"HE IS NEAR" (MK 13:29)

"Then men will see the Son of Man coming in the clouds with great power and glory. He will dispatch His angels and assemble His chosen." —Mark 13:26-27

In these last two weeks of the Church year, the Church pays special attention to the Second Coming of Christ. Focusing on Jesus' return in power is critical for our life in Christ and our spiritual well-being.

Some readers of One Bread, One Body live in foreign countries and are actively persecuted for their faith in Jesus. Some of our foreign printers and distributors risk their lives regularly to spread God's Word. If you "face death every day" (1 Cor 15:31) for your life of courageous faith, be encouraged. The Lord Jesus will always have the final word. Your Redeemer lives, and your eyes will see Him (Jb 19:25, 27). "He is near, even at the door" (Mk 13:29; Rv 3:20), and you will see Him coming with great power and glory to vindicate you (Mk 13:26-27). "Stand erect and hold your heads high, for your deliverance is near at hand" (Lk 21:28). For those who don't live for the Lord, Jesus' Second Coming will not be humble and meek as was His first coming. There will be no meek Infant lying in an obscure manger this time. This time His coming will shake the cosmos in "great power and glory" (Mk 13:26). Few noticed Him in Bethlehem; this time "every eye shall see Him, even of those who" reject Him (Rv 1:7). He will come as Judge (Jas 5:9). Therefore, repent now before it's too late! Reconcile with Jesus now, for you know not the day or the hour of His return (Mk 13:32).

Prayer: *Lord Jesus, may I know You as Savior as well as Judge.*
Promise: *"You will show me the path to life, fullness of joys in Your presence, the delights at Your right hand forever." —Ps 16:11*

Praise: All honor and glory to You, risen Jesus. Marantha! Come Lord Jesus!

As we see so many people die at a young age, through wars, starvation, AIDS, street violence, and physical and emotional neglect, we often wonder what the value of their short lives is. It seems that their journeys have been cut off before they could reach any of their goals, realise any of their dreams, or accomplish any of their tasks. But, short as their lives may have been, they belong to that immense communion of saints, from all times and all places, who stand around the throne of the Lamb dressed in white robes proclaiming the victory of the crucified Christ (see Revelation 7:9).

The story of the innocent children murdered by King Herod in his attempt to destroy Jesus (see Matthew 2:13-18), reminds us that saintliness is not just for those who lived long and hardworking lives. These children, and many who died young, are as much witnesses to Jesus as those who accomplished heroic deeds.

144. Let us not forget that Jesus asked his disciples to pay attention to details.

The little detail that wine was running out at a party.

The little detail that one sheep was missing.

The little detail of noticing the widow who offered her two small coins.

The little detail of having spare oil for the lamps, should the bridegroom delay.

The little detail of asking the disciples how many loaves of bread they had.

The little detail of having a fire burning and a fish cooking as he waited for the disciples at daybreak.

145. A community that cherishes the little details of love,[107] whose members care for one another and create an open and evangelizing environment, is a place where the risen Lord is present, sanctifying it in accordance with the Father’s plan. There are times when, by a gift of the Lord’s love, we are granted, amid these little details, consoling experiences of God. “One winter night I was carrying out my little duty as usual... Suddenly, I heard off in the distance the harmonious sound of a musical instrument. I then pictured a well-lighted drawing room, brilliantly gilded, filled with elegantly dressed young ladies conversing together and conferring upon each other all sorts of compliments and other worldly remarks. Then my glance fell upon the poor invalid whom I was supporting. Instead of the beautiful strains of music I heard only her occasional complaints... I cannot express in words what happened in my soul; what I know is that the Lord illumined it with rays of truth which so surpassed the dark brilliance of earthly feasts that I could not believe my happiness”.[108]

146. Contrary to the growing consumerist individualism that tends to isolate us in a quest for well-being apart from others, our path to holiness can only make us identify all the more with Jesus’ prayer “that all may be one; even as you, Father, are in me, and I in you” (Jn 17:21).

WHAT’S THE SMOKE FOR?

Dear Johan,

I was very annoyed that someone’s cell phone went off during Easter services. Worse, the person sitting next to me was texting throughout the service. What is going on?

Gentle Reader,

You allude to two annoyances. First, the fact that people leave their phones on. Second, that people use their handheld devices.

In response to the first I would like to sheepishly suggest that this might be an honest mistake. One time I forgot to turn off my phone while I was presiding at morning prayer. We were all gathered in our weekday chapel and I was in the midst of the closing collect, my hands lifted in prayer, as the phone in my pocket started to ring. I think I have never been more embarrassed. It did not help when I realized that it was our receptionist who was trying to reach me. This experience cured me forever from keeping my phone on when doing something important. Nevertheless, you have a good point. People should turn off all handheld devices during the celebration of the liturgy.

In response to your second annoyance, I am afraid that this one is much more difficult to deal with as it is something that pervades our culture today. Last week I enjoyed dinner at a lovely restaurant with some good friends. I was struck by the number of times my friends checked their handheld devices. Sometimes they did this in the open, other times conspicuously holding their devices in their laps. Through it all they pretended to continue the conversation and to enjoy the food. I felt cheated. When questioned they answered that they like to multitask. I reminded my friends that I am a jealous friend who does not believe in multitasking when it comes to friendship.

More important and in response to your question, I do not believe in multitasking when it comes to worshipping our God. So, when you come to church, forget about multitasking, rather concentrate and give worship where worship is due and that does not include your handheld device. And should the priest have a brilliant message you are dying to share with your friends, please be patient. Even when sent after the end of the liturgy your five thousand Facebook friends will be appreciative.
