A meal together is one of the most intimate and sacred human events. Around the table we become vulnerable, filling one another's plates and cups and encouraging one another to eat and drink. Much more happens at a meal than satisfying hunger and quenching thirst. Around the table we become family, friends, community, yes, a body.

That is why it is so important to "set" the table. Flowers, candles, colorful napkins all help us to say to one another, "This is a very special time for us, let's enjoy it!"

The table is one of the most intimate places in our lives. It is there that we give ourselves to one another. February 2018 | Say "No" to Corruption

That those who have material, political or spiritual power may resist any lure of corruption.

"HE LOVES ME. HE LOVES ME NOT. HE LOVES ME..."

"A cloud came, overshadowing them, and out of the cloud a voice: 'This is My Son, My Beloved. Listen to Him.' " — Mark 9:7

"God is for us" (Rm 8:31). He "did not spare His own Son but handed Him over for the sake of us all" (Rm 8:32). After that, will He not "grant us all things besides?" (Rm 8:32) God couldn't love us more. He loves us unconditionally, sacrificially, infinitely, perfectly, and eternally.

Nevertheless, God does things and allows things in our lives which we can't understand. Although this should make us question our powers of understanding, we are instead tempted to question God's love.

To dispel all doubts about His love, the Lord does not necessarily explain in detail why things are the way they are. Rather, He speaks to us of His cross. He does not always explain why we suffer but rather that He suffered and died for love of us. Jesus joined humanity in its sufferings. Jesus is Emmanuel, that is, "God with us" in suffering (see Mt 1:23).

To learn the lessons of love in the midst of suffering, we must listen to Jesus when He speaks of the cross (see Mk 9:7). This is a difficult subject for us. However, it is Jesus' favorite subject, and because Jesus is our transfigured Lord and God, we listen to Him.

Prayer: *Father, send the Holy Spirit to help me to listen to Jesus about crucified love.*

Promise: *"I swear by Myself, declares the Lord, that because you acted as you did in not withholding from Me your beloved son, I will bless you abundantly." —Gn 22:16-17*

Praise: *Praise Jesus, transfigured, crucified, risen, and glorified God!*

THE BASIS OF OUR SECURITY

What is the basis of our security? When we start thinking about that question, we may give many answers: success, money, friends, property, popularity, family, connections, insurance, and so on. We may not always think that any of these forms the basis of our security, but our actions or feelings may tell us otherwise. When we start losing our money, our friends, or our popularity, our anxiety often reveals how deeply our sense of security is rooted in these things.

A spiritual life is a life in which our security is based not in any created things, good as they may be, but in God, who is everlasting love. We probably will never be completely free from our attachment to the temporal world, but if we want to live in that world in a truly free way, we'd better not belong to it. INFLUENZA, SUSPENSION OF CUP & OTHER PRECAUTIONS

The California Department of Public Health (CDPH) has indicated that the incidence of flu and flu-like illnesses has reached a level requiring that we take action to mitigate the possibility of infection at Mass. In order to protect the health and well-being of everyone, Bishop Soto has issued the following directives:

- ◆ The use of Communion cup is suspended temporarily.
- ◆ Receive the Body of Christ in the hand (although receiving on the tongue is permitted).
- ◆ Do not shake hands. Offer the Sign of peace to those around you with a simple nod, saying "peace be with you."
- ◆ Do not hold hands during the Our Father.
- ◆ Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion are to cleanse their hands with an alcohol-based antiseptic before and after administering Holy Communion. This also applies to those who take Communion to the Home-bound.
- ◆ Remember that the obligation to attend Sunday Mass does not apply to those who are ill, especially those who suffer from flu-like symptoms. Thank you for your patience and understanding during this time.

"Dios está con nosotros" (Rom 8:31). Él "no escatimó a su propio Hijo, sino que lo entregó por todos nosotros" (Rom 8:32). Después de todo "¿no nos concederá con Él toda clase de favores?" (Rom 8:32) Dios no podía amarnos más. Él nos ama incondicional, sacrificial, infinita, perfecta y eternamente.

Sin embargo, Dios hace cosas y permite algunas cosas en nuestras vidas que no podemos entender. Aunque esto debería hacernos cuestionar nuestros poderes de entendimiento, en vez de eso, estamos tentados a cuestionar el amor de Dios.

Para disipar todas las dudas sobre Su amor, el Señor no necesariamente explica en detalle por qué las cosas son como son. Más bien, nos habla de Su cruz. Él no siempre explica por qué sufrimos, sino que Él sufrió y murió por amor a nosotros. Jesús unió a la humanidad en Sus sufrimientos. Jesús es Emmanuel, que significa, "Dios con nosotros" en el sufrimiento (ver Mt 1:23).

Para aprender las lecciones del amor en medio del sufrimiento, debemos escuchar a Jesús cuando el habla de la cruz (ver Mc 9:7). Este es un tema difícil para nosotros. Sin embargo, es el tema favorito de Jesús, y debido a que Jesús es nuestro Señor transfigurado y Dios, lo escuchamos.

Oración: *Padre, envía al Espíritu Santo para que me ayude a escuchar a Jesús acerca del amor crucificado.*

Promesa: "Juro por mí mismo –oráculo del Señor: porque has obrado de esa manera y no me has negado a tu hijo único, yo te colmaré de bendiciones" (Gn 22:16-17).

Alabanza: *¡Alabado sea Jesús, transfigurado, crucificado, resucitado y Dios glorificado*
