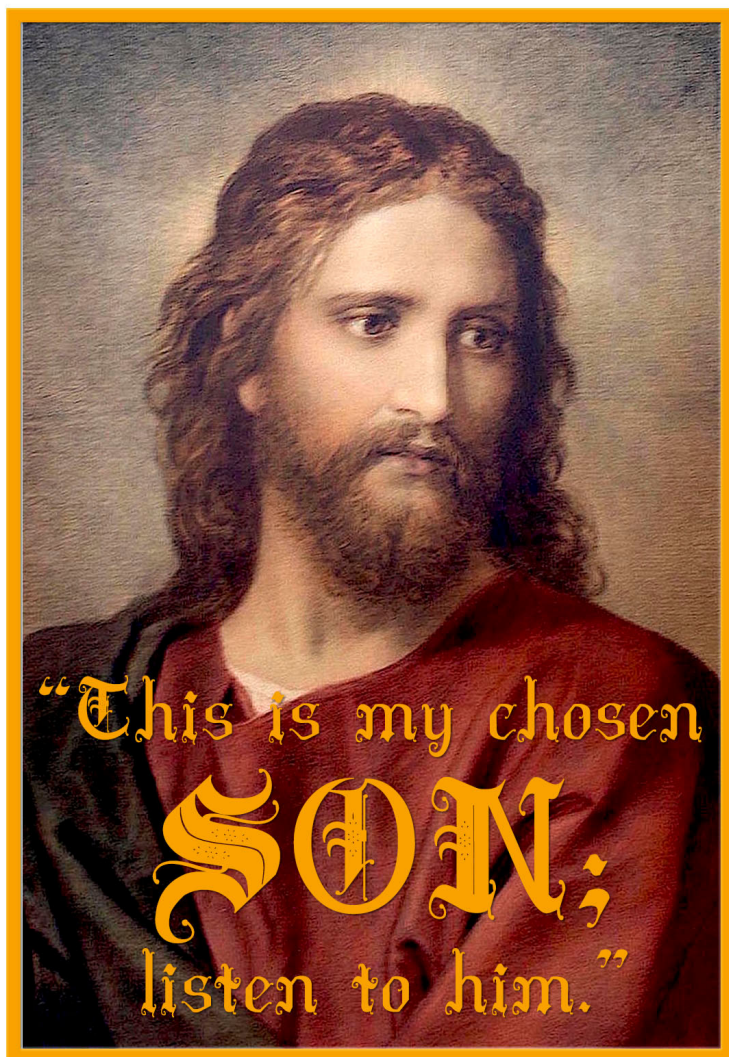

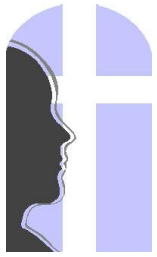


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CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS



Each year on Holy Saturday during the Easter Vigil, thousands are baptized into the Catholic Church in the United States. Parishes welcome these new Catholics through the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults. Listed below are some questions and answers about the process of Christian Initiation.

What are the steps of Christian Initiation?

Prior to beginning the process of becoming a Christian, an individual comes to some knowledge of Jesus Christ, considers his or her relationship with Jesus Christ and is usually attracted in some way to the Catholic Church. This period is known as the Period of Evangelization and **PRECATECHUMENATE**. For some, this process involves a long period of searching; for others, a shorter time. Often, contact with people of faith and a personal faith experience lead people to inquire about the Catholic Church. After a conversation with a priest or a parish director of Christian Initiation, the person, known as an "inquirer," may seek acceptance into the Order of Catechumens, through the Rite of Acceptance. During this Rite, the inquirer stands amidst the parish community and states that he or she wants to become a baptized member of the Catholic Church. The parish assembly affirms this desire and the inquirer becomes a Catechumen.

The Period of the Catechumenate can last for as long as several years or for a shorter time. It depends on how the person is growing in faith, what questions they encounter along the way, and how God leads them on this journey. During this time, the Catechumens consider what God is saying to them in the Scriptures, what changes in their life they need to make to respond to God's inspiration, and what Baptism in the Catholic Church means. When a Catechumen and the priest and the parish team working with him or her believes the person is ready to make a faith commitment to Jesus in the Catholic Church, the next step is the request for baptism and the celebration of the Rite of Election. Even before the Catechumens are baptized, they have a special relationship to the Church.

