TRUE INTIMACY

Human relationships easily become possessive. Our hearts so much desire to be loved that we are inclined to cling to the person who offers us love, affection, friendship, care, or support. Once we have seen or felt a hint of love, we want more of it. That explains why lovers so often bicker with each other. Lovers' quarrels are quarrels between people who want more of each other than they are able or willing to give.

It is very hard for love not to become possessive because our hearts look for perfect love and no human being is capable of that. Only God can offer perfect love.

Therefore, the art of loving includes the art of giving one another space. When we invade one another's space and do not allow the other to be his or her own free person, we cause great suffering in our relationships. But when we give another space to move and share our gifts, true intimacy becomes possible. |

THE BALANCE BETWEEN CLOSENESS AND DISTANCE

Intimacy between people requires closeness as well as distance. It is like dancing. Sometimes we are very close, touching each other or holding each other; sometimes we move away from each other and let the space between us become an area where we can freely move.

To keep the right balance between closeness and distance requires hard work, especially since the needs of the partners may be quite different at a given moment. One might desire closeness while the other wants distance. One might want to be held while the other looks for independence. A perfect balance seldom occurs, but the honest and open search for that balance can give birth to a beautiful dance, worthy to behold.

Jesus says, "No one lights a lamp to put it under a tub; they put it on the lamp-stand where it shines for everyone in the house" (Matthew 5:14-15). The most inner light is a light for the world. Let's not have "double lives"; let us allow what we live in private to be known in public.

One of the most important things we can do with our secrets is to share them in a safe place, with people we trust. When we have a good way to bring our secrets into the light and can look at them with others, we will quickly discover that we are not alone with our secrets and that our trusting friends will love us more deeply and more intimately than before. Bringing our secrets into the light creates community and inner healing. March 2018 | : Formation in Spiritual Discernment

That the Church may appreciate the urgency of formation in spiritual discernment, both on the personal and communitarian levels.

DIVINE CLEANING

Jesus "made a [kind of] whip of cords and drove sheep and oxen alike out of the temple area." —John 2:15

By cleansing the temple, Jesus may have proclaimed that the animal sacrifices of the old law were no longer necessary. This would be a shocking revelation, because animal sacrifice was called for in Leviticus and was the heart of Jewish worship. When He cleansed the temple, Jesus may have been saying He was above the Scriptures, tradition, and the Temple. He may have been saying that He was God.

The obvious response to Jesus' seemingly blasphemous action was to either stone Him or ask for a sign showing His authority to do such a thing, which would show that He was God. Jesus gave such a sign, declaring that the Temple of His body would be destroyed and then raised up on the third day (Jn 2:19).

When Jesus' body was destroyed on Calvary, He made the once-and-for-all perfect sacrifice that atoned for all sin and made animal sacrifice obsolete (Heb 10:14, 18). When Jesus rose from the dead, He showed He was God, for only God has power over death (see Jn 5:21). Only God has the power to go beyond His revelation in Leviticus and His divinely revealed tradition.

When Jesus cleansed the Temple, He was not destroying property but prefiguring the obsolescence of animal sacrifice — the heart of Jewish worship. Only God could do that. Therefore, Jesus would have to be crucified as a blasphemer unless He actually was God. If He was God, and was still crucified, then He would have to rise from the dead. Jesus rose. He is God. Amen!

Prayer: Father, may my obedience to Jesus be so radical as to be understandable to others only if they believe Jesus is God.

Promise: "God's folly is wiser than men." —1 Cor 1:25

Praise: Praise Jesus, Whose love knows no bounds! Alleluia!

FACING OUR MORTALITY | <http://henrinouwen.org/meditation/facing-our-mortality/>

We all have dreams about the perfect life: a life without pain, sadness, conflict, or war. The spiritual challenge is to experience glimpses of this perfect life right in the middle of our many struggles. By embracing the reality of our mortal life, we can get in touch with the eternal life that has been sown there. The apostle Paul expresses this powerfully when he writes: "We are subjected to every kind of hardship, but never distressed; we see no way out but we never despair; we are pursued but never cut off; knocked down, but still have some life in us; always we carry with us in our body the death of Jesus so that the life of Jesus, too, may be visible in our ... mortal flesh" (2 Corinthians 4:8-12).

