TAKING IT PERSONALLY

**"The Lord was pleased to crush Him in infirmity."
 —Isaiah 53:10**

Isaiah prophesied that Jesus would be "pierced for our offenses, crushed for our sins" (Is 53:5). Jesus was crushed because "the Lord laid upon Him the guilt of us all" (Is 53:6). One person's guilt can cause him or her to collapse (see Hos 14:2) or even be crushed. Imagine (if you can) all the weight of all the guilt of all sins of every person who has lived or will ever live. Imagine this weight pressing upon one person at one time. Then you can understand why "so marred was [Jesus'] look beyond that of man, and His appearance beyond that of mortals" (Is 52:14). Jesus suffered on the cross more than can ever be imagined.

Jesus died because of our sins. Consequently, each of us is partly responsible for Jesus' brutal death (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 598). Nevertheless, Jesus suffered dreadfully and died for each of us personally. Therefore, the least we can do is to:

- live lives of thanksgiving to our crucified Savior,
- love Him "with all [our] heart, with all [our] soul, with all [our] strength, and with all [our] mind" (Lk 10:27),
- tell as many people as possible about the One Who has loved us even to death on the cross (see Phil 2:8), and
- be eager to die a martyr's death in imitation of Jesus.

When a person comes to the realization that he partly caused Jesus' death and was perfectly loved by Jesus in His death, that person lives no longer for himself, "but for Him Who for their sakes died and was raised up" (2 Cor 5:15). Enter the new life of the crucified Jesus (Gal 2:19).

Prayer: *Father, send the Holy Spirit so that I will take Jesus' crucifixion and death personally.*

Promise: *"Father, send the Holy Spirit so that I will take Jesus' crucifixion and death personally.*

Praise: All praise and thanksgiving to You, Jesus our Savior. We adore You now and forever.

“REJOICE AND BE GLAD” | In the next few weeks we will be posting excerpts from the **APOSTOLIC EXHORTATION GAUDETE ET EXSULTATE OF THE HOLY FATHER POPE FRANCIS ON THE CALL TO HOLINESS IN TODAY’S WORLD. CHAPTER FOUR | SIGNS OF HOLINESS IN TODAY’S WORLD**

JOY AND A SENSE OF HUMOUR

126. Christian joy is usually accompanied by a sense of humour. We see this clearly, for example, in Saint Thomas More, Saint Vincent de Paul and Saint Philip Neri. Ill humour is no sign of holiness. “Remove vexation from your mind” (Eccl 11:10). We receive so much from the Lord “for our enjoyment” (1 Tim 6:17), that sadness can be a sign of ingratitude. We can get so caught up in ourselves that we are unable to recognize God’s gifts.[101]

127. With the love of a father, God tells us: “My son, treat yourself well... Do not deprive yourself of a happy day” (Sir 14:11.14). He wants us to be positive, grateful and uncomplicated: “In the day of prosperity, be joyful... God created human beings straightforward, but they have devised many schemes” (Eccl 7:14.29). Whatever the case, we should remain resilient and imitate Saint Paul: “I have learned to be content with what I have” (Phil 4:11). Saint Francis of Assisi lived by this; he could be overwhelmed with gratitude before a piece of hard bread, or joyfully praise God simply for the breeze that caressed his face.

128. This is not the joy held out by today’s individualistic and consumerist culture. Consumerism only bloats the heart. It can offer occasional and passing pleasures, but not joy. Here I am speaking of a joy lived in communion, which shares and is shared, since “there is more happiness in giving than in receiving” (Acts 20:35) and “God loves a cheerful giver” (2 Cor 9:7). Fraternal love increases our capacity for joy, since it makes us capable of rejoicing in the good of others: “Rejoice with those who rejoice” (Rom 12:15). “We rejoice when we are weak and you are strong” (2 Cor 13:9). On the other hand, when we “focus primarily on our own needs, we condemn ourselves to a joyless existence”.[102] Continues...

