JESUS LIVING WITHIN US | *Henri Nouwen Society*

When we gather around the Eucharistic table and eat from the same bread and drink from the same cup, saying, "This is the Body and Blood of Christ," we become the living Christ, here and now.

Our faith in Jesus is not our belief that Jesus, the Son of God, lived long ago, performed great miracles, presented wise teachings, died for us on the cross, and rose from the grave. It first of all means that we fully accept the truth that Jesus lives within us and fulfills his divine ministry in and through us. This spiritual knowledge of the Christ living in us is what allows us to affirm fully the mystery of the incarnation, death, and resurrection as historic events. It is the Christ in us who reveals to us the Christ in history.

JESUS LIVING AMONG US | *Henri Nouwen Society*

The Eucharist is the place where Jesus becomes most present to us because he becomes not only the Christ living within us but also the Christ living among us. Just as the disciples at Emmaus who had recognised Jesus in the breaking of the bread discovered a new intimacy between themselves and found the courage to return to their friends, we who have received the Body and Blood of Jesus will find a new unity among ourselves. As we realise that Christ lives within us, we also come to realise that Christ lives among us and makes us into a body of people witnessing together to the presence of Christ in the world.

SACRAMENT OF UNITY | *Henri Nouwen Society*

The Eucharist is the sacrament of unity. It makes us into one body. The apostle Paul writes: "As there is one loaf, so we, although there are many of us, are one single body, for we all share in the one loaf" (1 Corinthians 10:17). The Eucharist is much more than a place where we celebrate our unity in Christ. The Eucharist creates this unity. By eating from the same bread and drinking from the same cup, we become the body of Christ present in the world. Just as Christ becomes really present to us in the breaking of the bread, we become really present to one another as brothers and sisters of Christ, members of the same body. Thus the Eucharist not only signifies unity but also creates it.

CHRIST'S BODY, OUR BODY | *Henri Nouwen Society*

When we gather for the Eucharist we gather in the Name of Jesus, who is calling us together to remember his death and resurrection in the breaking of the bread. There he is truly among us. "Where two or three meet in my name," he says, "I am there among them" (Matthew 18:20). The presence of Jesus among us and in the gifts of bread and wine are the same presence. As we recognise Jesus in the breaking of the bread, we recognise him also in our brothers and sisters. As we give one another the bread, saying: "This is the Body of Christ," we give ourselves to each other saying: "We are the Body of Christ." It is one and the same giving, it is one and the same body, it is one and the same Christ.

KNOWING ONE ANOTHER IN CHRIST | *Henri Nouwen Society*

Often we think that we first have to know and understand one another before we gather around the Eucharistic table. Although it is good if those who share in the Body and Blood of Christ know one another personally, coming together regularly for the Eucharist can create a spiritual unity that goes far beyond the various levels of "knowing one another" in human ways. As we enter together into the sacred mysteries of the death and resurrection of Jesus by participating in the Eucharist, we gradually become one body. We truly come to know one another in Christ.

BECOMING THE MYSTICAL BODY OF CHRIST | *Henri Nouwen Society*

As we gather around the Eucharistic table and make the death and resurrection of Jesus our own by sharing in the "bread of life" and the "cup of salvation," we become together the living body of Christ. The Eucharist is the sacrament by which we become one body. Becoming one body is not becoming a team or a group or even a fellowship. Becoming one body is becoming the body of Christ. It is becoming the living Lord, visibly present in the world. It is - as often has been said - becoming the mystical Body of Christ. But mystical and real are the same in the realm of the Spirit.

LOVE LOVE HIMSELF

"I love You, O Lord, my Strength." —Psalm 18:2

Jesus revealed that the two greatest commandments were about loving God and our neighbor (Mt 22:37-39). Jesus maintained that His mission was to show us the Father's love (Jn 15:9). He commanded us to love even our enemies (Mt 5:44). Jesus said that we would be recognized as His disciples because of our "love for one another" (Jn 13:35). Finally, Jesus laid down His life for us when He died on the cross. "There is no greater love than this" (Jn 15:13).

