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REFLECTIONS

RAPID AIR TRANSPORTATION TO MEDICAL FACILITIES AVAILABLE TO OUR COMMUNITY.

We have three general aviation airports in our vicinity, one here in South Lake Tahoe, one in Minden and another one in Carson City. They can be put to work for our community to help people get to and from distant facilities in a much shorter time with less fatigue. Angel Flight West (AFW) is a nonprofit, volunteer-driven organization that arranges free, non-emergency air transportation within the 12 Western states for children and adults with serious medical conditions and other compelling needs. AFW matches volunteer pilots to people in need, enabling them to receive medical treatment and other essential services that might otherwise be inaccessible because of financial, medical, or geographic circumstances. The service can provide direct door to door transportation in a week notice. Everyone who flies must be medically stable, ambulatory, and able to board and exit the plane with limited assistance. A family person can accompany you if necessary. To be eligible for a mission, a person must demonstrate a financial need or other compelling reason, such as an inability to use public transportation because of a weakened immune system or other medical condition, or living in a rural area that doesn't have easy access to commercial transportation. SINS OF OMISSION | "When a man knows the right thing to do and does not do it, he sins." —James 4:17

Sins are not just what we commit but also what we omit. We will be judged not only for what we say (Mt 12:36) but also for what we don't say (see Ez 3:18; 33:6). We will be judged not only for lending our presence to things that do not glorify God (see 1 Cor 10:31) but also for our absences from the assembly of God's people (Heb 10:25) and from other works of the Lord.

Before we were created, the Lord prepared a life of good deeds for each of us to do (Eph 2:10). He holds us accountable to do all of these deeds. For example, Jesus warned the church of Sardis: "Wake up, and strengthen what remains before it dies. I find that the sum of your deeds is less than complete" (Rv 3:2).

If you are sinning by omission, repent and cry out for the Lord's mercy. "He is an Offering for our sins" (1 Jn 2:2). The Lord will forgive. By His grace, we will do the impossible. We will do all that He asks of us. Live your life for Jesus to the full (see Jn 10:10).

Prayer: *Father, I put my life in Your hands.*

Promise: *"Yet in no way can a man redeem himself, or pay his own ransom to God; too high is the price to redeem one's life; he would never have enough to remain alive always and not see destruction." —Ps 49:8-10*

Praise: *St. Polycarp was a disciple of St. John the Apostle. He was also friends with St. Ignatius of Antioch and taught St. Irenaeus. May we never take for granted the richness of our Catholic faith.*

Is my Marriage Recognized by the Church?

Like other couples in your parish or family, you may be wondering if your marriage is fully recognized by the Catholic Church. Catholic Church law ordinarily requires baptized Roman Catholics to marry before a priest or deacon. Unless they received a “dispensation from canonical form,” Catholics who exchange vows in the presence of ministers from other religious traditions or civil officials are not considered validly married in the eyes of the Catholic Church.

Regardless of what happened in the past, the Catholic Church invites you to bring new meaning to your lives by embracing the vocation of marriage and dedicating your family’s mission to sharing God’s love.

Why Marry Catholic?

Catholic Marriage is unique among other marital relationships because it is a sacrament that makes Christ present in our world. The relationship between husband and wife mirrors the relationship of Jesus Christ for his people. In the Catholic tradition, the husband and wife accept a role in God’s plan for humanity. They are ambassadors of God’s love, and they collaborate with God to keep humanity alive.

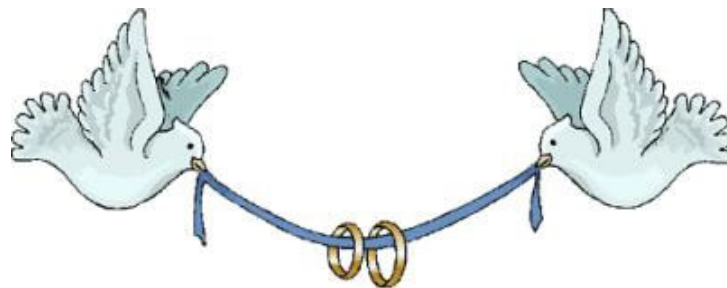
The vows exchanged by the couple are a sacred pact through which the spouses embrace each other, and together, embrace Jesus as their partner. Through their union with Christ, they participate in the unbreakable pact between God and humanity: the covenant that was sealed in the death and resurrection of Christ.

