THE DIGNITY TO GIVE AND RECEIVE

"Nobody is so poor that he/she has nothing to give, and nobody is so rich that he/she has nothing to receive." WHAT'S THE SMOKE FOR?

Dear Johan,

I saw a young woman with crosses as earrings and at least a dozen rosaries and several pectoral crosses around her neck. I was appalled. It seems to me that the cross is the most important symbol of Christianity. How dare she mock it so?

Gentle Reader,

I must have seen the same woman recently, or else this has become an unhappy trend.

Your question reminds me of a scene that played out many years ago. My younger brother came home from university with a small silver crucifix dangling from his ear. Without saying a word, my mom walked over to him and took it (read: yanked it) out of his ear. To this day I am not sure what displeased my mom the most: the fact that he had his ear pierced or the fact that he wore a cross as an earring.

The cross is the most recognizable symbol of Christianity. However, as is the case with many things we now take for granted, it has not always been thus. It took a while before the cross and especially the crucifix or any other depictions of Christ, Mary, and the saints were accepted. Two factors were at play.

First, early Christians displayed a general timidity toward imagery at best and engaged in the occasional full-fledged period of iconoclasm at worst. It was not until the Second Council of Nicea (787) that matters were settled once and for all. After tumultuous debates, this council not only denounced iconoclasm but it also called for the depictions of Christ, Mary, and the saints with the admonition that when one adores an image one really adores the one represented by the image.

Second, the death of Jesus on the cross was neither expected by his followers nor was it readily embraced. Death by crucifixion was one of the worst condemnations. Roman citizens, for example, could not be punished by crucifixion. In a sense, the cross was experienced as a scandal and an embarrassment. So they concentrated on the resurrection, rather than on the death of Jesus.

Gradually the Christian community came to embrace the scandal of the cross as the mystery of salvation. And by the early third century the cross had become closely associated with Christianity. Clement of Alexandria (150–ca. 215) referred to the cross as *tὸ κυριακὸν σημεῖον* or the Lord's sign. And according to Tertullian (160–220) Christians are *crucis religiosi* or devotees of the cross.

Today the cross is ubiquitous and it is undoubtedly the most recognizable symbol in the entire world. We top our church steeples with crosses. We hang crosses in our homes, in our cars, and around our necks. We even tattoo crosses on our bodies. Most often this is done in good faith and in good taste. Sometimes it is done in a misguided attempt at unfortunate fashion. In some rare and regrettable instances the cross is intentionally desecrated.

Although I can understand why the sight of the young woman may have given you cause for concern, let's take consolation in the fact that by the cross we have been saved and nothing can take that away, not even ill-advised use or malicious abuse.

AS GOOD A WITNESS AS I WANT TO BE

"With power the apostles bore witness to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus." —Acts 4:33

Our secular humanistic society hardly notices when we Christians proclaim that Jesus is risen from the dead. Our message of the Resurrection is effortlessly ignored and often militantly denied and ridiculed. We clearly lack power as witnesses for the risen Lord.

The Holy Spirit, Who is Power (Lk 24:49; Acts 1:8), will give us the power that we lack. All we need do is obey Him (Acts 5:32). Traditionally, the Holy Spirit has given us power by giving communal and economic commands. The Spirit commands us to devote ourselves to the communal life (Acts 2:42) and to accept His grace to be of one mind and heart (Acts 4:32). He commands many of us to hold things in common (Acts 4:32; 2:44). He commands not a few of us to liquidate our property and to give the proceeds to the Church (Acts 4:34ff).

How much do you believe in the risen Christ? How powerful do you want to be as His witness? Maximum power is available to you. Obey the Spirit and especially His communal and economic commands.

Prayer: *Father, I repent of making excuses for my powerlessness. May I trust You and be strengthened with every power, in accord with His glorious might (see Col 1:11).*

Promise: *"'Peace be with you,' [Jesus] said again. 'As the Father has sent Me, so I send you.' Then He breathed on them and said: 'Receive the Holy Spirit.'" —Jn 20:21-22*

Praise: *All praise and honor to you, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit! Thank You for pouring down Your many graces on us.*

DISCIPLES MAKING DISCIPLES

Q. What is the difference between the Baptism of infants and the Baptism of adults?

A. In its essentials, Baptism is the same regardless of the age of the person being baptized. But the celebrations are meant to meet the different spiritual needs of those two different circumstances.

