CHRISTMAS

Christmas is one of the most important days of the Church year, second only to Easter itself. It is the feast of the incarnation, the feast of God becoming flesh (the Latin "in carne" means "enfleshment"). It is a uniquely Christian teaching, the Divine choosing to become one of us. Because of this belief, God is not only **Transcendent**, but also wholly **Immanent**, Emmanuel (God-with-us). While remaining **Transcendent** (meaning we must rise above our present condition to reach Him), He is at the same time **Immanent** (meaning He is with us as we rise toward Him). Every Eucharist is like Christmas where the bread and wine are transformed into His flesh, His Body and Blood, and, in a sense, He is born anew on the altar.

The liturgical season of Christmas begins with the vigil Masses on Christmas Eve and concludes on the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord. During this season, we celebrate the birth of Christ into our world and into our hearts, and reflect on the gift of salvation that is born with him... including the fact that he was born to die for us.

The Christmas tree and the Nativity scene are popular symbols of the season and a tradition in many Christian homes. It is also traditional to exchange Christmas gifts with family and friends as a way to honor God the Father's gift of his only son to the world. Having received the gift of Christ, we naturally want to pass that gift along to our loved ones.

"THE BEST LAID PLANS OF MICE AND MEN"

"When Joseph awoke he did as the angel of the Lord had directed him." —Matthew 1:24

Many of you have Christmas planned. You're going to go to certain parties, see certain family members and friends, and give specific presents. You expect to receive a few presents yourself along with some Christmas goodies. The Christmas you have planned is about the same as last year's Christmas, with a few minor variations.

What if Jesus decided to change your Christmas plans dramatically? Would you let Him be Lord of your Christmas? Ahaz had plans about how to avoid destruction by the Assyrians. Just when Ahaz had his plans all set, Isaiah told Ahaz to forget his plans and trust in God alone. The Lord even promised a dramatic sign to prove Isaiah's message (Is 7:11). Ahaz refused to ask for the sign, would not even consider changing his plans, and "proved utterly faithless to the Lord" (2 Chr 28:19).

Joseph planned to quietly divorce Mary because she was pregnant and the baby was not his (Mt 1:19). An angel appeared to Joseph in a dream and told him to change his plans. He changed his plans and became the foster-father of Jesus, the husband of Mary, and head of the Holy Family.

The best Christmases are not when we get our way, but when we change our plans so that Jesus gets His way.

Prayer: *Father, ruin any plans of mine that are not Yours.*

Promise: *"The virgin shall be with Child and give birth to a Son, and they shall call Him Emmanuel,' a name which means 'God is with us.' "* —Mt 1:23

Praise: *"O King of all the nations, the only Joy of every human heart; O Keystone of the mighty arch of man, come and save the creature You fashioned from the dust."*

CHOOSING LIFE

In the first reading of the Eucharist today I heard: "I am offering you life or death... Choose life, then, so that you and your descendants may live in the love of Yahweh, your God, obeying his voice, holding fast to him" (Deuteronomy 30:19–20).

How do I choose life? I am becoming aware that there are few moments without the opportunity to choose, since death and life are always before me. One aspect of choosing life is choosing joy. Joy is life-giving but sadness brings death. A sad heart is a heart in which something is dying. A joyful heart is a heart in which something new is being born.

I think that joy is much more than a mood. A mood invades us. We do not choose a mood. We often find ourselves in a happy or depressed mood without knowing where it comes from. The spiritual life is a life beyond moods. It is a life in which we choose joy and do not allow ourselves to become victims of passing feelings of happiness or depression.

DECEMBER | Universal: The Future of the Very Young

WHAT'S THE SMOKE FOR?

Dear Johan,

Why do we celebrate Christmas on December 25? Is that really the day Jesus was born? I don't recall reading about it in the Scriptures.

Gentle Reader,

While December 25 is one of the most important celebrations of the year, it is good to remember that Christmas was not celebrated on December 25 until the fourth century. More important, it was not always very popular. Early Christian writers such as Origen (ca. 185–254) argued against celebrating the birth of Jesus, declaring birthday celebrations a pagan custom not to be imitated by Christians. Even in more recent times Christmas has been frowned upon. Puritans argued against the celebration of Christmas because of the lack of biblical references. This even led to the outlawing of Christmas by the General Court of Massachusetts Bay Colony between 1659 and 1681.

