OUR POVERTY, GOD'S DWELLING PLACE

How can we embrace poverty as a way to God when everyone around us wants to become rich? Poverty has many forms. We have to ask ourselves: "What is my poverty?" Is it lack of money, lack of emotional stability, lack of a loving partner, lack of security, lack of safety, lack of self-confidence? Each human being has a place of poverty. That's the place where God wants to dwell! "How blessed are the poor," Jesus says (Matthew 5:3). This means that our blessing is hidden in our poverty.

We are so inclined to cover up our poverty and ignore it that we often miss the opportunity to discover God, who dwells in it. Let's dare to see our poverty as the land where our treasure is hidden. | *Henri Nouwen Society*

MEETING GOD IN THE POOR | *Henri Nouwen Society*

When we are not afraid to confess our own poverty, we will be able to be with other people in theirs. The Christ who lives in our own poverty recognizes the Christ who lives in other people's. Just as we are inclined to ignore our own poverty, we are inclined to ignore others'. We prefer not to see people who are destitute, we do not like to look at people who are deformed or disabled, we avoid talking about people's pains and sorrows, we stay away from brokenness, helplessness, and neediness.

By this avoidance we might lose touch with the people through whom God is manifested to us. But when we have discovered God in our own poverty, we will lose our fear of the poor and go to them to meet God.

TAKING THE STING OUT OF DEATH | *Henri Nouwen Society*

Dying is returning home. But even though we have been told this many times by many people, we seldom desire to return home. We prefer to stay where we are. We know what we have; we do not know what we will get. Even the most appealing images of the afterlife cannot take away the fear of dying. We cling to life, even when our relationships are difficult, our economic circumstances harsh, and our health quite poor.

Still, Jesus came to take the sting out of death and to help us gradually realise that we don't have to be afraid of death, since death leads us to the place where the deepest desires of our hearts will be satisfied. It is not easy for us to truly believe that, but every little gesture of trust will bring us closer to this truth.

THE QUALITY OF LIFE

It is very hard to accept an early death. When friends die who are seventy, eighty, or ninety years old, we may be in deep grief and miss them very much, but we are grateful that they had long lives. But when a teenager, a young adult, or a person at the height of his or her career dies, we feel a protest rising from our hearts: "Why? Why so soon? Why so young? It is unfair." But far more important than our quantity of years is the quality of our lives. Jesus died young. St. Francis died young. St. Thérèse of Lisieux died young, Martin Luther King, Jr., died young. We do not know how long we will live, but this not knowing calls us to live every day, every week, every year of our lives to its fullest potential.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Eucharistic Prayer II is a popular choice for Mass since it is both simple in structure and short. It is written with a preface, which is the section after the dialogue "The Lord be with you . . . Lift up your hearts . . . Let us give thanks," which introduces all the Eucharistic Prayers. The preface states the reason for the eucharistic assembly on that occasion, and there are dozens of them covering almost every imaginable gathering for prayer, some specific to feasts, others for Masses for the dead or for other needs. The preface attached to the second Eucharistic Prayer may be dropped in favor of a more appropriate choice, especially one of the prefices for weekdays. The *General Instruction of the Roman Missal* says that Eucharistic Prayer II is best suited for weekdays or "special circumstances." In practice, however, it has become the common Sunday prayer because of its brevity and its comfortable familiarity. It also includes an optional phrase for adding the name of a deceased person remembered in the Mass, and therefore is often prayed at funerals. Article 50 of the *Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy* specified that the rites are to be simplified and restored "to the vigor they had in the tradition of the Fathers." The rebirth of this ancient Roman prayer is a worthy response to this call. —Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

THE CROSS ROAD

"Blest are you, Simon son of Jonah! No mere man has revealed this to you, but My heavenly Father." —Matthew 16:17 God the Father revealed to Simon that Jesus was the Messiah, the Son of the living God (Mt 16:16). As with all divine revelations, this was a catalyst leading to Simon's name being changed to Peter (Mt 16:18), Jesus building His Church on Peter (Mt 16:18), Peter being given the authority symbolized by the keys to the kingdom of heaven (Mt 16:19), and Jesus insisting on the cross as the essence of discipleship (Mt 16:24). Peter naturally did not understand all these further revelations, and did not initially accept the cross (Mt 16:22).