Infants are usually baptized within the first months after birth. The sacrament can be celebrated outside of Mass, but the preferred setting is during a Sunday Mass with the Baptism of several children together and the whole parish community joining in the celebration. Baptism is not just a family moment: it is a parish moment. Every Christian has cause for rejoicing when a new member is joined to the Body of Christ through Baptism. So important is the presence of the parish community, in fact, that for children who were baptized in emergency circumstances in a hospital or another institution, the Church provides a special Rite of Bringing a Baptized Child to the Church, to be introduced to and welcomed by the parish community.

The Rite of Baptism for children begins with a welcome of the children and their families. The parents are invited to say aloud the name they have given their child, and then the priest, parents, and godparents make the Sign of the Cross on the child's forehead, claiming the child for Christ. Following the readings and homily, the saints are invoked, a prayer of exorcism is prayed, asking that the child be freed from Original Sin, and the child is anointed with the Oil of Catechumens. The parents and godparents then make a profession of their own faith, for they are entrusted with handing on that faith to the child. Baptism follows, along with the "Explanatory Rites," which provide images for the new life of the baptized—the white garment, the lighted candle, and the anointing with Chrism. Those baptized as infants will receive the other sacraments of initiation—Confirmation and Eucharist—much later.

While infants can be baptized at almost any time of the year, for adults the time for Baptism is at the Easter Vigil, the high point of the Church's liturgical year. (Of course, in case of emergency, Baptism for adults can happen at any time.) In this way, the preparation and Baptism of adults corresponds to the liturgical year. The Period of Purification and Enlightenment, a time of intense prayer and preparation for the sacraments, coincides with the season of Lent, when the whole Church is focused on prayer, penance, and preparation for Easter. The Baptism of adults, by which they are united with the Paschal Mystery of Christ's dying and rising, takes place in the very heart of the Church's celebration of the Resurrection of Christ. And the time of mystagogy, a deepening awareness of the sacraments they have received, unfolds in the context of Easter Time, the joyful days between Easter and Pentecost.

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults outlines a rich series of prayers and rituals for adults preparing for Baptism, which follow (over time) much the same pattern as infant Baptism. Their journey formally begins with admission into the Order of Catechumens through the Rite of Acceptance, in which their foreheads, their senses, and even their hands, feet, and shoulders are marked with the Sign of the Cross. On the Third, Fourth, and Fifth Sundays of Lent, the scrutinies—prayers of exorcism—are prayed over the elect. Then, at the Easter Vigil, they receive the three sacraments of initiation, one after the other, in keeping with the most ancient practice in the Church: Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist.

No sucede demasiado a menudo que el autor de uno de los libros de la Biblia se dirija directamente a nosotros para explicarnos por qué está escribiendo lo que está escribiendo. En la lectura del Evangelio de este domingo, que pertenece a la conclusión del Evangelio según san Juan, el autor nos dice que ha elegido escribir estos acontecimientos para que “crean que Jesús es el Mesías, el Hijo de Dios, y para que, creyendo, tengan vida en su Nombre” (20:31).

La carta de san Juan retoma esta idea diciendo que: “todo el que cree que Jesús es el Cristo ha nacido de Dios” (5:1); lo que llamaríamos “nacer de nuevo”. Nuestra lectura de los Hechos de los Apóstoles para este Segundo Domingo de Pascua nos muestra exactamente qué sucede cuando los creyentes nacen de nuevo por medio de la fe.

DISCÍPULOS HACIENDO DISCÍPULOS

Pregunta: ¿Qué hace el bautismo por nosotros?

Respuesta: "Cristiano, recuerda tu dignidad", dice san León Magno en un sermón de Navidad, "...y ahora que compartes la propia naturaleza de Dios, no regreses, por el pecado, a tu antigua condición natural" (Del Oficio de Lectura para Navidad, Sermón 1, *Nativitate Domini*). San Pedro lo dijo así: "Ustedes son una raza elegida, sacerdocio real, nación santa y pueblo adquirido... Los que antes no eran pueblo, ahora son pueblo de Dios; los que antes no habían alcanzado misericordia, ahora la han alcanzado" (1 Pedro 2:9-10).

¿Qué es lo que confiere una dignidad tan grande? ¿Qué convierte a alguien que no es nadie en pueblo de Dios, en sacerdote, rey y participe en la propia naturaleza de Dios? El sacramento del bautismo.