Only by facing our mortality can we come in touch with the life that transcends death. Our imperfections open for us the vision of the perfect life that God in and through Jesus has promised us.

INFLUENZA, SUSPENSION OF CUP & OTHER PRECAUTIONS

The California Department of Public Health (CDPH) has indicated that the incidence of flu and flu-like illnesses has reached a level requiring that we take action to mitigate the possibility of infection at Mass. In order to protect the health and well-being of everyone, Bishop Soto has issued the following directives:

- ◆ The use of Communion cup is suspended temporarily.
- ◆ Receive the Body of Christ in the hand (although receiving on the tongue is permitted).
- ◆ Do not shake hands. Offer the Sign of peace to those around you with a simple nod, saying "peace be with you."
- ◆ Do not hold hands during the Our Father.
- ◆ Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion are to cleanse their hands with an alcohol-based antiseptic before and after administering Holy Communion. This also applies to those who take Communion to the Home-bound.
- ◆ Remember that the obligation to attend Sunday Mass does not apply to those who are ill, especially those who suffer from flu-like symptoms. Thank you for your patience and understanding during this time.

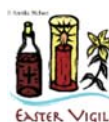

Quizás el que más nos cueste a nosotros, que siempre estamos tan ocupados, es santificar las fiestas refiriéndose al día del Señor.

Si tomáramos este mandamiento literalmente, no cambiaríamos a los bebés, los platos quedarían en la mesa y quizás ni siquiera serviríamos las comidas. Los enfermos no serían atendidos y no se haría nada que estuviera relacionado con el trabajo físico. ¿Se considera trabajo al trabajo mental? ¿Y qué hay de cambiarle el pañal al bebé (¡pobrecito!)?

Debemos depender de Dios para discernir de qué manera debemos respetar y santificar el día del Señor en nuestras vidas. La clave de este mandamiento es que Dios nos ha dado un gran regalo: un día entero por semana en el cual somos libres para descansar, rendirle culto a Dios, cantar, celebrar, amar y alegrarnos. Como proclama el Salmo 19 (18): “Los mandatos del Señor son rectos y alegran el corazón” (19 [18]:8). Nuestro descanso del domingo es un gran regalo que debemos recibir de Dios con alegría, no poniendo peros.

¿QUÉ SUCEDIÓ CON LOS DIEZ MANDAMIENTOS?
"Pero Jesús no se fiaba de ellos, porque los conocía a todos y no necesitaba que lo informaran acerca de nadie: Él sabía lo que hay en el interior del hombre" (Juan 2:24-25).

Alguien me dijo que los diez mandamientos nunca han sido más desobedecidos hoy día que en toda la historia de la raza humana. Cada vez que ponemos algo o alguien antes que Dios, rompemos el primero de los diez mandamientos y caemos en el pecado de la idolatría (ver Ex 20:3). Con respecto al segundo mandamiento, constantemente tomamos el nombre de Dios en vano por medio de las comunicaciones que transmiten este pecado a millones de personas (ver Ex 20:7). ¿Guardamos el día sábado para santificar al Señor? (Ex 20:8) ¿Son pocas las personas que trabajan los domingos? ¿Celebramos la resurrección de Jesús cada domingo o es el domingo un día para los falsos dioses: para mi mismo, el dinero, el placer y los deportes? ¿Son los padres más honrados de lo que solían ser? (ver Ex 20:12) ¿Tus hijos te obedecen mejor de lo que obedeciste a tus padres? En un solo año en los Estados Unidos, matamos a más de nueve millones de bebés por medio de abortos quirúrgicos y químicos, aún cuando el Señor nos prohíbe matar (véase Ex 20:13). ¿El adulterio y fornicación son cosas del pasado? (Vea Ex 20:14) ¿Casi todos son virgen cuando se casan? ¿Es raro que una persona casada engañe a su cónyuge? ¿Los divorciados caen en el pecado sexual? ¿Necesitamos menos policías, cerraduras y seguridad porque hay menos robos de lo que solían suceder? (Ver Ex 20:15) ¿Alguien manifiesta falso testimonio en la corte, en el trabajo, en la conversación o en la televisión? (Ver Ex 20:16) ¿Se nos enseña a no codiciar, o se nos enseña a obtener lo que queremos aunque tengamos que pecar? (Ex 20:17)