The Lord also reveals Himself to us. For example, He may penetrate our hearts with the message of His mercy. This revelation is a catalyst leading us to realize the necessity of giving mercy (Mt 5:7). This implies taking up the cross of forgiving and loving even our enemies. Once again, a divine revelation transports us to the cross. Then we are faced with Simon Peter's dilemma. We are pleased to receive some revelation from the Lord, but we may be reluctant to accept the message of the cross. Will we embrace the cross, or hear the words of Jesus to Peter: "Get out of My sight, you satan! You are trying to make Me trip and fall. You are not judging by God's standards but by man's"? (Mt 16:23) By faith, in love, take up your daily cross and follow Jesus (Lk 9:23).

Prayer: Father, may I proclaim Christ crucified, the power and the wisdom of God (1 Cor 1:24).

Promise: "How deep are the riches and the wisdom and the knowledge of God! How inscrutable His judgments, how unsearchable His ways!" —Rm 11:33

Praise: "The Lord is King; let the earth rejoice" (Ps 97:1). Alleluia to the risen King of Kings!

THE REAL PRESENCE OF JESUS CHRIST IN THE SACRAMENT OF THE EUCHARIST: BASIC QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Continuation...

Why do we speak of the "Body of Christ" in more than one sense?

First, the Body of Christ refers to the human body of Jesus Christ, who is the divine Word become man. During the Eucharist, the bread and wine become the Body and Blood of Christ. As human, Jesus Christ has a human body, a resurrected and glorified body that in the Eucharist is offered to us in the form of bread and wine. Secondly, as St. Paul taught us in his letters, using the analogy of the human body, the Church is the Body of Christ, in which many members are united with Christ their head (1 Cor 10:16-17, 12:12-31; Rom 12:4-8). This reality is frequently referred to as the Mystical Body of Christ. All those united to Christ, the living and the dead, are joined together as one Body in Christ. This union is not one that can be seen by human eyes, for it is a mystical union brought about by the power of the Holy Spirit. The Mystical Body of Christ and the eucharistic Body of Christ are inseparably linked. By Baptism we enter the Mystical Body of Christ, the Church, and by receiving the eucharistic Body of Christ we are strengthened and built up into the Mystical Body of Christ. The central act of the Church is the celebration of the Eucharist; the individual believers are sustained as members of the Church, members of the Mystical Body of Christ, through their reception of the Body of Christ in the Eucharist. Playing on the two meanings of "Body of Christ," St. Augustine tells those who are to receive the Body of Christ in the Eucharist: "**Be what you see, and receive what you are**" (Sermon 272). In another sermon he says, "**If you receive worthily, you are what you have received**" (Sermon 227). The work of the Holy Spirit in the celebration of the Eucharist is twofold in a way that corresponds to the twofold meaning of "Body of Christ." On the one hand, it is through the power of the Holy Spirit that the risen Christ and his act of sacrifice become present. In the eucharistic prayer, the priest asks the Father to send the Holy Spirit down upon the gifts of bread and wine to transform them into the Body and Blood of Christ (a prayer known as the epiclesis or "invocation upon"). On the other hand, at the same time the priest also asks the Father to send the Holy Spirit down upon the whole assembly so that "those who take part in the Eucharist may be one body and one spirit" (Catechism, no. 1353). It is through the Holy Spirit that the gift of the eucharistic Body of Christ comes to us and through the Holy Spirit that we are joined to Christ and each other as the Mystical Body of Christ. By this we can see that the celebration of the Eucharist does not just unite us to God as individuals who are isolated from one another. Rather, we are united to Christ together with all the other members of the Mystical Body. The celebration of the Eucharist should thus increase our love for one another and remind us of our responsibilities toward one another. Furthermore, as members of the Mystical Body, we have a duty to represent Christ and to bring Christ to the world. We have a responsibility to share the Good News of Christ not only by our words but also by how we live our lives. We also have a responsibility to work against all the forces in our world that oppose the Gospel, including all forms of injustice. The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches us: "The Eucharist commits us to the poor. To receive in truth the Body and Blood of Christ given up for us, we must recognize Christ in the poorest, his brethren" (no. 1397).

