ABOUT ADVENT WREATHS

Traditionally, Advent wreaths are constructed of a circle of evergreen branches into which four candles are inserted, representing the four weeks of Advent. Ideally, three candles are purple and one is rose, but white candles can also be used.

The purple candles in particular symbolize the prayer, penance, and preparatory sacrifices and goods works undertaken at this time. The rose candle is lit on the third Sunday, **Gaudete Sunday**, when the priest also wears rose vestments at Mass; Gaudete Sunday is the Sunday of rejoicing, because the faithful have arrived at the midpoint of Advent, when their preparation is now half over and they are close to Christmas.

The progressive lighting of the candles symbolizes the expectation and hope surrounding our Lord's first coming into the world and the anticipation of his second coming to judge the living and the dead.

REMUNERATION OF PRIESTS IN ACTIVE MINISTRY

Dear Parishioners,

After consultation and discussion, Bishop Soto has approved a revised Remuneration Policy for the Priests of the Diocese of Sacramento and promulgated it to be effective January 1, 2018. During the next few weeks, I will share with you some of the mains points.

The Remuneration of Priests in active ministry is broken into four categories:

1. Compensation
2. Benefits
3. Reimbursements
4. Entitlements

“ENTITLEMENTS”

The following entitlements are to be seen as a supplement to the existing compensation schedule for priests in active ministry.

1. Meals

The ordinary expectation for priest(s) living in a rectory is that 3 meals a day be provided.

It should be the ordinary practice that the priests living together in a rectory share at least three (3) meals in common per week.

Meals need to be healthy and wholesome. Consideration of likes and dislikes of foods served ought to be decided in common.

When meals are not provided in the rectory and the priest must dine in a restaurant, reimbursement is paid by source of income. Receipts must be presented in their original format to receive reimbursement.

When meals are eaten outside of the rectory on a priest's day off, the expenses are the responsibility of the individual priest and are not reimbursable.

When meals are provided in the rectory and a priest instead chooses to eat at a restaurant, the expenses are the responsibility of the individual priest and are not reimbursable.

Entertainment Meals – The use of parish funds for periodic entertainment with either fellow priests or friends and family should be kept to a minimum. The receipt should include the purpose of the meal and the names of the guests.

2. Telephone

Priests with an assignment in the diocese are required to have a cell phone. The cost of this phone will be reimbursed up to \$100 per month from the priest's source of income.

The reimbursement is capped at \$100 per month total. However, if the priest's phone costs are less than \$100 they are reimbursed for the actual amount paid.

The priest is required to provide a copy of his personal cell phone bill to receive the reimbursement.

The priest is to reimburse the parish or source of income for any personal long-distance telephone calls made on the phone system of the parish or source of income.

3. Wine and other alcoholic beverages

It is suggested that each parish rectory maintain wine and other alcoholic beverages which the priests of the house may use in moderation, including when they have personal visitors. Anything over and above this is the responsibility of the individual priest himself.

4. Animals and Pets

The food and care of pets which a priest keeps are the responsibility of the individual priest himself. NOTE: The priest will be required to pay the Parish for the cost of damages done to the rectory by his pet.

EXCHANGING WILLS

"Why do You let us wander, O Lord, from Your ways, and harden our hearts so that we fear You not?" —Isaiah 63:17 The author of today's passage from the book of the prophet Isaiah laments to the Lord that his fellow Israelites are so prone to turning their backs to God. This causes the prophet to beg God to return to His people. This prophet has the true spirit of Advent: He is waiting for the coming of the Lord with a heart that longs to make changes so that God's will would be done on earth as it is in heaven.

We humans were born with a rebellious nature and a stubborn, selfish will. However, we are not doomed to rebellion against the Lord. In this season in which the world exchanges gifts, God offers us the greatest possible gift exchange. He lets us exchange our will for His. He gives us His perfect will; we give Him our selfish, unwatchful will.

In these days of Advent, ask the Lord to conform your will to His (Rm 12:2). Let this be your Advent prayer: "'Not my will but Yours be done' (Lk 22:42). 'Your will be done on earth as it is in heaven' (Mt 6:10). 'Be it done to me according to Your will' (see Lk 1:38). 'To do Your will, O my God, is my delight' " (Ps 40:9).

Prayer: "Lord, make us turn to You; let us see Your face and we shall be saved" (today's psalm response from Mass).

Promise: "He will strengthen you to the end, so that you will be blameless on the day of our Lord Jesus [Christ]." —1 Cor 1:8

Praise: Praise You, risen Jesus, Emmanuel, "God with us!" You became flesh and dwelt among us. Praise You for letting us see Your glory (Jn 1:14).

ACERCA DE LA CORONA DE ADVIENTO

Tradicionalmente, las coronas de Adviento se construyen de un círculo de ramas de hoja perenne en la que se insertan cuatro velas, que representan las cuatro semanas de Adviento. Idealmente, tres velas son de color púrpura y una es rosa, pero velas blancas también se pueden utilizar.

Las velas de color púrpura en particular, simbolizan la oración, penitencia y sacrificios y obras preparatorias de mercancías llevadas a cabo en este momento. La vela rosa se enciende en el tercer domingo de **Gaudete domingo**, cuando el cura también lleva las vestiduras de rosa en la misa; Gaudete domingo es el domingo de regocijo, porque los fieles han llegado al punto medio de Adviento, cuando su preparación es ahora la mitad una y que están cerca de la Navidad.

La iluminación progresiva de las velas simboliza la expectativa y la esperanza de nuestro Señor rodea primera entrada en el mundo y la anticipación de su segunda venida a juzgar a los vivos y los muertos. <http://www.usccb.org/prayer-and-worship/liturgical-year/advent/about-advent-wreaths.cfm>

INTERCAMBIO DE VOLUNTADES

“Por qué, Señor, nos desvías de tus caminos y endureces nuestros corazones para que dejen de temerte?” (Isaías 63:17).

El autor del pasaje de hoy del libro del profeta Isaías lamenta al Señor que sus hermanos israelitas son tan propensos a dar la espalda a Dios. Esto hace que el profeta implique a Dios que regrese a Su pueblo. Este profeta tiene el verdadero espíritu del Adviento: está esperando la venida del Señor con un corazón que anhela hacer cambios para que la voluntad de Dios se haga en la tierra como en el cielo.

Los seres humanos nacimos con una naturaleza rebelde y una voluntad obstinada y egoísta. Sin embargo, no estamos condenados a la rebelión contra el Señor. En esta temporada en la que el mundo intercambia regalos, Dios nos ofrece el mayor intercambio de regalos posible. Él nos permite intercambiar nuestra voluntad por la Suya. Él nos da Su perfecta voluntad; nosotros le damos nuestra voluntad egoísta y despreocupada.

En estos días de Adviento, pídale al Señor que conforme tu voluntad a la Suya (Rom 12:2).