Benefits of Catholic Marriage

One of the many benefits of a sacramental marriage is the power of God’s grace, which helps couples keep their commitment and find happiness together. Social scientists are finding that couples who recognize God’s presence in their relationship experience more satisfaction and are more likely to achieve lifelong marriage.

REFLECTIONS

Dear Johan,

A new season of Lent is approaching. And Easter will be here before we know it. I want to do it well this time around. What should I know?

Gentle reader,

Yours is an important, though rather broad, question. I will see what I can do in the allotted space.

The paschal cycle (Lent and Eastertide) is the heart of the liturgical year. Together with the incarnation cycle (Advent and Christmastide) it celebrates the two great mysteries of our faith: the incarnation or the mystery of God becoming human and the paschal mystery of the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus.

The paschal cycle comprises a time of preparation (Lent) and a time of celebration (Eastertide). The hinge between these two is the Sacred Triduum.

The word lent comes from the Old English lencten, meaning springtime. In Germanic languages, a derivation of this word is still used to refer to springtime. Its use for the preparation time leading up to Easter is somewhat peculiar.

Other languages use much clearer nomenclature such as “The Forty Days” and “The Time of Fasting.” These seem to offer a more apt description of this liturgical season.

Lent is characterized by two major theological movements and three Lenten disciplines. The first and foremost movement is toward baptism. The catechumens, known as the elect after the Rite of Elections celebrated on the First Sunday of Lent, are preparing for the sacraments of initiation. Their movement is toward the baptismal waters. The baptized participate in the second movement, which is toward reconciliation, as we prepare ourselves to celebrate the Easter mysteries worthily. The three great Lenten disciplines of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving assist us in our journey toward baptism or reconciliation.

Lent culminates in the Sacred Triduum, the sacred three days of Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday, and Easter Sunday. You will note that there actually are four days and not three. In order to reconcile the four days and the three you simply have to know that we calculate in liturgical time, that is, from sunset to sunset. Thus the Sacred Triduum begins with sunset on Holy Thursday and runs through sunset on Easter Sunday. On Holy Thursday we remember how Jesus commanded us to celebrate the Eucharist and to wash one another’s feet. In other words, he told us to pray and to serve. On Good Friday we remember Jesus’ death and venerate the cross. On Holy Saturday we wait in silence for the arrival of dusk when we engage in the most important liturgy of the entire year: the great Easter Vigil, when we celebrate the mystery of Christ’s life, death, and resurrection and our incorporation into that mystery by virtue of our baptism.

The fifty days of Eastertide are a time of unending joy and continued celebration. This poses a bit of a challenge as we love to prepare for a feast, but we really don’t know how to celebrate, let alone for fifty long days. That’s why Lent is such a great success, and Easter at a great loss. So maybe, if you really want the paschal cycle to be the best ever, you might want to concentrate on celebrating Easter for fifty days rather than one day or maybe two.

Two feasts punctuate Eastertide: Ascension and Pentecost. On Ascension Thursday, which is traditionally celebrated forty days after Easter, we remember the ascent of Christ into heaven. It is also the day when we celebrate that Christ promised the Holy Spirit to all his followers. The novena or nine days of prayer for the gifts of the Holy Spirit begins the next day. In the United States this feast is transferred to the Sunday after Ascension Thursday. Though this move makes it easier for everyone to observe the holy day, it does upset the liturgical order of things.

On Pentecost, which comes from the Greek for fiftieth day and is indeed celebrated fifty days after Easter, we celebrate the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on the apostles. From this day on, the apostles and their missionary successors have spread the message of Jesus to the world. Therefore, this feast also celebrates the birth of the church and its vital and diverse nature.

And here you have it in a nutshell: the paschal cycle described in 670 words. I hope you will find some of these words helpful as you prepare for a fruitful celebration of the paschal mystery.

REFLECTIONS

JESUS LOVES THE DIVORCED

“Whoever divorces his wife and marries another commits adultery against her; and the woman who divorces her husband and marries another commits adultery.” —Mark 10:11-12

Jesus does not believe in divorce, and He never will (see Heb 13:8). In fact, Jesus hates divorce (Mal 2:16). Of course, this does not mean that He hates those who are divorced. The very reason He hates divorce is because He loves those who are divorced and did not want to see them hurt by divorce.

