WHAT'S "THEREFORE" THERE FOR?

"One of the scribes came up, and when he heard them arguing he realized how skillfully Jesus answered them.

He decided to ask Him, 'Which is the first of all the commandments?' Jesus replied: 'This is the first...'"

—Mark 12:28-29

The first of all the commandments is: "Hear, O Israel! The Lord our God is Lord alone!" (Mk 12:29; Dt 6:4) Since He is our only Lord, and we must not use our time, energy, and resources for anyone or anything else, "therefore you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength" (Mk 12:30). The word "therefore" shows that the giving of "our all" is based on the acceptance of God as Lord alone. We repeatedly call people to "give their all" in work, finances, and dedication. The response to our pleas is usually apathetic, so we then try to adapt Christianity by making it a halfhearted activity rather than a total commitment. Rather, we should discern the reason for the refusal to give all is the fact that God is not accepted as Lord alone.

Unless we obey the first commandment, we are not fully obeying the others. Commitment to Christ's Body must be preceded by commitment to the Lord, the Head of the Body the Church (Eph 1:22-23). Until Jesus is Lord of all, He's not Lord at all, and Christian life is not even possible. "You are right in saying, 'He is the One, there is no other than He'" (Mk 12:32). First things first.

Prayer: *Jesus, I repent of my sins. I ask You to come into my heart. I accept You as my Lord and Savior. Take over my life.*

Promise: *"Therefore He is always able to save those who approach God through Him, since He forever lives to make intercession for them." —Heb 7:25*

Praise: *Praise You, Jesus, our Lord, God, and All. Be glorified in the Church and in our lives*

NATIONAL VOCATION AWARENESS WEEK

November 4-10, 2018

National Vocation Awareness Week (NVAW) is an annual week-long celebration of the Catholic Church in the United States dedicated **to promote vocations to the priesthood, diaconate and consecrated life through prayer and education, and to renew our prayers and support for those who are considering one of these particular vocations.** NVAW began in 1976 when the U. S. bishops designated the 28th Sunday of the year for NVAW. In 1997, this celebration was moved to coincide with the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, which falls on January 13 in 2013. Beginning in 2014, NVAW was moved to the first full week of November.

CHAPTER FOUR | SIGNS OF HOLINESS IN TODAY'S WORLD

BOLDNESS AND PASSION

134. Like the prophet Jonah, we are constantly tempted to flee to a safe haven. It can have many names: individualism, spiritualism, living in a little world, addiction, intransigence, the rejection of new ideas and approaches, dogmatism, nostalgia, pessimism, hiding behind rules and regulations. We can resist leaving behind a familiar and easy way of doing things. Yet the challenges involved can be like the storm, the whale, the worm that dried the gourd plant, or the wind and sun that burned Jonah's head. For us, as for him, they can serve to bring us back to the God of tenderness, who invites us to set out ever anew on our journey.

135. God is eternal newness. He impels us constantly to set out anew, to pass beyond what is familiar, to the fringes and beyond. He takes us to where humanity is most wounded, where men and women, beneath the appearance of a shallow conformity, continue to seek an answer to the question of life's meaning. God is not afraid! He is fearless! He is always greater than our plans and schemes. Unafraid of the fringes, he himself became a fringe (cf. Phil 2:6-8; Jn 1:14). So if we dare to go to the fringes, we will find him there; indeed, he is already there. Jesus is already there, in the hearts of our brothers and sisters, in their wounded flesh, in their troubles and in their profound desolation. He is already there.

136. True enough, we need to open the door of our hearts to Jesus, who stands and knocks (cf. Rev 3:20). Sometimes I wonder, though, if perhaps Jesus is already inside us and knocking on the door for us to let him escape from our stale self-centeredness. In the Gospel, we see how Jesus "went through the cities and villages, preaching and bringing the good news of the kingdom of God" (Lk 8:1). After the resurrection, when the disciples went forth in all directions, the Lord accompanied them (cf. Mk 16:20). This is what happens as the result of true encounter.

