JESUS GIVES HIMSELF TO US

When we invite friends for a meal, we do much more than offer them food for their bodies. We offer friendship, fellowship, good conversation, intimacy, and closeness.

When we say: "Help yourself ... take some more ... don't be shy ... have another glass," we offer our guests not only our food and our drink but also ourselves. A spiritual bond grows, and we become food and drink for one another other.

In the most complete and perfect way, this happens when Jesus gives himself to us in the Eucharist as food and drink. By offering us his Body and Blood, Jesus offers us the most intimate communion possible. It is a divine communion.

THE MOST HUMAN AND MOST DIVINE GESTURE

The two disciples whom Jesus joined on the road to Emmaus recognized him in the breaking of the bread.

What is a more common, ordinary gesture than breaking bread? It may be the most human of all human gestures: a gesture of hospitality, friendship, care, and the desire to be together. Taking a loaf of bread, blessing it, breaking it, and giving it to those seated around the table signifies unity, community, and peace. When Jesus does this, he does the most ordinary as well as the most extraordinary. It is the most human as well as the most divine gesture.

The great mystery is that this daily and most human gesture is the way we recognize the presence of Christ among us. God becomes most present when we are most human.

A PLACE OF VULNERABILITY AND TRUST

When we gather around the table and eat from the same loaf and drink from the same cup, we are most vulnerable to one another. We cannot have a meal together in peace with guns hanging over our shoulders and pistols attached to our belts. When we break bread together we leave our arms - whether they are physical or mental - at the door and enter into a place of mutual vulnerability and trust. The beauty of the Eucharist is precisely that it is the place where a vulnerable God invites vulnerable people to come together in a peaceful meal. When we break bread and give it to each other, fear vanishes and God becomes very close.

JESUS, OUR FOOD AND DRINK

Jesus is the Word of God, who came down from heaven, was born of the Virgin Mary through the power of the Holy Spirit, and became a human person. This happened in a specific place at a specific time. But each day when we celebrate the Eucharist, Jesus comes down from heaven, takes bread and wine, and by the power of the Holy Spirit becomes our food and drink. Indeed, through the Eucharist, God's incarnation continues to happen at any time and at any place.

Sometimes we might think: "I wish I had been there with Jesus and his apostles long ago!" But Jesus is closer to us now than he was to his own friends. Today He is our daily bread!

COMPANION OF THE SOULS | *Henri Nouwen Society*

Baptism is more than a way to spiritual freedom. It also is the way to community. Baptizing a person, whether child or adult, is receiving that person into the community of faith. Those who are reborn from above through baptism, and are called to live the life of sons and daughters of God, belong together as members of one spiritual family, the living body of Christ. When we baptize people, we welcome them into this family of God and offer them guidance, support, and formation, as they grow to the full maturity of the Christ-like life.



NATIONAL VOCATION AWARENESS

WEEK | November 5-11, 2017

National Vocation Awareness Week (NVAW) is an annual week-long celebration of the Catholic Church in the United States dedicated to promote vocations to the priesthood, diaconate and consecrated life through prayer and education, and to renew our prayers and support for those who are considering one of these particular vocations. NVAW began in 1976 when the U. S. bishops designated the 28th Sunday of the year for NVAW. In 1997, this celebration was moved to coincide with the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, which falls on January 13 in 2013. Beginning in 2014, NVAW was moved to the first full week of November.

LIVING THE HARD LIFE

"Grace and peace be yours." —1 Thessalonians 1:1

First Thessalonians is probably the earliest book of the New Testament. Therefore, it has special significance. To better understand these words of St. Paul, we must understand his life. Paul described his life in the following way: "...with my many more labors and imprisonments, with far worse beatings and frequent brushes with death. Five times at the hands of the Jews I received forty lashes less one; three times I was beaten with rods; I was stoned once, shipwrecked three times; I passed a day and a night on the sea. I traveled continually, endangered by floods, robbers, my own people, the Gentiles; imperiled in the city, in the desert, at sea, by false brothers; enduring labor, hardship, many sleepless nights; in hunger and thirst and frequent fastings, in cold and nakedness. Leaving other sufferings unmentioned, there is that daily tension pressing on me, my anxiety for all the churches" (2 Cor 11:23-28).

Paul suffered greatly in his life for Christ. Paul had a very hard life. However, it made him better rather than bitter because he belonged "to God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ" (1 Thes 1:1). Despite his extreme sufferings, Paul did not see his life as a series of cruel tragedies but as grace upon grace (see 1 Thes 1:1). When Paul looked at people, especially Christians, he kept thanking God for all of them and remembering them in his prayers (1 Thes 1:2). Although Paul was treated inhumanely, he loved life and people, because he loved Jesus. Live and love accordingly, especially if your life is hard.

Prayer: Father, work together all things for the good of those who love You (see Rm 8:28).

Promise: "...opening doors before him and leaving the gates unbarred." —Is 45:1

Praise: Praise Jesus, the risen Savior and Lord! Praise Jesus, Redeemer, Messiah, and King!

MISSION-MINDED?

