"LOW," I AM WITH YOU

"The prayer of the lowly pierces the clouds." —Sirach 35:17
Clouds can be a sign of God's presence or, figuratively speaking, a barrier preventing us from "getting through" to God. Clouds present no problem to the prayer of the lowly, for their prayer pierces the clouds.

We can surmise that the prayer of many people is not "getting through" to God, for many people pray infrequently. If they were "getting through," they probably would be encouraged to pray always (see Lk 18:1). Who wants to keep calling a phone number when you seldom "get through"? Many of us must not be lowly, or we would be "getting through" and praying more.

Signs of not being lowly are:

- not forgiving (see Mt 6:15),
- not going to Confession often,
- not submitting to the authority of the Lord through the Church (see Heb 13:17),
- focusing on ourselves (see Lk 18:11-12),
- comparing ourselves with others (see Lk 18:11),
- not washing others' feet through service (see Jn 13:14-15), and
- trying to live the "high life" of affluence and comfort.

Jesus is lowly — from the stable at Bethlehem to the cross on Calvary to appearing as bread and wine in the Eucharist. Be like the lowly Jesus, and your prayer will pierce the clouds.

Prayer: *Jesus, gentle and lowly of heart, make my heart like Yours (see Mt 11:29).*

Promise: *"The Lord will continue to rescue me from all attempts to do me harm and will bring me safe to His heavenly kingdom." —2 Tm 4:18*

Praise: *"This is the Jesus God has raised up, and we are his witnesses" (Acts 2:32). Alleluia!*

WHAT'S THE SMOKE FOR?

Dear Johan,

I saw a young woman with crosses as earrings and at least a dozen rosaries and several pectoral crosses around her neck. I was appalled. It seems to me that the cross is the most important symbol of Christianity. How dare she mock it so?

Gentle Reader,

I must have seen the same woman recently, or else this has become an unhappy trend.

Your question reminds me of a scene that played out many years ago. My younger brother came home from university with a small silver crucifix dangling from his ear. Without saying a word, my mom walked over to him and took it (read: yanked it) out of his ear. To this day I am not sure what displeased my mom the most: the fact that he had his ear pierced or the fact that he wore a cross as an earring.

The cross is the most recognizable symbol of Christianity. However, as is the case with many things we now take for granted, it has not always been thus. It took a while before the cross and especially the crucifix or any other depictions of Christ, Mary, and the saints were accepted. Two factors were at play.

First, early Christians displayed a general timidity toward imagery at best and engaged in the occasional full-fledged period of iconoclasm at worst. It was not until the Second Council of Nicea (787) that matters were settled once and for all. After tumultuous debates, this council not only denounced iconoclasm but it also called for the depictions of Christ, Mary, and the saints with the admonition that when one adores an image one really adores the one represented by the image.

Second, the death of Jesus on the cross was neither expected by his followers nor was it readily embraced. Death by crucifixion was one of the worst condemnations. Roman citizens, for example, could not be punished by crucifixion. In a sense, the cross was experienced as a scandal and an embarrassment. So they concentrated on the resurrection, rather than on the death of Jesus.

Gradually the Christian community came to embrace the scandal of the cross as the mystery of salvation. And by the early third century the cross had become closely associated with Christianity. Clement of Alexandria (150–ca. 215) referred to the cross as τὸ κυριακὸν σημεῖον or the Lord's sign. And according to Tertullian (160–220) Christians are crucis religiosi or devotees of the cross.

Today the cross is ubiquitous and it is undoubtedly the most recognizable symbol in the entire world. We top our church steeples with crosses. We hang crosses in our homes, in our cars, and around our necks. We even tattoo crosses on our bodies. Most often this is done in good faith and in good taste. Sometimes it is done in a misguided attempt at unfortunate fashion. In some rare and regrettable instances the cross is intentionally desecrated.

Although I can understand why the sight of the young woman may have given you cause for concern, let's take consolation in the fact that by the cross we have been saved and nothing can take that away, not even ill-advised use or malicious abuse.

TRADICIONES DE NUESTRA FE

El 31 de octubre muchos se visten de monstruos y al día siguiente, los cristianos celebramos a *todos* los santos. Es interesante el contraste entre los dos días. Un día recordamos brujas y zombis y al siguiente conmemoramos vírgenes y mártires, religiosos y laicos comprometidos todos con una cosa en común: su amor a Dios, un amor que se hace carne en obras de caridad y justicia.

La mayoría de los santos se hicieron santos gracias a los monstruos que los rodeaban. Los primeros mártires cristianos murieron a mano de los monstruos romanos, muchos religiosos medievales se refugiaban en Dios para protegerse de los monstruos internos que los tentaban con sexo, dinero y poder. Y en América muchos como Manuel Chin Sooj se hicieron testigos de la justicia en manos de los monstruos de gobiernos injustos.

Los monstruos, en fin no pueden vencer a los santos por eso en Guatemala el martirio de Manuel Chin Sooj, animó a los obispos guatemaltecos a unirse con la carta "El clamor de la tierra" a los esfuerzos de pobres en búsqueda de tierra y dignidad humana.

"QUE YO DISMINUYA" (JUAN 3:30)

"Y refiriéndose a algunos que se tenían por justos y despreciaban a los demás, dijo también esta parábola:" (Lucas 18:9).

La piedad del fariseo era admirable: aportaba el diez por ciento de su ingreso bruto y ayunaba dos días a la semana, probablemente un ayuno muy arduo. ¿Cuántos de nosotros damos el diezmo y ayunamos por tal o cual motivo? Sin embargo, san Lucas señala específicamente que la "oración" del fariseo se dirigía a sí mismo y no a Dios (Lc 18:11). Comparó sus virtudes con la conducta de otras personas, no con los estándares de Dios.

La piedad de los tributos no era admirable. Los cobradores de impuestos del tiempo de Jesús eran judíos que trabajaban para los romanos. Muchas veces extorsionaban a su propia gente para ganarse una mejor comisión. Tal vez esta fue la única vez que este publicano de la parábola había estado en el templo. Pero este publicano poseía la visión de ver su propia pequeñez ante Dios. También evitó compararse con los demás. En cambio, sí comparó su propia vida de pecado con la santidad de Dios, y se arrojó en manos de la misericordia de Dios (Lc 18:13).

En la segunda lectura de hoy, san Pablo parece asemejarse al fariseo más que el recaudador de impuestos. Nos "cuenta" cómo él también ha sido fiel a Dios (ver 2 Tim 4:7). Sin embargo, los comentarios de san Pablo eran un testimonio de la fidelidad del Señor en lugar de una larga lista de autoelogios para que Dios escuchara. Pablo da crédito a Dios por cualquier bien que ha hecho. El fariseo se da crédito a sí mismo, rechazando la buena obra de Dios en su vida. Cualquier cosa buena en nuestras vidas ha sido obra de Dios (Fil 2:13). Nombra, si puedes, algo "que tengas y no hayas recibido", un talento o don espiritual. "Y si lo has recibido, ¿por qué te glorías como si no lo hubieras recibido?" (1 Co 4:7).

Oración: *Jesús, que Tú "crezcas y que yo disminuya (Jn 3:30).*

Promesa: *"Pero el Señor rescata a sus servidores" (Sal 34:23).*