137. Complacency is seductive; it tells us that there is no point in trying to change things, that there is nothing we can do, because this is the way things have always been and yet we always manage to survive. By force of habit we no longer stand up to evil. We "let things be", or as others have decided they ought to be. Yet let us allow the Lord to rouse us from our torpor, to free us from our inertia. Let us rethink our usual way of doing things; let us open our eyes and ears, and above all our hearts, so as not to be complacent about things as they are, but unsettled by the living and effective word of the risen Lord.

138. We are inspired to act by the example of all those priests, religious, and laity who devote themselves to proclamation and to serving others with great fidelity, often at the risk of their lives and certainly at the cost of their comfort. Their testimony reminds us that, more than bureaucrats and functionaries, the Church needs passionate missionaries, enthusiastic about sharing true life. The saints surprise us, they confound us, because by their lives they urge us to abandon a dull and dreary mediocrity.

139. Let us ask the Lord for the grace not to hesitate when the Spirit calls us to take a step forward. Let us ask for the apostolic courage to share the Gospel with others and to stop trying to make our Christian life a museum of memories. In every situation, may the Holy Spirit cause us to contemplate history in the light of the risen Jesus. In this way, the Church will not stand still, but constantly welcome the Lord's surprises.

WHAT'S THE SMOKE FOR?

Dear Johan,

I notice that in other churches the liturgy does not last more than fifty minutes. We take much longer. I'm not complaining; I am just curious. Why do we need more time to celebrate the same liturgy?

Gentle Reader,

Your question reminds me of a failed dinner several years ago. We were on our way to a concert and decided to have dinner on the way there. As we were somewhat in a hurry, I asked the server how long it would take before the meal arrived. He looked at me indignantly and wondered aloud if I might be confusing fine dining with fast food. He also suggested the names of a couple restaurants down the road that might better suit our needs. We made a quick exit and I have never been back.

What has happened to us? And what has happened to the way we eat? When was the last time you sat down for a leisurely dinner, prepared from scratch? That is what we did every day when I was growing up. Things have changed so much in our rapid-paced, quick-bite, and fast-serve society. As a result, fine dining has become an endangered activity. And I am afraid that fine liturgies will follow suit.

As is the case with fine dining, there is nothing quick or fast about the Eucharist, which rehearses us for the heavenly banquet. I feel fortunate to be part of a church community where people believe in celebrating the liturgy to its fullest. That means that we take our time, singing, praying, praising God for the marvelous deeds accomplished in Jesus Christ.

If indeed the liturgy is the "source and summit" of everything a Christian community does, as the Second Vatican Council states, then we need to take that to heart. Limiting this to fifty minutes or less seems a bit stingy!

When asked how long any given liturgy will last, I try to refrain from telling people that they are confusing fine liturgy with fast liturgy and that they might be better served in a church down the road. Rather, I smile and answer that it will last as long as it needs to last.

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
EUCCHARISTIC ADORATION Friday, November 9 from 12:30pm to 6:00pm.

There is a tendency to think about poverty, suffering, and pain as realities that happen primarily or even exclusively at the bottom of our Church. We seldom think of our leaders as poor. Still, there is great poverty, deep loneliness, painful isolation, real depression, and much emotional suffering at the top of our Church.

We need the courage to acknowledge the suffering of the leaders of our Church - its ministers, priests, bishops, and popes - and include them in this fellowship of the weak. When we are not distracted by the power, wealth, and success of those who offer leadership, we will soon discover their powerlessness, poverty, and failures and feel free to reach out to them with the same compassion we want to give to those at the bottom. In God's eyes there is no distance between bottom and top. There shouldn't be in our eyes either.

POBRE DE MÍ

"Cuando des un banquete, invita a los pobres, a los lisiados, a los paralíticos, a los ciegos" (Lucas 14:13).