Though describing the circumstances of Jesus' birth, the Scriptures indeed do not give us any indication as to the actual date of his birth. As a result, when Christians were ready to start celebrating the birth of Jesus a date needed to be selected. Both January 6 and December 25 were contenders for the date. January 6 is the oldest date on which the incarnation was celebrated. Yet, in the end December 25 was adopted by most Christians.

There are two main theories for the selection of December 25 as the eventual date for Christmas: the history hypothesis and the calculation hypothesis.

The calculation hypothesis is based on the so-called whole-year theory, which holds that people of importance die on the same day they were born or conceived. Since some people believed that Jesus died on March 25; that would mean he was also conceived on March 25. Calculating nine months from March 25 lands his birth on December 25.

The history hypothesis posits that the celebration of the birth of Jesus was introduced on December 25 to supplant existing pagan festivities. In 274 Emperor Aurelian had restored the cult of Sol Invictus, the Invincible Sun. On December 25 the birth of the Invincible Sun was celebrated. This day was specifically chosen because it was the date of the winter solstice in the Julian calendar until it was moved to December 21 at the Council of Nicea in 325. Christians believed that Christ was the true Invincible Sun. The celebration of his birth thus happily coincides with the winter solstice.

In the end, I would not worry too much about the date of Christmas since it is nothing but a date. What is important, though, is what we celebrate on Christmas, namely, that God became one of us so we might become more like God. We can celebrate this on any date, really.

FLU SEASON AND THE SUSPENSION OF THE CUP AND OTHER PRECAUTIONS

The flu season has come early this year. The California Department of Public Health (CDPH) reports that the incidence of flu and flu-like illnesses is “widespread” and has reached a level requiring that we enact preventive measures to mitigate the possibility of infection at Mass. In order to protect the health and well-being of everyone, Bishop Soto has issued the following directives:

- The use of the Communion cup is suspended temporarily.
- Receive the Body of Christ in the hand (although receiving on the tongue is permitted)
- Do not shake hands. Offer the sign of Peace to those around you with a simple nod, saying “peace be with you.”
- Do not hold hands during the Our Father.

The obligation to attend Mass on Sunday and other Holy Days does not apply to those who are sick. If you are sick, stay home and take care of yourself. Thank you for your patience and understanding during this time. And pray for those who are sick. The administration of Holy Communion in both kinds will resume as soon as the Bishop deems it safe and prudent to do so.

BLESSING OF A CHRISTMAS MANGER OR NATIVITY SCENE

In its present form the custom of displaying figures depicting the birth of Jesus Christ owes its origin to St. Francis of Assisi, who made the Christmas crèche or manger for Christmas Eve of 1223. The blessing of the Christmas manger or nativity scene may take place on the Vigil of Christmas or at another suitable time.

When the manger is set up in the home, it is appropriate that it be blessed by a parent or another family member.

All make the sign of the cross as the leader says: ***Our help is in the name of the Lord.***

R/. Who made heaven and earth.

One of those present or the leader reads a text of sacred Scripture, for example, Luke 2:1 (lines 1-8) or Isaiah 7:10 (lines 10-15, the birth of Emmanuel).

Reader: The Gospel of the Lord.

R/. Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

The leader prays with hands joined:

God of every nation and people,
from the very beginning of creation
you have made manifest your love:
Jesus,

when our need for a Savior was great
you sent your Son to be born of the Virgin Mary.
To our lives he brings joy and peace,
justice, mercy, and love.