WHAT’S THE SMOKE FOR?

Dear Johan,

Our pastor announces Sunday Vespers every week. Why doesn’t he tell us what they are? We might be more inclined to go if we knew. So I ask you: What are they?

Gentle Reader,

I am not sure if describing Vespers will make you want to go. It might all sound a bit boring to you. My recommendation would be that you just go and experience Vespers before you read this column. You might really enjoy it.

Vespers, also known as evening prayer, needs to be understood in the context of the desire of Christians, in keeping with Jewish custom and the Pauline exhortation to “Pray without ceasing” (1 Thess 5:17; Eph 6:18). As a result we have marked the different segments of a day with prayers, ever since apostolic times. The earliest evidence of organized daily morning and evening prayer dates back to the third century.

With the increase of monastic fervor, the frequency of daily gatherings for prayer increased. Some monastic communities’ charism was to dedicate themselves entirely to praising God and sanctifying the successive moments of day and night in communal prayer. Saint Benedict, for example, asked of his monks that they recite all 150 psalms in a week. More fervent monks even recited all 150 psalms each day. This form of prayer is known as Liturgy of the Hours or the Divine Office.

Lay Christians and parish priests who were unable to tend to their prayer life twenty-four hours a day lived out the call to prayer in a different way. They marked fewer but set moments of the day with prayer, either in private or in community. Three times each day: at the rising of the sun, at midday, and at the setting of the sun the local church bells invited people to stop working and pray for just a few moments. This prayer is known as the Angelus. Many churches still ring their bells at those times but few people respond to them.

The prayer of clerics was and is a bit more involved. They observe three major times of prayer (the Office of Readings, Lauds, and Vespers) and two minor times of prayer (midday prayer and Compline). Lauds is Latin for praise, for indeed in the morning praise is to be given for the new day. The Office of Readings precedes Lauds. Vespers is derived from the Latin for evening star. A major element of Vespers is the blessing of the light. The middle of the day is marked by a relatively short midday prayer. The day concludes with night prayer or Compline, which is Latin for completion.

Each one of these prayer times ordinarily consists of a hymn of praise, psalm(s) and/or canticle(s), a brief reading from Scripture, and a series of intercessory prayers that are concluded with the Lord’s Prayer.

Today, St. Paul’s exhortation to “pray without ceasing” is mostly ignored by the majority of Christians as we busy ourselves with many other things. It may be good to reintroduce regular moments of prayer into our lives. Sunday Vespers may not be a bad start and please do listen for the bells.

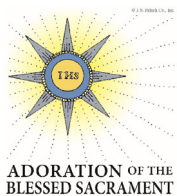

Existe una expresión de uso corriente: “Demasiada información para mi gusto”. Generalmente decimos esto cuando alguien nos da detalles sobre su vida que no deseamos o no necesitamos saber. Hoy, cuando Santiago y Juan le hacen una pregunta simple a Jesús y le piden ocupar lugares de honor en el Reino, Jesús podría haberles dado una respuesta simple. Pero, como suele hacerlo, responde una pregunta con otra pregunta, en este caso se trata de beber el cáliz del sufrimiento. Luego, cuando los demás se indignan contra el atrevido pedido de Santiago y Juan, Jesús les dice algo que puede haber sido “demasiada información” para el gusto de los seguidores, quienes sólo estaban interesados en alcanzar la gloria. Pero esta información, aunque algunas veces pueda parecer “demasiada” para nuestro gusto, es vital para nuestras vidas como discípulos. Hoy en Isaías, en hebreos y en Marcos, conocemos esta información: sólo mediante el sufrimiento, la debilidad y el servicio generoso a los demás comprenderemos el Reino. Ésta es la información que necesitamos para encontrar nuestro lugar y poder ser honrados en el Reino de Dios.

