternura. Isaías anuncia buenas noticias: nuestra servidumbre terminó, nuestros pecados han sido perdonados. El salvador que esperábamos está llegando, no por primera vez, sino al final de los tiempos, como nuestra salvación.

AMOR TIERNO Y CONSOLADOR

"¡Consuelen, consuelen a mi pueblo, dice su Dios! Hablen al corazón de Jerusalén y anuncienle que su tiempo de servicio se ha cumplido, que su culpa está paga"

(Isaías 40:1-2).

Esta Navidad, el Señor quiere que tengamos un especial "encuentro" con Él (ver la Iglesia en América, 3). Él quiere que nuestra relación con Él sea mayor que cualquier otro amor en nuestra vida. Él hará nuestra relación con Él tan profunda, personal e íntima que será una fuente de consuelo para nosotros en nuestros peores sufrimientos (ver Is 40:1-2; Sal 94:19). El Señor quiere una relación tierna con nosotros (ver Is 40:2). Hasta vive Él en nosotros y nosotros en Él (Jn 14:20; 17:23). La profundidad y la intimidad de nuestra relación con el Señor es tal que hasta podemos recibir Su Cuerpo y Sangre en nuestro cuerpo. Recibimos esta relación profunda, íntima y personal con Jesús por medio del Espíritu Santo. Como han visto, los discípulos de Jesús pasaron día tras día con Jesús durante años, pero nunca llegaron a una relación profunda. Esto se manifestó cuando abandonaron a Cristo cuando este estuvo crucificado. Sin embargo, cuando el Espíritu Santo descendió sobre ellos en Pentecostés, se acercaron tanto a Jesús que dedicaron sus vidas a Él, proclamaron Su amor a las naciones, y hasta murieron por Él.

Por lo tanto, oremos: ¡Ven, Espíritu Santo! ¡Ven, Espíritu Navideño de amor consolador, tierno y profundo!