The first Christians began to understand Jesus' life of love. They came to realize that:

- God the Father "so loved the world that He gave His only Son" (Jn 3:16).
- "Love never fails" (1 Cor 13:8).
- Without love, we are nothing (1 Cor 13:2).
- "Love covers a multitude of sins" (1 Pt 4:8).
- Love is greater than even faith or hope (1 Cor 13:13).
- "The love of God has been poured out in our hearts through the Holy Spirit" (Rm 5:5).

Finally, the early Church came to the awesome conclusion that "God is Love, and he who abides in Love abides in God, and God in him" (1 Jn 4:16; see 1 Jn 4:8). Love Love Himself.

Prayer: Father, may the love of Christ impel us (2 Cor 5:14) to make disciples of all nations (Mt 28:19).

Promise: "The word of the Lord has echoed forth from you resoundingly." —1 Thes 1:8

Praise: Praise Jesus of Nazareth (Mk 10:47), Son of David (Mk 10:47, 48), Rabboni (Mk 10:51), "the Resurrection and the Life" (Jn 11:25), Lord, and God!

LOVED TO BE HOLY

"See what love the Father has bestowed on us in letting us be called children of God!" —1 John 3:1

To become a saint in heaven, we must be baptized (see Mk 16:16), totally commit our lives to Jesus, and have a strong desire to be holy in every aspect of our conduct (1 Pt 1:15). We must strive "for that holiness without which no one can see the Lord" (Heb 12:14). To do this, we must hunger and thirst for righteousness and holiness (Mt 5:6).

We naturally do not have a strong desire to grow in holiness. Therefore, the Lord tries to increase our desire for holiness by commanding us to be holy (1 Pt 1:16) and by warning us that those who are not holy will eventually be hurled "into the fiery furnace where they will wail and grind their teeth" (Mt 13:42). Nevertheless, God's command and warning usually does not make that much of an impression on us. All of us have strong desires to avoid pain, be accepted, and have comfortable, easy lives. However, holiness entails surviving "the great period of trial" (Rv 7:14) and being persecuted, insulted, and slandered because of Jesus (Mt 5:10-11). It's very hard for us to desire to be holy under these conditions. To strongly desire holiness, we need something stronger than commandments, warnings, selfishness, and fears.

"Christ loved the Church. He gave Himself up for her to make her holy" (Eph 5:25-26). Christ loves us into desiring holiness and being holy. Let His love conquer all.

Prayer: Father, make my desire to be holy stronger than my desire to breathe, eat, drink, have sex, or make money.

Promise: "Blest are they who hunger and thirst for holiness; they shall have their fill." —Mt 5:6

Praise: "Salvation is from our God, Who is seated on the throne, and from the Lamb!" (Rv 7:10)

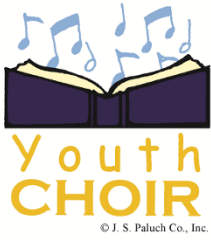
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REALLY PRESENT | *Henri Nouwen Society*

Where is Jesus today? Jesus is where those who believe in him and express that belief in baptism and the Eucharist become one body. As long as we think about the body of believers as a group of people who share a common faith in Jesus of Nazareth, Jesus remains an inspirational historical figure. But when we realize that the body Jesus fashions in the Eucharist is his body, we can start to see what real presence is. Jesus, who is present in the gifts of his Body and Blood, becomes present in the body of believers that is formed by these gifts. We who receive the Body of Christ become the living Christ.

PRIESTHOOD SUNDAY | October 29, 2017 | What is "Priesthood Sunday"?

Priesthood Sunday, the last Sunday of October, is a special day set aside to honor the priesthood in the United States. It is a day to reflect upon and affirm the role of the priesthood in the life of the Church as a central one.