El hombre de la lectura evangélica de hoy era un tonto "porque acumulaba riquezas para sí, y no es rico a los ojos de Dios" (Lc 12:21). Dios nuestro Padre es rico en misericordia (Ef 2:4). Los hijos de Dios son las personas más ricas del mundo, pero no necesariamente son ricas por los estándares mundanos. Nos hacemos "ricos a la vista de Dios" al heredar lo más posible sus riquezas. Hacemos esto viviendo plenamente nuestros Bautismos como fieles hijos e hijas de Dios nuestro Padre. Almacenamos riquezas en el cielo al vender lo que tenemos y dar limosnas (Lc 12:33; véase también Mt 19:21). Para construir una base segura para el futuro, debemos ser "ricos en buenas obras, que den con generosidad y sepan compartir sus riquezas" (1 Tim 6:18).

Jesús "siendo rico, se hizo pobre por nosotros, a fin de enriquecernos con su pobreza" (2 Co 8:9). Dios Padre quiere que sus hijos sean ricos con Sus riquezas y según Sus estándares. Perder todo: cuenta "como desperdicio, con tal de ganar a Cristo" tu Riqueza (Fil 3:8). Crece "rico a los ojos de Dios".

Oración: Padre, ilumina los ojos de mi corazón para conocer mis riquezas como hijo Tuyo (Ef 1:18).

Promesa: Él "cuando estábamos muertos a causa de nuestros pecados, nos hizo revivir con Cristo" (Ef 2:5).

Alabanza: El Papa san Juan Pablo II compartió con el mundo la riqueza espiritual que Dios le dio, especialmente con respecto a la Teología del Cuerpo.

TOMÁNDOLO PERSONALMENTE

"El Señor quiso aplastarlo con el sufrimiento" (Isaías 53:10).

Isaías profetizó que Jesús sería "traspasado por nuestras rebeldías y triturado por nuestras iniquidades" (Is 53:5). Jesús fue aplastado porque "el Señor hizo recaer sobre Él las iniquidades de todos nosotros" (Is 53:6). La culpabilidad de una persona puede causar su colapso (ver Os 14:2) o incluso ser aplastado. Imagina (si puedes) todo el peso de toda la culpa de todos los pecados de cada persona que ha vivido o vivirá alguna vez. Imagina este peso presionando a una persona al mismo tiempo. Entonces, puedes entender por qué "estaba [Jesús] tan desfigurado que su aspecto no era el de un hombre y su apariencia no era más la de un ser humano" (Is 52:14). Jesús sufrió en la cruz más de lo que jamás se puede imaginar. Jesús murió a causa de nuestros pecados. En consecuencia, cada uno de nosotros es en parte responsable de la muerte brutal de Jesús (Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica, 598). Sin embargo, Jesús sufrió terriblemente y murió por cada uno de nosotros. Por lo tanto, lo menos que podemos hacer es:

- vivir vidas de acción de gracias a nuestro crucificado Salvador,
- amarlo "con todo [nuestro] corazón, con toda [nuestra] alma, con todas [nuestras] fuerzas y con todo [nuestro] espíritu" (Lc 10:27),
- contar a cuantas personas nos sea posible sobre Aquel que nos amó hasta la muerte en la cruz (ver Fil 2:8), y
- estar ansioso por morir como mártir en imitación de Jesús.

Cuando una persona se da cuenta de que en parte causó la muerte de Jesús y fue amada perfectamente por Jesús en Su muerte, esa persona ya no vive para sí, "sino para Aquel que murió y resucitó por ellos" (2 Co 5:15). Entra en la nueva vida de Jesús crucificado (Gál 2:19).

Oración: Padre, envía al Espíritu Santo para que yo pueda tomar personalmente la crucifixión y muerte de Jesús.

Promesa: "El mismo Hijo del hombre no vino para ser servido, sino para servir y dar su vida en rescate por una multitud" (Mc 10:45).

Alabanza: Toda alabanza y acción de gracias para Ti, Jesús nuestro Salvador. Te adoramos ahora y siempre.