The Rite of Election includes the enrollment of names of all the Catechumens seeking baptism at the coming Easter Vigil. Typically, on the first Sunday of Lent, the Catechumens, their sponsors and families gather at the cathedral church. The Catechumens publicly express their desire for baptism to the diocesan bishop. Their names are recorded in a book and they are called the Elect.

The days of Lent are the final **Period of Purification and Enlightenment** leading up to the Easter Vigil. Lent is a period of preparation marked by prayer, study, and spiritual direction for the Elect, and prayers for them by the parish communities. The Celebration of the Sacraments of Initiation takes place during the Easter Vigil Liturgy on Holy Saturday when the Elect receives the sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and Holy Eucharist. Now the person is fully initiated into the Catholic Church.

As a newly initiated Catholic, they continue their formation and education continue in the Period of the Post-Baptismal Catechesis, which is also called **Mystagogy**. This period continues at least until Pentecost. During the period the newly baptized members reflect on their experiences at the Easter Vigil and continue to learn more about the Scriptures, the Sacraments, and the teachings of the Catholic Church. In addition, they reflect on how they will serve Christ and help in the Church's mission and outreach activities.

What is meant by coming into full communion with the Church?

Coming into full communion with the Catholic Church describes the process for entrance into the Catholic Church for already baptized Christians. In most cases, these individuals make a profession of faith but are not baptized again. To prepare for this reception, the people, who are called Candidates, usually participate in a formation program to help them understand and experience the teachings and practices of the Catholic Church. Although some preparation may be with Catechumens preparing for baptism, the preparation for Candidates is different since they have already been baptized and committed to Jesus Christ, and many have also been active members of other Christian communities. The Candidates may be received into the Catholic Church at the Easter Vigil or at another Sunday during the year depending on pastoral circumstances and readiness of the Candidate.

CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (CONT.)

What is the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday like?

The Easter Vigil takes place on Holy Saturday, the evening before Easter Sunday. This is the night that "shall be as bright as day" as proclaimed by the Exsultet, an ancient church hymn as we joyfully anticipate Christ's Resurrection. The Holy Saturday Liturgy begins with the Service of Light, which includes the blessing of the new fire and the Paschal candle which symbolizes Jesus, the Light of the World. The second part consists of the Liturgy of the Word with a series of Scripture readings. After the Liturgy of the Word, the Catechumens are presented to the parish community, who pray for them with the Litany of the Saints. Next, the priest blesses the water, placing the Easter or Paschal candle into the baptismal water. Those seeking Baptism then renounce sin and profess their faith after which they are baptized with the priest pronouncing the words, "I baptize you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit."

After the Baptism the newly baptized are dressed in white garments and presented with a candle lighted from the Paschal Candle. They are then Confirmed by the priest or bishop who lays hands on their heads, and invokes the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. He then anoints them with the oil called Sacred Chrism. The Mass continues with the newly baptized participating in the general intercessions and in bringing gifts to the altar. At Communion, the newly baptized receive the Eucharist, Christ's Body and Blood, for the first time.

What does the white robe symbolize?

The newly baptized are dressed in a white garment after baptism to symbolize that they are washed clean of sin and that they are called to continue to walk in this newness of life.

What does the candle symbolize?

A small candle is lit from the Easter candle and given to the newly baptized as a reminder to them always to walk as children of the Light and to be the light of Christ to the world.

What does the Sacred Chrism symbolize?

The Sacred Chrism, or oil, is a sign of the gift of the Holy Spirit being given to the newly baptized. It is also a sign of the close link between the mission of Jesus and the outpouring of the Holy Spirit, who comes to the recipient with the Father in Baptism

Why was this ancient rite restored?

It was restored in the Church to highlight the fact that the newly baptized are received into a community of faith, which is challenged to realize that they too have become different because of this new life in the community.

Is there a ceremony or preparation for Catholics who never or seldom have practiced the faith?

For Catholics who have been Baptized, Confirmed and made First Communion but then drifted from the faith, the way they return is through the Sacrament of Penance. Catholics who were baptized but never received Confirmation and/or Eucharist also participate in a period of formation. This process of formation is completed with the reception of the Sacraments of Confirmation and Holy Communion often at the Easter Vigil or during the Easter Season.

HOPING WHEN LIFE IS THE WORST

“The Stone Which the builders rejected has become the Keystone of the structure. It was the Lord Who did this and we find it marvelous to behold.” —Matthew 21:42; Psalm 118:22-23

If we repent in our sinfulness, slavery, and misery, the Lord will take the worst in our lives and make it the best. The Lord manifests His almighty power not just by doing great works but by making the greatest miracles out of the worst sins, injustices, and defeats. “God makes all things work together for the good of those who love” Him (Rm 8:28).