Mediante el bautismo, participamos en la muerte y resurrección de Cristo y nos convertimos en nueva creación: hijos adoptivos de Dios. El bautismo nos cambia. De hecho, el bautismo lo cambia todo. El bautismo es tan trascendental como la muerte y el nacimiento: en el bautismo, morimos con Cristo, y nacemos de nuevo como hijos amados de Dios. Quedamos incorporados al cuerpo de Cristo, uniéndonos con otros creyentes, orientándonos hacia una vida de testimonio cristiano, viviendo en comunidad. El bautismo lava todo pecado, original y personal, y nos libera para vivir según el nuevo mandamiento del amor: amando y sirviendo a Dios y al prójimo en esta vida, y preparándonos para la vida eterna. El bautismo marca un cambio decisivo en nuestras vidas. En el Rito del Bautismo, rechazamos explícitamente a Satanás y al poder del mal, y nos volvemos a Dios, profesando nuestra fe en la Trinidad (Padre, Hijo y Espíritu Santo), para caminar bajo la luz de Cristo.

En el rito bautismal, el sacerdote o el diácono ora: "Ahora, él los unge con el Crisma de la salvación para que, unidos con su pueblo, permanezcan para siempre miembros de Cristo que es Sacerdote, Profeta y Rey" (Oración después de la Unción con el Crisma). Por nuestro bautismo, somos llamados a ser como Cristo: actuar como "sacerdotes, profetas y reyes" en el mundo. Suena imposible. Pero, ¿qué hace un sacerdote? Él intercede ante Dios en nombre de la comunidad. Eso es lo que hacemos como miembros del sacerdocio de los bautizados: damos culto a Dios e intercedemos por el mundo entero en nuestra oración. ¿Qué hacen los profetas? Ellos anuncian y proclaman la voluntad de Dios para el mundo. Hacemos lo mismo cuando nuestra fe nos motiva a actuar en favor de los oprimidos y a vivir nuestras vidas como ejemplo del mensaje del Evangelio. ¿Y cuál es la tarea de reyes y reinas? Ellos son elegidos por Dios para cuidar al pueblo y guiarlo con la sabiduría de la ley de Dios. En el bautismo, somos ungidos para servir, a ejemplo de Cristo: lavándonos los pies los unos a los otros.

El bautismo trae consigo inmensos privilegios e inmensas responsabilidades. Nos reunimos en oración los domingos y los días festivos como comunidad de creyentes. Celebramos los sacramentos, especialmente el del Cuerpo y la Sangre del Señor, la Eucaristía, nuestra gran oración de acción de gracias. Estamos llamados a conocer la ley de Dios y a obedecerla. Pero esto es sólo el comienzo. Para cada cristiano, la vivencia del bautismo será diferente, ya que cada uno de nosotros tiene una vocación particular, y Dios llama a cada uno de manera >>>>

TAN BUEN TESTIGO COMO QUIERO SER

"Los Apóstoles daban testimonio con mucho poder de la resurrección del Señor Jesús" (Hechos 4:33).

Nuestra sociedad humanista y secular apenas se da cuenta cuando los cristianos proclamamos que Jesús ha resucitado de entre los muertos. Nuestro mensaje de la Resurrección es ignorado y a menudo, militarmente negado y ridiculizado. Claramente nos falta poder como testigos del Señor resucitado.

El Espíritu Santo, el cual es Poder (Lc 24:49; Hch 1:8), nos dará el poder que nos falta. Todo lo que necesitamos hacer es obedecerle (Hch 5:32). Tradicionalmente, el Espíritu Santo nos ha dado poder al darnos órdenes comunales y económicas. El Espíritu nos ordena que nos dediquemos a la vida comunitaria (Hch 2:42) y que aceptemos Su gracia para ser de una sola mente y un solo corazón (Hch 4:32). Él ordena a muchos de nosotros que tengamos las cosas en común (Hch 4:32, 2:44). Él no manda a algunos de nosotros a liquidar nuestra propiedad y dar los ingresos a la Iglesia (Hch 4:34ss).

¿Cuánto crees en el Cristo resucitado? ¿Qué tan poderoso quieres ser como Su testigo? El poder máximo está a tu disposición. Obedece al Espíritu y especialmente a Sus mandamientos comunales y económicos.

Oración: Padre, me arrepiento de hacer excusas por mi impotencia. Que pueda confiar en Ti y ser fortalecido con todo el poder, de acuerdo con Tu poder glorioso (ver Col 1:11).

Promesa: "Jesús les dijo de nuevo: '¡La paz esté con ustedes! Como el Padre me envió a mí, yo también los envío a ustedes'. Al decirles esto sopló sobre ellos y añadió 'Reciban al Espíritu Santo'" (Jn 20:21-22).

Alabanza: ¡Alabado seas, Padre, Hijo y Espíritu Santo! Gracias por derramar Tus muchos dones sobre nosotros. <http://www.presentationministries.com/obob/obob.asp?lang=es&d=4/8/2018>