In the wake of the clergy sex abuse scandal, there has been concern that the image of all priests has been tainted by the actions of a few. Priesthood Sunday sends a message to all that the sins of a few do not reflect the innocent majority, and that the parish priest, as the instrument of Christ's ministry on earth, is loved and respected by those in the parish community.

This nationwide event is coordinated by the USA Council of Serra International. It is sponsored by the USA Council of Serra International and the Serra International Foundation.

NATIONAL VOCATION AWARENESS WEEK | November 5-11, 2017

National Vocation Awareness Week (NVAW) is an annual week-long celebration of the Catholic Church in the United States dedicated to promote vocations to the priesthood, diaconate and consecrated life through prayer and education, and to renew our prayers and support for those who are considering one of these particular vocations. NVAW began in 1976 when the U. S. bishops designated the 28th Sunday of the year for NVAW. In 1997, this celebration was moved to coincide with the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, which falls on January 13 in 2013. Beginning in 2014, NVAW was moved to the first full week of November.

COMENZAR SABRIENDO CUÁL ES LA META

Cuando construyes algo siempre es bueno empezar sabiendo cómo quieres que termine. Cuando se trata de formar a católicos en la fe, también nosotros deberíamos comenzar teniendo la meta en mente. Entonces, ¿a qué se supone que se debe de parecer un católico adulto? La respuesta simple es: todos estamos llamados a convertirnos en santos. La meta de la vida cristiana es la santidad. Por supuesto muy pocos, si algunos de nosotros, llegará a ser oficialmente canonizado como santo. Pero la Iglesia siempre ha entendido la palabra santos de una manera diferente. La iglesia primitiva se refería a todos los fieles seguidores de Jesús como los santos. ¿Y cómo vivían los santos? 'Se reunían frecuentemente para escuchar la enseñanza de los apóstoles y para participar en la vida común, en la fracción del pan y en las oraciones' (Hechos 2,42). Dicho de esta manera, los santos (los primeros seguidores de Jesús) se dedicaron a hacer lo siguiente: +Asirse en la fe, +Expresar su fe, +Vivir la fe +y Rezar la fe. Ya entonces estos eran los pilares de la fe católica.

Como católicos nosotros tenemos cuatro pilares en que sostenernos. El Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica nos enseña que nuestra fe está sólidamente asentada en la base firme de los cuatro principios siguientes":

1. EL CREDO
2. LOS SACRAMENTOS
3. LA MORALIDAD
4. LA ORACIÓN

Nos mandó amar incluso a nuestros enemigos (Mt 5:44). Jesús dijo que nosotros seríamos reconocidos como sus discípulos por "el amor que se tengan los unos a los otros" (Jn 13:35). Finalmente, Jesús entregó su vida por nosotros cuando murió en la cruz. "No hay amor más grande" (Jn 15:13).

Los primeros cristianos empezaron a comprender la vida de amor de Jesús. Llegaron a darse cuenta que:

- "Dios amó tanto al mundo, que entregó a Su Hijo único" (Jn 3:16).
- "El amor no pasará jamás" (1 Co 13:8).
- "Si no tengo amor, no soy nada" (1 Co 13:2).
- "Porque el amor cubre todos los pecados" (1 Pe 4:8).
- "Existen tres cosas: la fe, la esperanza y el amor, pero la más grande de todas es el amor" (1 Co 13:13).
- "El amor de Dios ha sido derramado en nuestros corazones por el Espíritu Santo" (Rom 5:5).

Finalmente, la iglesia primitiva llegó a la increíble conclusión de que "Dios es amor, y el que permanece en el amor permanece en Dios, y Dios permanece en Él" (1 Jn 4:16; ver 1 Jn 4:8). ¡Ama al Mismísimo Amor!

Oración: Padre, que el amor de Cristo nos impulse (2 Co 5:14) a hacer discípulos de todas las naciones (Mt 28:19).

Promesa: "De ahí partió la Palabra del Señor" (1 Tes 1:8).