El Adviento, Vísperas de Navidad

El Adviento es el comienzo del Año Litúrgico, empieza el domingo más próximo al 1 de diciembre y termina el 24 de diciembre. Son los cuatro domingos anteriores a la Navidad y forma una unidad con la Navidad y la Epifanía. El término "Adviento" viene del latín *adventus*, que significa venida, llegada. El color usado en la liturgia de la Iglesia durante este tiempo es el morado. Con el Adviento comienza un nuevo año litúrgico en la Iglesia

LA NAVIDAD

La Navidad es uno de los días más importante del año de la Iglesia, segundo en importancia después del Tiempo Pascual. Es la fiesta de la encarnación, la fiesta de Dios que se encarna. Es una enseñanza cristiana única, lo Divino que decide hacerse uno de nosotros. Por esta creencia, Dios no es solo Transcendente, sino también Inmanente, Emanuel (Dios-con-nosotros). Mientras que sigue siendo Transcendente (lo que quiere decir que tenemos que elevarnos de nuestra condición actual para alcanzarle), es al mismo tiempo Inmanente (lo que significa que está con nosotros mientras que tratamos de elevarnos a él). Toda Eucaristía es como la Navidad en que el pan y el vino se transforman en su carne, su Cuerpo y Sangre y, en cierto sentido, él nace de nuevo sobre el altar.

El tiempo litúrgico de Navidad comienza con las Misas de Vigilia el día de Nochebuena y concluye con la fiesta del Bautismo del Señor. Durante este tiempo, celebramos el nacimiento de Cristo en el mundo y en nuestros corazones y reflexionamos sobre el don de la salvación que viene con él... incluyendo el hecho de que nació para morir por nosotros.

El árbol de Navidad y el Nacimiento son símbolos populares de la estación y una tradición en muchos hogares cristianos. También es tradicional intercambiar regalos de Navidad con la familia y amigos como un modo de honrar el regalo de Dios Padre de su único Hijo al mundo. EN NAVIDAD POR LA FE, NO POR LA VISTA (2 CO 5:7)

"Al despertar, José hizo lo que el Ángel del Señor le había ordenado: llevó a María a su casa" (Mateo 1:24).

José creyó que María estaba embarazada no a causa de unión carnal, sino por el Espíritu Santo (Mt 1:20). Lo creyó así debido a la gracia que le fue dada por Dios en un sueño en que un ángel le comunicó el misterio de la concepción de la Virgen (Mt 1:20). Muchas personas considerarían a José como uno de los mayores tontos de la existencia humana, pero nosotros lo reconocemos como uno de los más grandes hombres de fe en la historia.

Para no divorciarse de la primera Navidad (ver Mt 1:19), José necesitaba una gran fe - una fe que movería mucho más que montañas (ver Mt 17:20). El Señor le dio una super-fe. Como José, para recibir a Cristo en esta festividad Navideña, también necesitaremos el don de la fe.

Possiblemente, requeriremos una gran fe. Necesitamos el don del advenimiento de la fe, antes de que podamos recibir nuestro regalo de Navidad con la llegada de Jesús. Pide al Señor como un regalo una fe más grande (Lc 17:5). En estos próximos días, lea, ore y estudie las enseñanzas de la Iglesia y la Biblia. Esto le ayudará a escuchar a Dios y crecer en la fe (Rom 10:17). El Señor quiere que tu fe en Él se haga más fuerte y más profunda que nunca. Deja que Él te regale más y mayor fe.

Oración: Padre, "¡Creo, ayúdame porque tengo poca fe!" (Mc 9:24)

Promesa: "Pide para ti un signo de parte del Señor, en lo profundo del Abismo, o arriba, en las alturas" (Is 7:11).

CONFIANZA EN DIOS

En este último domingo de Adviento las lecturas se enfocan en el nacimiento histórico de Jesús: el hijo de David e Hijo de Dios, niño y rey, Jesús y Emmanuel.

El profeta Isaías le suplica a Ajaz que pida una señal, para permitir a Dios que le asegure la sobrevivencia de la dinastía de David. El rey hipócrita rehusa "tentar al SEÑOR" de esa manera (Isaías 7:12), pero el profeta predice el nacimiento de un hijo, un heredero al trono, quien probará la duradera protección divina del linaje elegido del trono de David. El niño será llamado Emmanuel.

Mateo se refiere a esta historia en su descripción de los puntos principales del nacimiento de Jesús que contrasta a Ajaz quien rehusa confiar por falta de fe, y la completa confianza en Dios que María y José demostraron al cooperar con el nacimiento de Jesucristo.