Joseph’s brothers decided to murder him. Then they changed their plans from murdering him to starving him and finally to selling him into slavery. The brothers agreed to lie to their father about Joseph’s death and thereby broke their father’s heart (Gn 37:20, 35). This was a gross evil. The Lord turned this to the good by raising up Joseph into one of the most powerful people of the world. Ironically, Joseph, who was almost left to starve to death, saved many countries from starving to death.

The worst evil ever perpetrated and the focal point of every sin that has ever or will ever be committed is Jesus’ Passion and death. The Lord took this absolute worst to bring about the ultimate best — the salvation of the whole world.

If you are in the worst of times, there may be reason for you to be even more hopeful. “Rejoice in hope” (Rm 12:12).

Prayer: Father, this Lent may hope well up inside me as never before.

Promise: “The king sent and released him, the ruler of the peoples set him free. He made him lord of his house and ruler of all his possessions.” —Ps 105:20-21

Praise: St. Cyril of Jerusalem’s instructions on the Sacraments are still relevant today.

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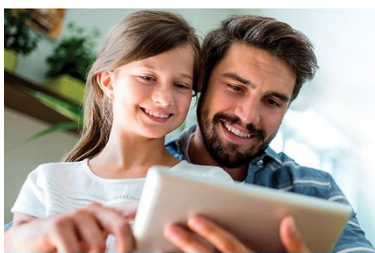

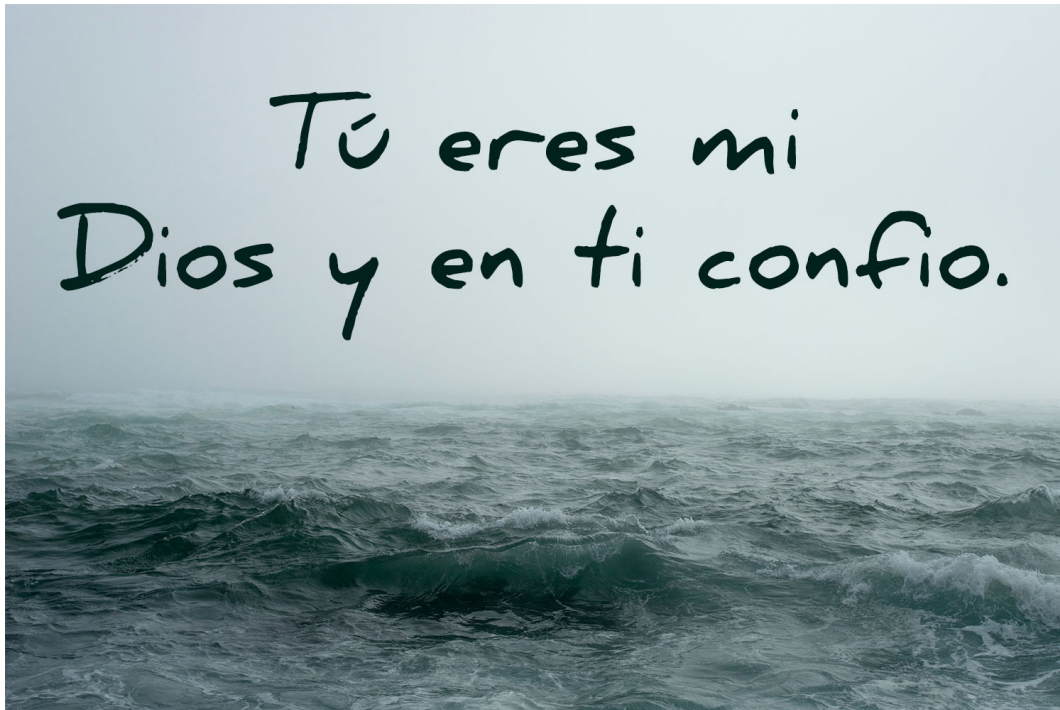

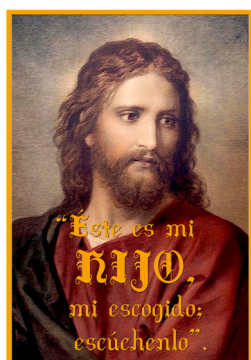

REFLEXIONES

SUBIENDO A LA MONTAÑA

“Jesús tomó a Pedro, Juan y Santiago, y subió a la montaña para orar” (Lucas 9:28).