The Church, as the Body of Christ, has always been true to Jesus, the Head of the Body, and has opposed divorce. In recent decades, some denominations, not in full communion with the Catholic Church, have ignored Jesus’ words forbidding divorce and second marriages. The Catholic Church has recognized that divorce is sometimes not the fault of divorced persons, but something imposed on them by their spouses. In this case, those divorced are not rejecting Jesus’ prohibition of divorce but are victims of injustice. The Catholic Church has also realized that not every marriage is a marriage by God’s standards. Therefore, some second marriages are actually first and only marriages by God’s standards. However, individuals should not discern that for themselves. The Church alone has that responsibility.

Taking into account these clarifications, as Christians we must oppose divorce and second marriages. We must say, do, and love as Jesus does.

Prayer: *Father, thank You for the divorced who have unilaterally been faithful to their marriage vows.*

Promise: *“You have heard of the steadfastness of Job, and have seen what the Lord, Who is compassionate and merciful, did in the end.” —Jas 5:11*

Praise: *Joseph met his wife in a support group for divorced persons after their first marriages were annulled.*

5.3.2. Cada Reunión Internacional de Conferencias Episcopales nombrará asimismo un responsable que pueda ser referente y enlace tanto con las Conferencias Episcopales como Secretaría General del Sínodo. (Antes de septiembre de 2022).

5.3.3. Discernimiento pres-sinodal en las Asambleas continentales. Se establecerán los criterios de participación de los obispos residenciales y de los demás miembros del Pueblo de Dios.

5.3.4. Las Asambleas concluirán con la redacción de un documento final, que se enviará a la Secretaría General del Sínodo. (En marzo de 2023).

A este reconocimiento oficial de la Iglesia se le da el nombre de convalidación.”

EL MANUAL PARA AMAR ENEMIGOS | “Yo les digo a ustedes que Me escuchan: ‘Amen a sus enemigos’” (Lucas 6:27).

Domingo, 20 de febrero de 2022; 7mo domingo de T. Ordinario | 1 Samuel 26:2, 7-9, 12-13, 22-23; Salmos 103:1-4, 8, 10, 12-13; 1 Corinthians 15:45-49 | Lucas 6:27-38

Amar a los enemigos es más que una actitud. Se expresa en:

- acciones. “Hagan el bien a los que los odian” (Lc 6:27).
- habla. “Bendigan a los que los maldicen” (Lc 6:28).
- oración. “Rueguen por los que los difaman” (Lc 6:28).

Amar es tender la mano, incluso a los enemigos. No podemos extender la mano y al mismo tiempo estar a la defensiva. Nuestra actitud defensiva, que es nuestra reacción natural ante los enemigos, debe dejarse de lado si queremos acercarnos a ellos con amor. Por eso, Jesús enseña: “Al que te pegue en una mejilla, preséntale también la otra” (Lc 6:29). Además, cuando juzgamos o condenamos a otros, reaccionamos ante ellos para justificarnos, protegernos y defendernos. Esta actitud defensiva es incompatible con el amor. Por eso, el Señor nos manda: “No juzguen, y no serán juzgados; no condenen, y no serán condenados” (Lc 6:37). Más bien, para amar a nuestros enemigos en pensamiento, palabra, obra y oración, debemos comenzar perdonando y dando. Por eso, el Señor nos manda: “Perdonen, y serán perdonados. Dad, y se les dará” (Lc 6:37-38).

Amar a nuestros enemigos es una de las mejores pruebas de que somos hijos adoptivos de Dios (Mt 5:45). Jesús nos ha dado una explicación detallada de cómo amar a nuestros enemigos. Observa al Cristo crucificado y ama consecuentemente.

Oración: Padre, acepto Tu gracia ahora hazme aceptar a la persona que más me ofende.

Promesa: “El Señor le pagará a cada uno según su justicia y su lealtad” (1 Sm 26:23)

Alabanza: ¡Alabado seas, Jesús! ¡Has resucitado en gloria para siempre! (Mt 28:6)