"...so that toward the rising and the setting of the sun men may know that there is none besides Me." —Isaiah 45:6

On this World Mission Sunday, the Church asks us as Christians what our relationship is to the nations of the world. We must give the nations what belongs to them (see Mt 22:21). Especially, we must give Jesus to the nations, for He belongs to all people and we all belong to Him (see 1 Cor 3:21-23). Therefore, Jesus commands us to "make disciples of all the nations" (Mt 28:19) and "tell His glory among the nations" (Ps 96:3). We must "say among the nations: The Lord is King" (Ps 96:10) so that the "families of nations" may "give to the Lord glory and praise" (Ps 96:7).

Are you giving the nations their due? Do you pray daily for all nations "to be saved and come to know the truth?" (1 Tm 2:4) Do you love and befriend people from other nations in your schools, businesses, and neighborhoods? Are you praying for yourself and others to become local or foreign missionaries? Do you give substantial offerings to further the Church's missionary outreach?

One of Jesus' last and greatest commandments is: "Make disciples of all the nations" (Mt 28:19). By grace, in love, and for Jesus — do it!

Prayer: Father, send the Spirit to make me a witness for Jesus and a missionary (Acts 1:8).

Promise: "Our preaching of the gospel proved not a mere matter of words for you but one of power; it was carried on in the Holy Spirit and out of complete conviction." —1 Thes 1:5

Praise: Praise be to "our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Glory be to Him now and to the day of eternity!" (2 Pt 3:18)

WORLD MISSIONS | Pope Francis: Message for World Mission Day 2017

Once again this year, World Mission Day gathers us around the person of Jesus, "the very first and greatest evangelizer" (Paul VI, Evangelii Nuntiandi, 7), who continually sends us forth to proclaim the Gospel of the love of God the Father in the power of the Holy Spirit. This Day invites us to reflect anew on the mission at the heart of the Christian faith. The Church is missionary by nature; otherwise, she would no longer be the Church of Christ, but one group among many others that soon end up serving their purpose and passing away. So it is important to ask ourselves certain questions about our Christian identity and our responsibility as believers in a world marked by confusion, disappointment and frustration, and torn by numerous fratricidal wars that unjustly target the innocent. What is the basis of our mission? What is the heart of our mission? What are the essential approaches we need to take in carrying out our mission?



PRIESTHOOD SUNDAY | October 29, 2017 | What is "Priesthood Sunday"?

Priesthood Sunday, the last Sunday of October, is a special day set aside to honor the priesthood in the United States. It is a day to reflect upon and affirm the role of the priesthood in the life of the Church as a central one.

In the wake of the clergy sex abuse scandal, there has been concern that the image of all priests has been tainted by the actions of a few. Priesthood Sunday sends a message to all that the sins of a few do not reflect the innocent majority, and that the parish priest, as the instrument of Christ's ministry on earth, is loved and respected by those in the parish community.

This nationwide event is coordinated by the USA Council of Serra International. It is sponsored by the USA Council of Serra International and the Serra International Foundation.

¿MENTALIDAD MISIONERA?

"...desde el Oriente y el Occidente, que no hay nada fuera de mí. Yo soy el Señor, y no hay otro" (Isaías 45:6).

En este domingo, la Jornada Mundial de las Misiones, la Iglesia nos pregunta como cristianos, ¿cuál es nuestra relación con los pueblos del mundo? Tenemos que dar a los pueblos lo que les pertenece. (ver Mt 22:21). Especialmente, tenemos que dar a conocer a Jesús a los pueblos, porque Él le pertenece a toda la gente y todos nosotros le pertenecemos a Él. (vea 1 Co 3:21-23). Por lo tanto Jesús nos manda "Vayan, y hagan que todos los pueblos sean mis discípulos" (Mt 28:19) y "Anuncien su gloria entre las naciones, y sus maravillas entre los pueblos" (Sal 96:3). Tenemos que decir "... entre las naciones: ¡el Señor reina!" (Sal 96:10), para que "las familias de las naciones" "aclamen al Señor...la gloria y el poder" (Sal 96:7).

¿Das a los pueblos lo que es de ellos? ¿Oras diariamente para que todos los pueblos "se salven y lleguen al conocimiento de la verdad" (1 Tim 2:4)? ¿Amas y estableces amistad con personas de diferentes pueblos en tu escuela, negocios, y vecindades? ¿Oras por tí mismo y para que otros sean misioneros locales y extranjeros? ¿Das suficiente para adelantar el programa misionero de la Iglesia?

Uno de los últimos y más grandes mandamientos es: "hagan que todos los pueblos sean mis discípulos" (Mt 28:19). Por la gracia de Dios, en amor, y por Jesús ¡hazlo!

Oración: Padre, envía al Espíritu Santo para que me convierta en un testigo de Jesús y en un misionero (Hch 1:8).

Promesa: "Porque la Buena Noticia que les hemos anunciado llegó hasta ustedes, no solamente con palabras, sino acompañada de poder, de la acción del Espíritu Santo y de toda clase de dones" (1 Tes 1:5).

Alabanza: Gloria a "nuestro Señor y Salvador Jesucristo. ¡A Él sea la gloria, ahora y en la eternidad!" (2 Pe 3:18).