LA PRESENCIA REAL DE JESUCRISTO EN EL SACRAMENTO DE LA EUCHARISTÍA PREGUNTAS BÁSICAS Y RESPUESTAS

CONTINUACIÓN...

¿Se recibe a Cristo entero si se recibe la Santa Comunión bajo una sola especie?

Sí. Cristo Jesús, nuestro Señor y Salvador, está en la Eucaristía completamente presente, ya sea bajo la apariencia del pan o bajo la apariencia del vino. Además, Cristo está totalmente presente en cualquier fracción de la Hostia consagrada o en cualquier gota de la Preciosísima Sangre. No obstante, es preferible recibir a Cristo en ambas especies durante la celebración de la Eucaristía. Esto permite que la Eucaristía aparezca más perfectamente como un banquete, un banquete que es un antípico del banquete que se celebrará con Cristo al final de los tiempos cuando el Reino de Dios se haya establecido en su plenitud (cf. *Eucharisticum Mysterium*, no. 32).

Durante la celebración de la Eucaristía, ¿está Cristo presente de otras maneras además de su Presencia Real en el Santísimo Sacramento?

Sí. Cristo está presente durante la Eucaristía de varias maneras. Está presente en la persona del presbítero (sacerdote) que ofrece el sacrificio de la misa. Según la Constitución sobre la Sagrada Liturgia del Concilio Vaticano II, Cristo está presente **en su palabra** "pues cuando se lee en la Iglesia la Sagrada Escritura, es él quien habla". También está presente **en el pueblo reunido que ora y canta**, "pues él prometió: 'donde están dos o tres congregados en mi nombre, allí estoy Yo en medio de ellos' (Mt 18, 20)" (*Sacrosanctum Concilium*, no. 7). Asimismo, él está presente también **en los otros sacramentos**; por ejemplo, "cuando alguien bautiza, es Cristo quien bautiza" (ibíd.).

Hablamos de la presencia de Cristo bajo la apariencia de pan y vino como "real", con el fin de enfatizar la naturaleza especial de dicha presencia. Lo que parece ser pan y vino es en su misma substancia el Cuerpo y la Sangre de Cristo. **Cristo entero está presente, Dios y hombre, cuerpo y sangre, alma y divinidad.** Si bien los otros modos en que Cristo está presente en la celebración de la Eucaristía no dejan, ciertamente, de ser reales, este modo supera a los demás. "Esta presencia se denomina 'real', no a título exclusivo, como si las otras presencias no fuesen 'reales', sino por excelencia, porque es substancial, y por ella Cristo, Dios y hombre, se hace totalmente presente" (*Mysterium Fidei*, no. 39).

"*¿Voy a renunciar a mí...?*" (Jueces 9:9, 11, 13).

También sacrificamos lo que podríamos haber hecho con todo ese tiempo extra si no estuviésemos liderando a Su pueblo. Un sacrificio consiste en ofrecer libremente algo para el Señor. Soy uno de los que han sido bendecidos por haber sido llamado al servicio de Dios "muy de madrugada" (ver Mt 20:1). Durante cuarenta años, he trabajado en la viña de Jesús. A veces he luchado para mantener mis ojos fijos en Jesús (Heb 3:1; 12:2) y no en la recompensa de servirle. A veces, me he preguntado: ¿"Voy a renunciar" a mis mejores años (la mayoría de los cuales están detrás de mí)?

La respuesta que Dios siempre me ha dado y a todo su pueblo, es "Sí, debes renunciarlos. Renuncia a tu tiempo, tus sueños, tu dinero, tu vida. No me niegues nada. Seré tu Fortaleza". En recompensa por servirle, Dios declara en Su Palabra: "Ustedes estén alerta para no perder el fruto de sus trabajos, de manera que puedan recibir una perfecta retribución" (2 Jn 8). "No pierdan entonces la confianza, a la que está reservada una gran recompensa. Ustedes necesitan constancia para cumplir la voluntad de Dios y entrar en posesión de la promesa" (Heb 10:35-36).