Domingo, 13 de marzo de 2022; Segundo Domingo de Cuaresma

Génesis 15:5-12, 17-18; Salmos 27:1, 7-9, 13-14; Filipenses 3:17-4: 1; Lucas 9:28-36

En este segundo domingo de Cuaresma, Jesús nos lleva al Monte de la Transfiguración. Tiene mucho más que decirnos, pero todavía no podemos soportarlo (Jn 16:12). Debemos “subir a la montaña del Señor... Él nos instruirá en sus caminos y caminaremos por sus sendas” (Is 2:3). Veremos a Jesús glorificado y escucharemos una voz de la nube que dice: “Este es mi Hijo, el Elegido, escúchenlo” (Lc 9:35).

Estas revelaciones en la cima de la montaña nos evitarán la desesperación cuando el Señor nos lleve al Calvario para ver Su cuerpo tembloroso desgarrado por el dolor. La montaña nos prepara para el valle, la gloria para el sufrimiento. Debido a la Montaña de la Transfiguración, cuando crucemos con Él "oscuras quebradas" (Sal 23:4), consideraremos que “los sufrimientos del tiempo presente no pueden compararse con la gloria futura que se revelará en nosotros” (Rom 8:18). Fijaremos nuestros ojos en Jesús (Heb 12:2) y caminaremos sobre las aguas del mal (Mt 14:29). No huiremos de la cruz, sino que nos vanagloriamos de ella (Gál 6:14).

Después de la Transfiguración, sabemos que nuestra ciudadanía es del cielo, y desde allí esperamos la venida de Cristo (ver Fil 3:20). Nos damos cuenta de que estamos en el mundo, pero no somos de él (ver Jn 17:15-16). Ya estamos sentados en el trono de Cristo (ver Ef 2:6) aunque nuestro cuerpo esté alejado del Señor (ver 2 Co 5:6).

Oración: Jesús, permíteme experimentar como los apóstoles lo que sucedió en la montaña de la Transfiguración. Prepárame para el resto de la Cuaresma y la vida.

Promesa: “Él transformará nuestro pobre cuerpo mortal, haciéndolo semejante a Su cuerpo glorioso” (Fil 3:21).

Alabanza: Mientras viajamos por el desierto de la Cuaresma, no estamos abandonados. Señor Jesús, eres el faro para todos los que adoran “en Espíritu y en verdad” (Jn 4:24). ¡Toda alabanza a Ti!

PERDONAR PARA DAR | “Den, y se les dará” (Lucas 6:38)

Lunes, 14 de marzo de 2022 | Daniel 9:4-10; Salmos 79:8-9, 11, 13; Lucas 6:36-38

Cuando damos, abrimos la puerta para permitir que el Señor derrame Su amor en nosotros. El Señor quiere bendecirnos con “buena medida, apretada, sacudida y desbordante” (Lc 6:38). Sin embargo, no nos obliga a recibir Su amor. Debemos abrirnos a Su amor. Al dar, le decimos a Dios lo abiertos que estamos a recibir. “Porque la medida con que ustedes midan también se usará para ustedes” (Lc 6:38).

La mayoría de las personas se consideran "generosas", pero esto a menudo no es del todo exacto. Los problemas económicos de las iglesias, la falta de vocaciones religiosas y nuestras “celebraciones” superficiales de la Misa son señales que nos cuesta dar. Esto es de esperar porque el tipo de dar de Dios va en contra de nuestra naturaleza humana egoísta. Cuando admitimos nuestros problemas en dar, podemos pedirle a Dios que nos ayude.

El dar no es principalmente cuestión de finanzas, sino a menudo de perdón. Por eso el Señor nos manda que nos perdonemos los unos a los otros antes de mandarnos a dar (Lc 6:37). En el versículo recitado justo antes de perdonar, Jesús nos ordena no juzgar ni condenar a los demás (Lc 6:37). Las claves para dar son las de perdonar y de no juzgar ni condenar.

Oración: Padre, que pueda ver la renuencia a dar libremente como síntoma de falta de perdón.

Promesa: ¡Ah, Señor, Dios, el Grande, el Temible, el que mantiene la alianza y la fidelidad con aquellos que lo aman y observan sus mandamientos!" (Dn 9:4)

Alabanza: Stuart perdonó a su padre por abusar de él cuando era niño.