De acuerdo con Jesús, alimentar a los pobres es una responsabilidad personal. Los pobres deben ser amigos personales. Deberíamos conocerlos visitándolos y animándolos a comunicarse con nosotros. El gobierno y la iglesia no deben de tomar nuestro lugar en el alimento de los pobres, sino suplementar nuestros esfuerzos individuales.

Debemos abrir nuestros hogares a los pobres y servirlos con nuestras propias manos. Podemos implementar esto escribiendo un cheque a una agencia de servicios sociales, pero un cheque nunca puede sustituir dar la mano o servir a los pobres en nuestra casa. Jesús describió Su ministerio como la predicación de las Buenas Nuevas a los pobres (Lc 4:18). Él dijo que en el Día del Juicio nuestro servicio personal a los pobres hará la diferencia eterna (Mt 25:34ss). Jesús escogió libremente convertirse en pobre (2 Co 8:9). En nuestro ministerio personal, siempre debemos hacer esto como una prioridad para "ser conscientes de los pobres" (Gál 2:10) y tener "un amor preferente para los pobres" (Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica, 1586). No podemos amar a Jesús sin amar a los pobres. Ellos son la presencia de Dios en nuestro medio, un reto con consecuencias eternas, y una preciosa oportunidad de amar a Jesús. Ama a los pobres.

Oración: Jesús, dame un profundo respeto por los pobres, sin mirar sus circunstancias.

Promesa: "¡No hagan nada por espíritu de discordia o de vanidad, y que la humildad los lleve a estimar a los otros como superiores a ustedes mismos. Que cada uno busque no solamente su propio interés, sino también el de los demás" (Fil 2:3-4).

ENTONCES, ¿QUÉ ES POR LO TANTO?

"Un escriba que los oyó discutir, al ver que les había respondido bien, se acercó y le preguntó: '¿Cuál es el primero de los mandamientos?' Jesús respondió: 'El primero es...' (Marcos 12:28-29).

El primero de todos los mandamientos es: "Escucha, Israel: ¡el Señor nuestro Dios es el único!" (Mc 12:29; Dt 6:4) Ya que Él es nuestro Señor, no debemos usar nuestro tiempo, energía, ni recursos para nadie ni nada más, "y tú amarás al Señor, tu Dios, con todo tu corazón y con toda tu alma, con todo tu espíritu y con todas tus fuerzas" (Mc 12:30).

La frase "por lo tanto" muestra que el dar de "nuestro todo" se basa solamente en la aceptación de Dios como el único Señor. Repetidamente llamamos a personas para que "den todo" en sus trabajos, finanzas, y en sus dedicaciones. La respuesta a nuestros ruegos generalmente es apático, así que tratamos de adaptar el cristianismo como una actividad de medio corazón en lugar de un compromiso total. Más bien, debemos distinguir que la razón del rechazo para dar todo es el hecho de que Dios no es aceptado como el Señor.

A menos que obedezcamos el primer mandamiento, no podemos obedecer completamente los demás. El compromiso al Cuerpo de Cristo tiene que ser precedido por el compromiso al Señor, la Cabeza del Cuerpo de la Iglesia. (Ef 1:22-23). En tanto que Jesús no sea el Señor de todo, Él no es el Señor, y la vida cristiana no es posible. "Tienes razón al decir que hay un solo Dios y no hay otro más que Él" (Mc 12:32). Lo primero es lo primero.

Oración: Jesús, me arrepiento de mis pecados. Te pido que entres a mi corazón. Te acepto como mi Señor y Salvador. ¡Toma mi vida!

Promesa: "De ahí que Él puede salvar en forma definitiva a los que se acercan a Dios por su intermedio, ya que vive eternamente para interceder por ellos" (Heb 7:25).

Alabanza: Te alabo, Jesús, nuestro Señor, nuestro Dios, y nuestro Todo. Que seas glorificado en la Iglesia y en nuestras vidas.
